

I was at Notre Dame Seminary the year Hurricane Katrina came to New Orleans. I left that Friday as I did almost every weekend, just my briefcase and dirty clothes in hand. We heard about the Hurricane coming, but we were sure that it was going to hit Pensacola. But it didn't. The good thing for me, though, was that I was out long before the evacuations and I was home. For those of us not in the city, you remember watching those images in horror. We asked where was the government? Why hadn't emergency assistance arrived? Good news came; people around the world responded. Millions of ours of volunteer time and money were sent to help those who were struggling. I couldn't bear to look at the images anymore.

As time passed, interest in the storm decreased and people's attention moved on. Psychologists have a term for what happens as these large disasters fade from our memory. Compassion fatigue. After a while, we don't want to handle it anymore, and our minds move on to other things. Wouldn't you love to never see another image of the planes hitting the World Trade Center in New York? What was worse was that when we went back to seminary, we had to talk about it. We had to sit in groups and rehash the whole thing. And we moved back to New Orleans in January, being the only persons around in the neighborhood.

There's lots in the first few lines of Mark's Gospel. First having spent time spreading the Good News of the Gospel, the disciples gathered together to discuss with Jesus all that they had done and

taught." Jesus may have even asked them, "How did things go today?" Too often we think that God already knows what we've done and said, so we conclude that there is no need to bring our lives to God in prayer. Jesus encourages reporting – even when we're tired of it. Report what they saw, what they heard, and what they experienced. God wants to hear about our lives. Why? God knows how important it is to share our experiences. It brings us into deeper communion with him while allowing us to feel God's support, reminding us that we are not in this alone. God wants us to be part of it – like a friend who wants to hear our daily experiences.

Jesus also invites the disciples to discuss these things in a group. Mark says they gathered together. The communal dimension of the retelling is important since these things happened to us - not just to me. Jesus could have chosen just one person to help him. Instead, he called a group. He knew how important individual talents are for the community, but the group dynamic was itself valuable. We are social beings. He also invites the disciples, after their work, to "Come away by yourselves to a deserted place and rest a while." This is a part we all need. We need to withdraw from the busyness of the day. We need to do it with an attitude of solitude. The deserted place, whether it's your room or a retreat house, is sometimes essential for prayer. We all need rest. The disciples needed it; so did Jesus; and so do we.

I wonder if the same type of fatigue plagues us in our spiritual life. Perhaps the reasons we don't want to bring it to God in prayer or even talk about it in a group is that we've lost the sense of Sabbath. We teach our kids to always be active and on the go. We tell them to acquire achievements and proudly put them on the resume to get more money and good jobs. But do we take the time to reflect, to go away, to heed Jesus' invitation to learn once more how to establish ties with God and others?

Perhaps if we took such time to rest, our compassion would never grow weary. So use these summer months, brothers, to rest in the Lord so that you can go out soon as brother Knights to spread the Good News about God and our Fraternal Order!





This years 4 major program categories-Faith, Community, Family and Life will only award 100 points each. Last year it was 200 points each. More emphasis is being placed on Administration.

Once again the Mandatory program under the Faith category is the Spiritual Day of Relection Program. To meet the requirements of this mandatory program, a council must participate in prayers and reflection together as a fraternity, such as sending 10 or more members to the State KC Retreat at Maryhill or an ACTS retreat. Or you can organize your own event with a priest or deacon leading a full day event with a minimum of 10 members. A Church Mission will not satisfy this requirement.

Also, an emphasis is being placed on submitting Service Program reports describing your best program in each of the 4 major categories. These are worth 25 points each this year.

And, all grading forms must be submitted online by April 5, 2020. NOTE: We will not accept grading forms mailed through the Postal Service.

I look forward to seeing you at KCLS in Dutchtown on July 20.

I do hope that the councils will like this better than mailing, but councils can still mail your reports to me. In the near future I will be sending out information and M.D.F. Program information to the Grand Knights, and District Deputies, by way of KCLS.



Brother Knights, a new Seminarian Mission Raffle Campaign was launched at the 2019 State Convention in May. We strongly encourage all Councils throughout the State to assist the Louisiana Sate Council with this fundraiser. Each year seminarians from St. Joseph Seminary College in Covington take Mission trips to Guatemala and Ecuador and seminarians from Notre Dame Seminary in New Orleans take mission trips to Puerto Rica. The second Series of Diocesan Meetings were conducted during the weeks of March 18 and March 25, 2019. topics discussed at the Diocesan Meetings were tailored to the specific Diocese and included Communication, Training, Membership, New Programs, Forms, Finance, Insurance and 4th Degree. The Diocesan Administrators discussed specific topics related to the Diocese.

The Supreme Convention was held in Baltimore, Maryland during the first week of August. The Louisiana Delegation included the elected Louisiana Delegates, some of our State Officers and Members from the State of Louisiana with their spouses. Our Supreme Convention Chairman, Paul deMahy and his wife Marilyn coordinated and handled the Louisiana Hospitality Room and were very effective in making the Convention an enjoyable and memorable event. The Louisiana Hospitality Room is a very popular and well attended activity by the Supreme Convention attendees from all states and territories. The Louisiana Hospitality room was open to the Convention Attendees on the Monday of the Supreme Convention. King Cake, Hurricanes and Mardi Gras beads were flowing freely. All had a great time, thanks to the effort of Paul and Marilyn. The number of members in attendance from Louisiana has been growing each year. We are hopeful that that trend will continue and encourage anyone to attend who is interested.

Membership is the ongoing focus throughout the year. Each of us is responsible for giving every Catholic male the opportunity to be part of our great order. Your Membership Director, Bobby Charpentier, and his Team, have done an outstanding job this year in promoting membership at every opportunity they can. I am very please to report that during this Columbian Year, Louisiana has installed the first Seminarian Council in the State of Louisiana. Fr. Joseph LaFleur Council 17205 is the new Seminarian Council at St. Joseph Seminary in St. Benedict, LA. There are other opportunities for new Councils and reactivations of Suspended Councils that are in the development stages, but have not been finalized at the time of this report.

Under Membership, the State has focused on recruiting members of all ages (young and older). In order to address the gap of vounger members in our Councils. The State Council has initiated the formation of the Young Adult Development Committee, Co Chaired by Julian Gluck and Cody Reed. Participation in this committee is compiled of Brother Knights of age 18 to 40 years old. The purpose of this committee is to identify and promote opportunities for younger men to join the Knights of Columbus and determine what is needed to maintain their interest in the Knights of Columbus as active members. Many good ideas have been proposed from this committee and a budget has been granted to implement new ideas to attract the younger adults. A big benefit to Councils is the development of a pool of younger Knights available to assist in Council recruiting, especially targeting young adults. The Seminarians of the new Seminarian Council 17205 have also offered their assistance during Council recruiting drives to promote the Knights of Columbus and target the young adult population as well.

Online Membership is a new initiative This has been a very successful this year. opportunity for the State of Louisiana and is the preferred method of joining the Knights of Columbus by younger Members. Over 200 Members have signed up online through Online Membership for this Columbian Year. Online Members can join a Council upon request, but must go through the same Council review process and complete the Admissions Degree before becoming a First Degree Member in the Council. Curtis Constrantiche, our Online Membership Chairman has done a great job in managing the Online Membership Process for the Louisiana State Council.

Ceremonials is an integral part of our Membership Team and our Order, every new First Degree Council Member must go

Good of the Order

To: The Officers and Members of the 114th Annual Meeting of the Louisiana State Council held in Baton Rouge, La.

Your committee on the Good of the Order met on Saturday, May 4th, and fully discussed at length the following activity areas. After due deliberation, the committee urges all council, district and state leaders to see that the following recommendations are fully implemented.

The committee would also ask that at future conventions, each member of the Good of the Order Committee, as appointed, be forwarded a copy of the previous year's Good of the Order report to prepare committee members as to what is to be discussed.

FIRST AND FOREMOST WE ARE CATHOLIC

The committee recommends the recitation of the Serran Prayer for Vocations, or another appropriate vocations prayer, at each council meeting and that the council chaplain should encourage the recitation of this prayer at all Masses. The committee further recommends that a prayer be offered at each council meeting for the beatification of our founder Father Michael J. McGivney. The council chaplain should be encouraged to be actively involved in council activities. In the absence of the council Chaplain, a deacon shall be asked to bring the message of our faith. The committee urges all councils to participate in the Refund Support Vocations Program (RSVP). Each council should consider sponsoring a speaker on vocations to the various parochial schools. Recognizing that some clergy may still be apprehensive to Knights of Columbus involvement, the committee recommends each council strongly consider implementation of the Parish Round Table Program and thus show evidence of our belief that VOCATIONS ARE OUR BUSINESS and that each Grand Knight has a dialogue with each Pastor of churches in his council area. Each council should consider having a speaker on evangelization, to encourage each member to promote the Catholic faith to non-Catholics, and to help fallen-away Catholics to become again active in the Church. One way this can be done effectively is by supporting evangelization through the RCIA program.

PRO-LIFE

The committee recommends increased efforts from the state level to provide more timely and specific information to the council level about upcoming activities such as Pro-Life Rallies. The committee encourages area, district and local Right to Life Masses and demonstrations. It is also recommended that continued active exposure to the public by each council be pursued. The committee encourages each council to construct a monument to the unborn in a prominent place, preferably on the church grounds and those that have one to maintain and have programs to bring Pro-Life to parishioners attention. We urge right-to-life education, to fight abortion, and specific projects, such as enforcement by members and Grand Knights of letter writing campaigns from council members to state and federal governing bodies. We also urge the use of the vast amount of material that is available about the AIDS Virus, and promoting abstinence and chastity as a way of decreasing the threat of AIDS as well as decreasing abortions and moral decay.

The committee also recommends that councils become involved with local Right-To-Life organizations by way of participating in their events and getting on their mailing lists. The committee urges use of material available to them from the Supreme Council pertaining to Pro-Life. The committee also urges members to fight pornography at the council, family and school levels. The committee further recommends that the State Council provide updated information of current Federal and State legislation on Pro-Life and Euthanasia.

The Committee reommends each council appoints a Pro-Life Chairman or Chair-Couple; supports a youth

Retention starts before the member even signs the Form 100. Get to know your prospective members and find out as much about them as possible. With that information, you must find a program that will keep him interested. A successful council has mentors that will follow that member throughout his first year, and bring him up to speed about your council and the Order. Make sure every member is happy and fulfilled. Never let months go by without making contact. Show him you care; show him that he is an important part of your council and of our Order. We must nurture all new members and cultivate their membership, or that membership will wither and die.

I want all of you to have a successful year. I encourage all of you to attend KCLS, and I look forward to meeting with each and every one of you as I travel throughout our great state. The State Officers and members of the State Family are here and will assist you at every turn. All you have to do is reach out and ask for assistance. Don't get bogged down with the details, and remember why we do what we do. Together we can achieve all our goals, and together we can show the world that the Knights of Columbus is and always will be the right arm of the Church.

Good of the Order

BISHOP GRECO MEMORIAL FUND

The committee recommends that all councils use the memorial cards to memorialize deceased council members. The card can be filled in with the name of the deceased and the name of the donating council. The card is mailed to the member's family. A suggested donation of \$25.00, however any amount is accepted, and sent to the Greco Foundation for the trust fund.

The committee also recommends that councils make a voluntary contribution of \$1.00 per member, on annual basis, to the Bishop Greco Memorial Fund..

RETREATS

The committee recommends that each council have a guest speaker with Catholic Retreats as the subject, and schedule retreats for its members, individual as well as couples, encouraging husband and wife retreats whenever offered.

FAMILY INVOLVEMENT

The committee recommends continual family involvement in council activities. The committee also recommends each council have a monthly Family Communion. The committee strongly recommends that widows of deceased council members be included and recognized in every aspect of the council's life and activity. This committee further recommends that the council members make themselves available to provide assistance to widows and receive a copy of the council news letter and provide transportation if needed.

YOUTH EXPANSION PROGRAM

The committee urges each council to actively support the Youth Expansion Program by annually exceeding it's YEP quota, and by involvement in a youth organization such as Columbian Squires, Boy or Girl Scouts and/or Catholic Youth Organization (CYO). The committee recommends that all members in each council be asked to make a personal contribution to our Youth Expansion Program and councils should not depend on fund-raisers only. Each council should consider either making it a part of the dues or adding to their billing a \$10.00 voluntary contribution by each member. The committee recommends that all councils participate in the CYLA Program and that efforts be made to properly recognize the applicants and winners on the council level.

SUBSTANCE ABUSE-HEALTH SERVICES

The committee recommends each council sponsor an educational program on substance abuse by the law enforcement agencies to local junior and senior high schoolstudents. The committee urges all Knights to recognize local, state and federal law enforcement agencies. The committee further recommends that councils establish blood donation drives, Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) training programs and community blood pressure surveys.

FRATERNAL MEMBERSHIP-NEW COUNCIL DEVELOPMENT

The committee wishes to compliment the first degree and major degree teams in the Louisiana Jurisdiction for their excellent exemplifications which act as catalysts in encouraging all councils to obtain new, active members. The committee wishes to remind all members that it is our Supreme Council's desire that we have a KC presence in every church parish and that we should aid all efforts to form a new council or a Parish Round Table. It is also recommended that all members proposing new members into our Order assume responsibility for insuring the first-degree member receives his major degree as soon as possible, and remains an active member. Also, we congratulate all councils that sponsor a first degree team and we strongly recommend that every council make an attempt to establish a team, and that all ceremonials be performed with the proper dignity. The committee recommends that every council make an effort to bring in new members, but that no less effort be expended to retain

Seventy Seven (77) Councils have reported donations of over \$140,000 statewide for MDF related charities. Tim Helbling became our Special Olympics Chairman this year. His involvement with Special Olympics is working to create an even stronger tie between our Order and the Special Olympic organization.

Our Youth Programs have been managed by Delmas Forbes, our State Youth Director and are solely funded through the Youth Expansion Program (YEP), where goals are set for Council donations throughout the year. The programs funded by YEP include Catholic Youth Leadership Award (CYLA) Program, Youth Support Groups, College Catholic Student Centers, Seminary, Seminarians, Soccer and Free Throw, Youth Retreats, and Culture of Life Initiatives. The collections for YEP are coordinated by Melvin Burrell, our Youth Expansion Program Chairman. Melvin has done a great job with this program.

Our Catholic Youth Leadership Award Program (CYLA) is one of our premier Youth Programs. It benefits High School Seniors that are seen as leaders through their work at school, other organizations, and the Catholic Church. As has been scheduled for many years, our CYLA winners will speak at our State Convention Banquet. Richard Yandle is our State CYLA Chairman this year and has done an outstanding job. The First Place CYLA award for each boy and girl has been raised to \$5,000.00 each this year. Our Youth Program Director, continues to find outstanding students that have been recognized by the Supreme Council in International Competitions. The State of Louisiana is proud to have the Champion of the 2018-2019 International Soccer Challenge, Katherine Bergeron, representing

and support a Columbian Squires Circle which can be a future source of membership and Ladies Auxiliary. The committee recommends the promoting of young members and make officers and active members promote young ideas. "Turn over the power". Make the KC's a place for young and old to blend and provide babysitters whenever possible. The committee also recommends that all councils send out bulletins monthly or quarterly, and that copies of the bulletin or newsletter be sent to five councils in the state, on a random basis, for the purpose of spreading and stimulating new ideas.

INSURANCE

In view of our Founder Father Michael J. McGivney's purpose to form a Fraternal Benefit Society so that the widows and children of members in the group when the member dies would not find themselves in dire financial straights, Knights of Columbus Insurance was instituted. As the insurance program not only provides this coverage but also helps to finance many of the programs of the Knights of Columbus, we encourage all members to become insurance members, especially State and Council leaders. The committee recommends that all councils have adequate liability insurance as recommended by Supreme.

PROTOCOL

The committee recommends that members of the clergy and Knights of Columbus State Family and officers be properly recognized as to their titles or positions at all Knights of Columbus meetings and functions. Also, we remind members of all the important aspects of protocol as explained in the protocol booklet. The committee also recommends that the State Officers reinstate the policy of visiting subordinate councils and protocol be strictly adhered to.

SERVICE MENTALLY HANDICAPPED CITIZENS

The Louisiana Knights of Columbus are to be complimented for the tremendous support of the annual statewide fund raising program benefiting the learning impaired. Each council is called upon to continue this important work and to utilize to the fullest the involvement of families, Boy Scouts, Columbian Squires and Ladies Auxiliaries in the fund raising campaign. The committee recommends that councils use publicity to promote the Knight of Columbus donations by secular and religious newspapers. It is recommended that councils become more involved with activities of the learning impaired citizens at the local level and present the funds to them in a personal manner. The committee also urges councils to actively support the Special Olympics Program, as well as St. Mary's Training Facility in Alexandria.

SUPPORT OF THE ELDERLY AND INFIRMED

The committee urges each council to become actively involved in providing support for the elderly and infirmed citizens of our communities through such activities as weekly or monthly bingos at the retirement or health care facility, also Christmas-Thanksgiving Dinners, sponsoring Masses and communion services at the facility or just plain visitations. The committee also recommends that councils try to promote these programs at all times of the year, not only holidays and special occasions.

CONCLUSION

The committee urges all councils to implement to the fullest extent, the foregoing recommendations. In order to obtain the fullest implementation of these recommendations, the <u>committee urges the State Deputy to insure that all councils receive and display</u> a copy of this report, and that a summary of this report be published in the July/August issue of the <u>LOUISIANA KNIGHT</u>. As a chairman of the Good of the Order committee, I would like to thank all committee members for their attendance, input, and participation at our meeting Saturday morning. I would also like to thank the State Deputy for the privilege of serving on this committee.

Additionally, the State of Louisiana is proud to have the winner of the International Catholic Citizenship Essay Contest, Emily Landry, representing Council 12163 in Lafayette and the second runner-up in the International Catholic Citizenship Essay Contest, Blake Broussard, representing Council 3054 in Galliano. The State Council has been represented extremely well in the past by producing Supreme Council International winners in many competitions. We continue to offer the Youth Programs and Competitions in the future. All of the mentioned programs would not be possible without the funding provided by our Youth Expansion Program.

A New Program has been developed and implemented this year call the Catholic School Tuition Assistance Lottery Program. This program is eligible to all students attending Catholic School who are children of Knights of Columbus in Louisiana. This has been a very successful program and growing throughout the year, as it promotes Catholic school tuition assistance, Membership recruitment and Membership participation in Council Activities. We have attributed numerous Membership recruitments as a result of this new program. This Program is also funded through YEP.

The State Council has also coordinated the following Fraternal events: Golf, Horse Shoes, Bowling, Texas Hold Em, Disc Golf, Corn Hole Toss and a Nine-Ball Pool Tournament. Ralph Comeaux is our Council Director this year and has done a great job with these events.

A big challenge this year was the initiative to reduce our State Council Overhead. The State Council no longer has employees employed to perform administrative functions for the State Council and now has a contractual arrangement with Robert Boudreaux, our State Administrator, to provide services on a monthly basis. Robert provides support for all of our State Meetings and State Convention as well as many other administrative needs throughout the year. Organization and attention to details is paramount to a successful event and Robert has risen to the challenge.

The Insurance General Agents and Field Agents have been supportive of the State Council Initiatives throughout this Columbian Year. I would like to thank Dan Cabirac, Dustin Dean and Mickey Dougherty for their unwavering support. Whenever they have been asked for advice, resources or manpower to support an initiative or event, they have responded in a positive manner with assistance to make the initiative or event a success.

The Fourth Degree this fraternal year has appointed a new District Master for Louisiana, Don Ducote. Sir Knight Donald and I have worked together to foster growth in the Third and Fourth Degrees and to ensure unity between Councils and Assemblies. Don has traveled to many of our Major Degrees, Meetings and Events to promote the Fourth Degree and has held promotional meetings and exemplifications throughout the year.

Eligible children must be attending a Catholic school (Pre-Kindergarten thru 12th Grade) for the 2019-2020 school year. There is one more drawing that occur on July 20, 2019 and applications can be found on our state website and submitted up until the time of the drawings. The new application for 2019-20 fraternal year will be posted on our state website on July 21, 2012.
