PROCEEDINGS

FIRST DAY'S SESSION

At 10:40 a.m., Saturday, May 3, 2008, State Deputy Donald Fontenot called to order the 103rd Annual Meeting of the Louisiana State Council, Knights of Columbus, in the Pntchartrain Center, Kenner. Upon the State Deputy's direction, State Warden Ronnie Boudreaux and his assistants, having pre-determined the fact, reported that all in the council chamber have been verified and were in possession of a current KC membership card. State Deputy Fontenot then called upon Msgr. Joseph Susi, State Chaplain, to lead the assembly in the opening prayer.

The State Deputy then requested the assembly to remain standing for the posting of the national colors, followed by the pledge of allegiance to the flag, conducted by Master Tim Boudreaux.

In opening remarks, State Deputy Fontenot states "we would like to take this opportunity on behalf of Brother Donald Ducote and Brother Knights of the New Orleans area in welcoming you to the 103rd Annual Meeting of the Louisiana State Council." Mr. Fontenot went on to welcome all clergy in attendance.

State Deputy then recognized the Past State Deputies in attendance.

Brother Fontenot then called on State Advocate John Boudreaux to review the rules of the 103rd Annual Meeting. Mr. Boudreaux reviewed all rules and also commented that the rules had been published in the *Louisiana Knight*. Brother Boudreaux then moved for acceptance of the printed rules. The motion was seconded by Henry Sobon, Council 3246, Metairie.

State Deputy Fontenot then formally announced the appointment of Honorable Paul J. deMahy, St. Martinville, as Convention Parliamentarian. Judge deMahy gave a few remarks on the rules and instructions about being a delegate and visiting knights. He then explained the process of the elections.

The State Deputy then called upon State Secretary Ben Davidson for the presentation of the Temporary Roll. Davidson explained the procedure for conducting the Temporary Roll Call will be in effect until the Permanent Roll is developed and presented by the Credentials Committee and approved by the State Council. The State Secretary then moved to accept these records as the Temporary Roll Call of the State Council Meeting and seconded by Richard Vidrine, Council 6958, Carencro.

Since appointments to convention committees are well displayed on the convention bulletin board located in the foyer by the Registration Desk and since these appointees were notified by personal letters, State Deputy Fontenot announced that these appointments would not be read unless he was requested to do so by the assembly, and if an appointee is replaced at the convention by his alternate, then the alternate shall serve on the committee.

These appointments are found on pages 19-20.

The State Deputy then called upon State Secretary Davidson for the presentation of the minutes of the last State Council Meeting. The State Secretary moved that due to the length of these minutes, that the minutes be referred to the Minutes Committee without reading them. The motion was seconded by John Nowak, Council 13632, Baton Rouge.

State Deputy Fontenot then recognized Anthony L. Franchina, Council 4663, Metairie, Chairman of the Minutes Committee for his committee's report. Upon his conclusion, Brother Picard moved for the acceptance of the minutes committee report. The motion was seconded by Nolan Leblanc, Council 1087, Donaldsonville.

The complete report of the Minutes Committee can be found on page 790.

The State Deputy moved to close the open session to conduct business outside the normal scope of the third degree. The motion was seconded by Harry Domingue, Council 10745, Cankton. Business conducted included Squires, Louisiana Knight Foundation and Bishop Greco Foundation. These reports can be found in the reports section.

The convention was reconvened at 11:35am

Being recognized for this purpose, State Deputy Fontenot then announced that a number of communications have been received. He moved

that these communications be referred to the Felicitations Committee without reading and/or debate. This motion was seconded by J.C. Dugas, Council 1276, St. Martinville. The report of the Felicitations Committee can be found on pages 62-63.

At this time, the State Deputy then called for reports of State Officers. He requested State Secretary Ben Davidson assume the chair for the purpose of introducing the State Deputy, and requesting his rendering of the State Deputy Report. State Deputy Fontenot then presented his report, encompassing the myriad of activities, projects, programs, and undertakings of Columbianism in the Louisiana Jurisdiction during the past fraternal year. Upon completion of that report, the State Deputy was accorded a standing ovation from the State Council. Gerald Marse, Council 2436, Reserve, moved for the adoption of the report. Henry Sobon, Council 3246, Metairie, seconded the motion, and the motion carried unanimously. The complete report of the State Deputy is reproduced in these proceedings beginning on page 21.

State Secretary Davidson then requested that the State Deputy again assume the chair and this was accomplished. State Deputy Fontenot then called upon State Secretary Ben Davidson, Council 3407, Shreveport, to render his report and recognized him for this purpose. The State Secretary then rendered a detailed report to the assembly. Upon his conclusion, Davidson moved that the report be received with thanks, and it be referred to the appropriate committees. The motion to adopt the report was made by Raphael Sanabia, Jr., Council 13145, Baton Rouge, and was seconded by Edmond Twohig, Council 3407, Shreveport. The motion carried unanimously. Reproduced in these proceedings, the State Secretary report as of June 30, 2008, begins on page 30.

The report of the State Treasurer was then called for by the State Deputy, who recognized State Treasurer Earl Bulot for that purpose. State Treasurer Bulot presented his report, stating that the report to be reproduced in the minutes of this convention would be as of June 30, 2007. When he concluded his report, Bulot moved for its acceptance and reference to appropriate committees. Carl McGee, Council 8058, Carylss, moved to adopt the report, and it was seconded by Paul McKeough, Council 969, Baton Rouge. The motion carried without dissent. The full report of the State Treasurer, as of June 30, 2008, can be found in these minutes beginning on page 35.

The State Deputy then called for the report of the State Advocate John Boudreaux, Council 7557, Broussard. The State Advocate report was read and upon its conclusion moved for the acceptance of his report. Jimmy Bordelon, Council 1217, Marksville, moved for the adoption of the report. Seconded by Thomas Canizaro, Jr., Council 1337, Monroe, the motion unanimously carried. Reproduction of these minutes appear in this report beginning on page 40.

State Deputy Fontenot then called for the report of the State Warden, recognizing State Warden Ronnie Boudreaux, Council 10902, New Iberia, for this purpose. State Warden Boudreaux presented his report and upon its conclusion, he moved for its acceptance. The motion for acceptance was then presented by Dennis Cass, Council 2878, Metairie, and was seconded by Michael Arabie, Council 12060, Thibodaux. The motion carried without dissent. The report of the State Warden can be found starting on page 42.

Calling for the report of the State Office Administrator, the State Deputy then recognized Robert Boudreaux, Council 3202, Lafayette, for this purpose. The State Office Administrator then rendered his report. Upon its completion, Franklin Jones, Council 3015, Sulphur, moved for its adoption and reference to appropriate committees. Seconded by Ernest Theriot, Council 5352, Pierre Part-Belle River. The motion carried unanimously. The full report of the State Office Administrator is reproduced in these proceedings, beginning on page 44.

State Deputy Fontenot then called for the report of the Master of the Fourth Degree, recognizing Master Tim Boudreaux, Council 10902, New Iberia, for this purpose. Master Boudreaux presented his report and upon its conclusion, he moved for its acceptance. The motion for acceptance was then presented by Lester Waguespack, Council 6211, Bayou Vista, and was seconded by Wade Dupuis, Counckl 2398, Breax Bridge. The motion carried without dissent. The report of the Master can be found starting on page 137.

Having completed receipt of reports of state officers, State Deputy Fontenot then called for the submission of any resolutions not yet submitted for action. He explained that there was no need to read the resolutions but merely submit them to the State Advocate. He explained further that any resolutions submitted after this point would need the approval of the convention's delegates to be considered for action thereon.

Proceeding to the receipt of convention committees, State Deputy Fontenot called for the report of the Audit Committee and recognized Grand Knight George S. Martin, Council 7557, Broussard, committee chairman, for this purpose. Brother Martin rendered the full report and having completed the report moved for its adoption. Seconded by Karl Guidry, Council 10293, Lafayette, and the motion carried. The Audit Committee report may be found on page 48.

The State Deputy then called for the report of the Memorials Committee and recognized Grand Knight Ronald J. Blanchard, Council 3091, Westwego, for this purpose. Blanchard presented the committee report and moved for its adoption. Seconded by Nolan Leblanc, Council 1087, Donaldsonville, the motion carried. The Memorials Committee report begins on page 70.

Calling for the report of the Felicitations Committee, the State Deputy recognized Grand Knight Karl J. Robichaux, Council 10455, Baton Rouge, for this purpose. Robichaux presented the committee report and moved for its adoption. Seconded by Rufus Nelands, Council 3208, Lake Charles, the motion carried without dissent. The Felicitation Committee report is reproduced in these minutes and begins on page 62.

The State Deputy then called for the Good of the Order Report. The State Deputy recognized Grand Knight Ronald J. Folse, Council 8770, Maurice, Committee Chairman for that purpose. Grand Knight Folse presented the committee report and moved for acceptance, and Blake Leblanc, Council 6389, St. Amant, seconded. The motion carried without dissent. The report of the Good of the Order Committee is reproduced in these minutes and begins on page 64. The committee also recommended all future committee members be sent the entire "good of the order" resolution prior to convention.

Under "special orders" of the State Council's By-Laws, in Section 6:1, the State Deputy then called for nomination for officers of the State Council and representative and alternate representatives of the State Council to the Annual Supreme Council Meeting. With the new balloting and counting procedure, all nominations will also be closed on the first day. He explained that our by-laws allow a maximum of three minutes for making a nomination and that nominations shall not be seconded. Fontenot emphasized that all nominators must submit a written report of their respective nominees' names along with mailing addresses, council numbers and

membership numbers to the State Secretary; and if the nomination is for State Deputy or insurance representative, a Knights of Columbus insurance certificate number of the nominee must also be provided in the written report. The State Deputy further advised that the ballots would list candidates in alphabetical order. Besides those Knights of Columbus already entitled to the floor, any third degree member in good standing can be granted the privileges of the floor for the purpose of submitting a nomination; however, such action must be approved by the assembly. Printed nomination forms are available at the State Secretary's Registration Desk. Fontenot then opened the floor for nomination for State Officers and the following nominations were received:

State Advocate Boudreaux then explained the purpose and intent of Resolution Number 9.

The State Deputy then announced that "nominations are now closed." State Deputy Fontenot then moved that all nominees for the offices of insurance and/or associate delegate to the 2008 Supreme Council Meeting be hereby accepted as nominees for alternate representatives in their respective categories and be it further moved that after the elected representatives in each category, the next four candidates in descending vote position in each category be deemed elected as the alternate representative. Karl Guidry, Council 10293, Lafayette, seconded the motion and the the proposal was accepted unanimously.

State Deputy Fontenot then made announcements and urged all in attendance to be prompt for the 5:00pm Convention Vigil Mass and to remain until all Ministers of the Mass have proceeded out of the chamber. Fontenot then called upon Msgr. Joseph Susi, State Chaplain to offer a closing prayer.

State Deputy Don Fontenot then recessed the convention at 2:52pm.

SECOND DAY'S SESSION

State Deputy Donald Fontenot called to order at 9:06am the second day of the 103rd Annual Meeting of the Louisiana State Council, Knights of Columbus. After State Warden Ronnie Boudreaux and his assistants had verified that all in the chamber were in possession of a current K.C. Membership Card. State Chaplain Msgr. Joseph Susi led the assembly in the opening prayer. The State Deputy then asked Master Tim Boudreaux to lead the body in the Pledge of Allegiance.

The State Deputy asked State Chaplain to remain at the podium to render his remarks to the convention.

The State Deputy then called State Secretary Ben Davidson to the podium to begin the procedures for certifying the Permanent Rolls of this State Council Meeting. During the collection of these Permanent Rolls, State Deputy Fontenot called on Elections Committee Advisor, PSD David Bakeler to instruct the delegates on the procedure for completion of the ballot and also instructed his committee to prepare the ballot box. Upon completion of balloting, State Deputy Fontenot ordered Elections Committee to seize the ballot box and to retire to tally votes. The State Secretary then completed his report of the Credentials Committee and he moved for its adoption. Larry Comeaux, Council 8901, Lafayette, seconded the motion and the report carried unanimously. The full report of the Credentials Committee along with the Permanent Roll of the Annual Meeting is found in these proceedings beginning on page 52.

The State Deputy then recognized the three (3) "Most Improved Councils" for the previous fraternal year. They were:

The State Deputy then distributed "Top 20" Certificates to those councils finishing in the top of the State Deputy scoring.

State Deputy Don Fontenot, with the assistance of YEP Chairman, Joel Ocmand, presented certificates to all councils who had made their YEP Quota for the year.

State Deputy Fontenot then called upon Youth Expansion Program Chairman Ocmand to render his report. In making his report, Chairman Ocmand emphasized that his report, as it will appear in the proceedings of this meeting, will be inclusive of all receipts through June 30, 2008. He urged councils not yet participating in the YEP to date, to please do so, prior to that June 30th closing date.

Brother Ocmand then thanked everyone for their great support of the offertory at both Masses and moved for the adoption of the YEP Report. Jimmy Saltzman, Council 11407, Grand Lake, then seconded the motion, and the report was accepted by acclamation. The complete YEP report may be found beginning on page 143.

Returning to the receipt of Convention Committee reports, the State Advocate was then called upon, as Chairman of the Resolutions Committee, to present the committee report and then explained that when the report reached the point of calling for action on the specific resolutions, the chairman would read the purpose and resolved clauses of the resolution and then read the recommendation of the resolution committee. "Your silence would indicate your agreement with that recommendation in which case I will rap the gavel indicating that the recommendation of the Resolutions Committee is adopted," the State Deputy announced. "If you wish action other than the committee's recommendation, appropriate motions, seconds, discussion and action are in order," he concluded. He then recognized the Committee Chairman who explained that he would read the purpose of the resolution, then read the resolved clauses, then read the recommendations of the Elected State Officers, that of the Advisory Board, and the recommendation of the Resolutions Committee, and if necessary, the rationale of the committee's recommendation. Floor action would be on the recommendation of the resolutions committee. Utilizing this procedure, the chairman then presented the resolutions committee report, and upon its completion, Brother John Boudreaux moved for its adoption. Carl McGee, Council 8058, Carlyss, seconded and the motion carried. The report of the Resolutions Committee can be found beginning on page 80.

For the purpose of rendering his committee report, State Treasurer Earl Bulot, Chairman of the Budget & Finance Committee, was recognized. Chairman Bulot presented the committee's report. Brother Bulot

moved for its adoption and was seconded by Bruce Nicolosi, Council 4663, Metairie. The complete text of this committee report is found in these minutes beginning on page 49.

The State Deputy then recognized Grand Knight Jimmie R. Bordelon, Council 1217, Marksville, Chairman of the Elections Committee for his committee report. Brother Bordelon, rendered his report and then moved for its adoption. It was so moved, seconded by Patrick Lancon, Council 11792, New Iberia, and carried. The full report of the Elections Committee is found in these proceedings on pages 60.

The State Deputy then called upon 2009 Convention Chairman Edmond Twohig for introductions and comments pertaining to next years convention in Shreveport.

The newly elected State Deputy, State Secretary, State Treasurer, State Advocate and State Warden then rendered closing comments. State Deputy Fontenot commended the attendees still in attendance and reminded councils scoring sheets could be claimed at the conclusion of the meeting.

State Chaplain Msgr. Joseph Susi led the delegation in the closing prayer.

State Deputy Fontenot then adjourned the 103rd Annual Meeting of the Louisiana State Council, Knights of Columbus at 11:58am.



MEMBERSHIP & NEW COUNCIL DEVELOPMENT

IN CONCLUSION



The debts of the INACTIVE COUNCILS have been forgiven through prior action by the State Deputy and all future Per-Capita billings will cease until reactivation occurs.

All checks written for the State Council are prepared using computer software: Quicken Deluxe 2004. This program allows for the elimination of ledgers used for balancing the records of the State Secretary and presents an easy and legible printout of checks prepared and provides a cumulative total for year to date figures. The State Deputy, State Secretary and State Treasurer are authorized to sign the checks. As State Secretary I prepare and sign the checks, the State Treasurer counter signs and mail the checks. The checks with the address printed by the Quicken program are mailed using window envelopes.

A reconciliation of the State Secretary's records was made as of June 30, 2008 with those of the State Treasurer. The records of the two financial officers were found to be in agreement in all aspects.

For the past fraternal year, I served as Secretary for the Bishop Charles P. Greco Memorial Trust. Chairman David Bakeler will render a report on this fund.

My thoughts and prayers continue for my Brother Knights and their families as they continue to recovery from Katrina and Rita. It is my hope that they will fully recover and can return to a normal life. May God bless and keep you all.

I would like to thank you for allowing me to serve as your State Secretary this past year. This has been most rewarding for me. I have learned the many duties as State Secretary. I have tried to explain the Per Capita Tax billing process, dates billed and deadlines to the Councils. I hope that I have merited your trust and confidence with the job that I have done this past year.

To my State Deputy and Brother Don, I "Thank You" for your support, guidance and friendship this past year. To my fellow elected State Officers Earl, John, Ronnie and Members of the State Family it has been a pleasure to serve you. You have been very helpful and ready to assist me

whenever I have asked for help or advice.

A special "Thanks" to the State Office Administrator, Robert Boudreaux and the staff, Susan and Gloria, for all of their help and assistance they have given me this past year.

To my loving wife Emma, I can't thank you enough for all of your love, support and prayers that you have given me this past year. The many miles you have traveled with me this past year, as you made these trips much more enjoyable. Thank you for always being at my side. May God bless you always.

Emma and I appreciate the many invitations and warm hospitality extended to us. We regret that we were not able to accept many of them, due to other commitments, church, or family obligations. Please continue to include us in your functions and on your mailing list. We do enjoy reading and hearing what our Councils across the State are doing.

State Treasurer Report

To: The Officers and Delegates to the 103rd Annual Meeting of the Louisiana Jurisdiction of the Knights of Columbus, assembled in Kenner, Louisiana on May 2nd, 3rd and 4th, 2008.

In accordance with Section 7.2 of the By-Laws of the Louisiana State Council, it is an honor for me to present the Annual Report of the State Treasurer to my Brothers of the Louisiana Jurisdiction for the Fraternal Year 2007-2008.

Serving the past two years as State Treasurer has not only been a rewarding opportunity but an experience that enhanced my knowledge of the financial principals in place by the State Council This learning experience has been invaluable. It gave me an opportunity to experience a level of service to the Knights of Columbus that will serve me throughout life, as well as My Brothers in the Great State of Louisiana in the future.

The accounting procedures established for handling the funds of the State Council are sound and have tremendous internal controls.

The State Council has four checking accounts that are balanced monthly by the State Treasurer. They are: General Fund Checking, Youth Expansion Current Checking, Acompano Checking, and the Exemplification Fund Checking Account.

The State Council maintains eleven trust accounts: General Fund Trust, YEP Current Trust, YEP Fund Raiser Trust, Exemplification Trust, General Fund Unallocated Trust, YEP Unallocated Trust, Fourth Degree Trust, Louisiana Knights Foundation Trust, Benefit Reserve Trust, Disaster Relief Trust and Convention Reserve Trust. These accounts are monitored and reports are given on the earnings monthly. Made also by the State Treasurer is every effort to insure that the maximum amount remains in each account for the maximum return on interest.

All monies are received by the State Secretary, and then forwarded to the State Treasurer for deposit and posting to the proper fund. The voucher system is used for all disbursement of funds. The voucher is prepared by the State Deputy and sent to the State Secretary for recording and production of checks. The State Secretary then forwards the voucher along with the checks to the State Treasurer for action. The State Treasurer records this activity in the monthly accounting system of the State Council; he then signs and mails the checks to the appropriate

parties. All checks issued are required to have the signature of two of the following: State Deputy, State Secretary, and/or State Treasurer.

The State Treasurer records all receipts and expenditures to the financial accounting records using the different accounts and prepares a report of all accounts for review of the Elected State Officers, the Immediate Past State Deputy, the State Office Administrator, and the independent auditors office after the end of each month. Bank statements are also reconciled to the accounting records for checking and trust accounts.

Copies of the reconciled statements are forwarded to the State Deputy and State Secretary at the end of each month.

In accordance with the provisions of the by-laws of the Louisiana State Council, I herby submit my annual report as your State Office Administrator for your consideration.

I would like to thank State Deputy Donald Fontenot for his support as State Deputy, under the moniker of Invest, Promote & Communicate. His dedication to the Order is unique, and his desire to see each council succeed is unparralled. It has been a pleasure serving him these past two years.

Susan Camel and myself create the support staff for the State Council and I stand before you today, to assure the State Family you can not find any more dedicated individuals.

As I have mentioned in all past convention reports, the State Office is involved, to some degree, in almost every undertaking of the State Council. I am quite confident the reports of your elected and appointed officials will discuss details, thus I will limit my remarks to specific responsibilities of your State Office.

State Officers Meetings/KCLS/Grand Knights Day

It is the responsibility of this office to prepare ALL printed material for these meetings, and through the help of brother knights at the meeting sites, this important information is distributed during these conferences. A constant concern however, would be the NO SHOWS. The 140 to 180 councils who fail to participate in one or all of these meetings, drive the cost of operating these meetings higher, as we are forced to mail this same literature to the absent councils at the conclusion of each meeting.

In recent SOM and Grand Knights Day, the State Office has prepared and facilitated Power Point Presentations for the use of meeting presenters. It is the intent of this office to make presentations more interesting for the audience and essentially making the presentation an item meeting goers will retain and take back to their membership.

State Directory

The current directory included all the changes in the updated state family and we have attempted to publish all corrections in the *Louisiana Knight*., as well as our state website. We have been updating information as it has been provided throughout the year. Timely distribution of the directory is contingent on councils providing the necessary information on a timely basis as well. Once again, we will ask District Deputies to assist the State Office in accumulating this pertinent information. This year directories were distributed in early September, and I would like to thank all District Deputies and Area Coordinators, who helped to expedite the process.

Our plan is to continue to include e-mail addresses in future publications of the State Directory. Our hope and goal is for every state officer to have an email account, and within the very near future, every council with an email address.

The State Office has placed the directory on line, thus making it an up-to-date source of information.

The Louisiana Knight

As is the standing promise, The Louisiana Knight will attempt to publish every article sent by local councils. I would encourage you to send local information. Articles and pictures that deal with items with a state final may have little opportunity of making it to the pages of the Louisiana Knight.

Of note, the *Louisiana Knight* now publishes only four times per year. Also, budget cuts has forced the reduction of issues and the production process. For future reference, the *Louisiana Knight* will publish on the last THURSDAY of the months of March, June, September and December. The deadline for submitting articles and photos will be the 15th of the publication month.

Unfortunately, with less issues, some items may not make the pages of the *Louisiana Knight*, and for that, I apologize. But as mentioned above, we will make every attempt to publish local informative articles.

Athletic Bids

Of note, the 2008 State Bowling Tournament was hosted by the State Council and the State Basketball Tournament was co-hosted by the State Council and Council 9347, and the profit realized is being used to fund the Louisiana State Council Office. The 2008 State Free Throw

Contest was also hosted by the State Council, and was a break-even event.

Lee Roy has volunteered to manage the web site at no cost to the State Council, as this retired brother knight has the time and is willing to constantly update our site to make it a wealth of information for the brother knights.

As many of you may know, a web site will only remain popular, if you are constantly making changes and updating information. And with the commitment of Mr. Cates is unbelievable. Our hope is that the web site will more than compensate for the fewer issues of the *Louisiana Knight*.

Our plan for the web site to include ALL forms utilized by councils on the state and supreme level is ongoing. Many of these forms are now interactive. Also, we encourage councils to submit items for our website electronic calendar. That includes any event you would like to have posted. Please send your entries to staff@louisianakc.org, and we will be happy to include your event on the state calendar.

Budget & Finance Committee Report

To: The Officers and Members of the 103nd Annual Meeting of the Louisiana State Council Knights of Columbus assembled in Kenner, Louisiana. In accordance with Section 19 Committee on Budget and Finance of the By Laws of The Louisiana State Council Knights of Columbus the following report is presented.

On March 8th, 2008 the Elected State Officers and Past State Deputies met to discuss the proposed Budget for the 2008-2009 Columbian year. A copy of the previous year's budget and the income/expense through December 31, 2007 were furnished to this group in advance, for their preparation for this meeting.

The proposed Budget was submitted to the Elected State Officers and Past State Deputies at the Advisory Board Meeting on March 8th, 2008. The Past State Deputies offered their views and changes or comments that were then incorporated into the proposed Budget.

After this meeting, according to the By-Laws of the State Council, two copies were mailed by the State Office administrator to all Councils of record.

The Budget and Finance Committee meeting was held on Friday, May 2nd, 2008 in the Pontchartrain Center Rivertown II Room in Kenner, Louisiana at 4:00 PM. This meeting was for the purpose of continuing the review of the proposed Budget.

Included in this review of the proposed Budget for the Louisiana State Council was: General Fund; Youth Expansion Funds; Youth Expansion Fund Raiser, Acompano Fund Raiser; State Council Office Operations; and Investment Transactions.

By accomplishing this task – the committee on the Budget and Finance has complied with the State Council By-Laws-Section 19-Committee on Budget and Finance.

The Committee took into account that the Proposed Budget carried the approval of the State Deputy and the Elected State Officers. Prior approval was given by the Advisory Board of Past State Deputies at their meeting in March 2008. Based on the review of the Budget and Finances of the State Council, the Budget and Finance Committee offers the following recommendations to you for your considerations here today.

I would ask that the Budget and Finance Committee please come and join me.

- 1. The Committee recommends that the State Council continue to perform an audit of the funds of the Louisiana State Council with the Committee of three (3) Past State Deputies, (3) seated Grand Knights, the State Financial Officers and up to (2) two at large members to oversee the audit.
- 2. The State Per-Capita Tax should stay the same as outlined in the Budget Proposal
- 3. The Acompano Raffle should continue to assist with the funding of the Acompano program.
- 4. Due to the uncertainty of receipts for the 2008-2009 Youth expansion Program Budget. The Committee recommends that the following: If total income for the 2008-2009 Fund Raiser does not equal budgeted income, selected Accounts will be decreased with the approval of the Elected State Officers. If funds exceed budget, selected accounts will share in the increased gain with the approval of the Elected State Officers.
- 5. Excess Funds in the General Fund and YEP be placed in existing investment accounts. Any shortfall resulting in the General Fund Budget: funds may be transferred from the General Fund Unallocated (G30.0 General Fund Unallocated) with the concurrence of the State Officers.
- 6. The State Treasurer presented a review of the investment account for the Louisiana State Council. Based on this report, the committee recommends continuing with Capital One Bank Trust Group and requests every effort continues to optimize interest on investments.
- 7. Since the 2008-2009 Budget was mailed to each Delegate to the State Council Meeting—the Budget and Finance Committee recommends discontinuing the line item reading.
- 8. A final Financial Statement as of June 30th, be distributed to each council of record by no later than August 31st of the same year.

Worthy State Deputy – the committee on Budget and Finance moves for the adoption of these line items before concluding this report.

Items 1 – 8 ADOPTION

The committee agrees that the Budgets for the General Fund, Youth Expansion Fund, Youth Expansion Fund Raiser for 2009-2010, Acompano Fund Raiser for 2008-2009, Exemplification Fund, the Investment Transactions and the State Council Office Operation will be included in the minutes of this State Council Meeting.

Good of the Order Committee Report

To: The Officers and Members of the 103rd Annual Meeting of the Louisiana State Council held in Kenner, La.

Your committee on the Good of the Order met on Friday, May 2, 2008, and fully discussed at length the following activity areas. After due deliberation, the committee urges all council, district and state leaders to see that the following recommendations are fully implemented.

The committee would also ask that at future conventions, each member of the Good of the Order Committee, as appointed, be forwarded a copy of the previous year's Good of the Order report to prepare committee members as to what is to be discussed.

FIRST AND FOREMOST WE ARE CATHOLIC

The committee recommends the recitation of the Serran Prayer for Vocations at each council meeting and that the council chaplain should encourage the recitation of this prayer at all Masses. The committee further recommends that a prayer be offered at each council meeting for the beatification of our founder Father Michael J. McGivney. The council chaplain should be encouraged to be actively involved in council activities. In the absence of the council Chaplain, a deacon shall be asked to bring the message of our faith. The committee urges all councils to participate in the Refund Support Vocations Program (RSVP). Each council should consider sponsoring a speaker on vocations to the various parochial schools. Recognizing that some clergy may still be apprehensive to Knights of Columbus involvement, the committee recommends each council strongly consider implementation of the Parish Round Table Program and thus show evidence of our belief that VOCATIONS ARE OUR BUSINESS and that each Grand Knight has a dialogue with each Pastor of churches in his council area. Each council should consider having a speaker on evangelization, to encourage each member to promote the Catholic faith to non-Catholics, and to help fallen-away Catholics to become again active in the Church. One way this can be done effectively is by supporting evangelization through the RCIA program.

PRO-LIFE

The committee recommends increased efforts from the state level to provide more timely and specific information to the council level about upcoming activities such as Pro-Life Rallies. The committee encourages area, district and local Right to Life Masses and demonstrations. It is also recommended that continued active exposure to the public by each council be pursued. The committee encourages each council to construct a monument to the unborn in a prominent place, preferably on the church grounds and those that have one to maintain and have programs to bring Pro-Life to parishioners attention. We urge right-to-life education, to fight abortion, and specific projects. Such an enforcement by members and Grand Knights of letter writing campaigns from council members of state and federal governing bodies. We also urge the use of the vast amount of material that is available about the AIDS Virus, and promoting abstinence and chastity as a way of decreasing the threat of AIDS as well as decreasing abortions and moral decay.

The committee also recommends that councils become involved with local Right-To-Life organizations by way of participating in their events and getting on their mailing lists. The committee urges use of material available to them from the Supreme Council pertaining to Pro-Life. The committee also urges members to fight pornography at the council, family and school levels. The committee further recommends that the State Council provide updated information of current Federal and State legislation on Pro-Life and Euthanasia.

Each council appoints a Pro-Life Chairman or Chair-Couple. Each council supports a youth Pro-Life Retreat as sponsored by the State Council. Each council offer a Pro-Life prayer at business meetings.

BISHOP GRECO MEMORIAL FUND

The committee recommends that all councils use the memorial cards to memorialize deceased council members. The card can be filled in with the name of the deceased and the name of the donating council. The card is mailed to the member's family. A donation of \$25.00 is then sent to the Greco Foundation for the trust fund.

The committee also recommends that councils make a voluntary contribution of \$1.00 per member, on an annual basis, to the Bishop Greco Memorial Fund..

RETREATS

The committee recommends that each council have a guest speaker with Catholic Retreats as the subject, and that each council schedule retreats for its members, individual as well as couples, encouraging husband and wife retreats whenever offered.

FAMILY INVOLVEMENT

The committee recommends continual family involvement in council activities. The committee also recommends each council have a monthly Family Communion. The committee strongly recommends that widows of deceased council members be included and recognized in every aspect of the council's life and activity. This committee further recommends that the council members make themselves available to provide assistance to widows and receive a copy of the council news letter and provide transportation if needed.

YOUTH EXPANSION PROGRAM

The committee urges each council to actively support the Youth Expansion Program by annually exceeding it's YEP quota, and by involvement in a youth organization such as Columbian Squires, Boy or Girl Scouts and/or Catholic Youth Organization (CYO). The committee recommends that all members in each council be asked to make a personal contribution to our Youth Expansion Program and councils should not depend on fundraisers only. Each council should consider either making it a part of the dues or adding to their billing a \$10.00 voluntary contribution by each member. The committee recommends that all councils participate in the CYLA Program and that efforts be made to properly recognize the applicants and winners on the council level. The committee further recommends continued financial support of YEP.

SUBSTANCE ABUSE-HEALTH SERVICES

The committee recommends each council sponsor an educational program on substance abuse by the law enforcement agencies to local junior and senior high schools. The committee urges all Knights to recognize local, state and federal law enforcement agencies. The committee further recommends that councils establish blood donation drives, Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) training programs and community blood pressure surveys.

FRATERNAL MEMBERSHIP-NEW COUNCIL DEVELOPMENT

The committee wishes to compliment the first degree and major degree teams in the Louisiana Jurisdiction for their excellent exemplifications which act as catalysts in encouraging all councils to obtain new, active members. The committee wishes to remind all members that it is our Supreme Council's desire that we have a KC presence in every church parish and that we should aid all efforts to form a new council or a Parish Round Table. It is also recommended that all members proposing new members into our Order assume responsibility for insuring the first-degree member receives his major degree as soon as possible, and remains an active member. Also, we congratulate all councils that sponsor a first degree teams and we strongly recommend that every council make an attempt to establish a team, and that all ceremonials be performed with the proper dignity. The committee recommends that every council make an effort to bring in new members, but that no less effort be expended to retain the members they now have. Council leaders and members should promote patriotism and encourage members of the third degree to join the fourth degree. Councils should make an effort to form and support a Columbian Squires Circle which can be a future source of membership and Ladies Auxiliary. The committee recommends the promoting of young members and make officers and active members promote young ideas. "Turn over the power". Make the KC's a place for young and old to blend and provide babysitters whenever possible. The committee also recommends that all councils send out bulletins monthly or quarterly, and that copies of the bulletin or newsletter be sent to five councils in the state, on a random basis, for the purpose of spreading and stimulating new ideas.

INSURANCE

In view of our Founder Father Michael J. McGivney's purpose to form a Fraternal Benefit Society so that the widows and children of members in the group when the member dies would not find themselves in dire financial straights, Knights of Columbus Insurance was instituted. As the insurance program not only provides this coverage but also helps to finance many of the programs of the Knights of Columbus, we encourage all members to become insurance members, especially State and Council leaders. The committee recommends that all councils make sure that they have adequate liability insurance as recommended by Supreme.

PROTOCOL

The committee recommends that members of the clergy and Knights of Columbus State Family and officers be properly recognized as to their titles or positions at all Knights of Columbus meetings and functions. Also, we remind members of all the important aspects of protocol as explained in the protocol booklet. The committee also recommends that the State Officers reinstate the policy of visiting subordinate councils and protocol be strictly adhered to.

SERVICE MENTALLY HANDICAPPED CITIZENS

The Louisiana Knights of Columbus are to be complimented for the tremendous support of the annual statewide fund raising program benefiting the learning impaired. Each council is called upon to continue this important work and to utilize to the fullest the involvement of families, Boy Scouts, Columbian Squires and Ladies Auxiliaries in the fund raising campaign. The committee recommends that councils use publicity to promote the Knight of Columbus donations by secular and religious newspapers. It is recommended that councils become more involved with activities of the learning impaired citizens at the local level and present the funds to them in a personal manner. The committee also urges councils to actively support the Special Olympics Program.

SUPPORT OF THE ELDERLY AND INFIRMED

The committee urges each council to become actively involved in providing support for the elderly and infirmed citizens of our communities through such activities as weekly or monthly bingos at the retirement or health care facility, also Christmas-Thanksgiving Dinners, sponsoring Masses and communion services at the facility or just plain visitations. The committee also recommends that councils try to promote these programs at all times of the year, not only holidays and special occasions.

CONCLUSION

The committee urges all councils to implement to the fullest extent, the foregoing recommendations. In order to obtain the fullest implementation of these recommendations, the committee urges the State Deputy to insure that all councils receive and display a copy of this report, and that a summary of this report be published in the June issue of the LOUI-SIANA KNIGHT. As a chairman of the Good of the Order committee, I would like to thank all committee members for their attendance, input, and participation at our meeting Friday afternoon. I would also like to thank the State Deputy for the privilege of serving on this committee.

The Archbishop will then turn Father McGivney's case over to the Congregation for the Causes of Saints so that the Roman phase may begin; and

CYLA Chairman Report

The Catholic Youth Leadership Award Program is one of the most dynamic and rewarding programs that the State Council offers to the Membership. CYLA places an emphasis on Catholic values, scholastic achievement, athletics, and leadership in the areas of church, school and community. Catholic seniors throughout the state of Louisiana are eligible to participate in the CYLA program. The only requirement is that they must be nominated by a council within the Louisiana jurisdiction. Each council that participates in the CYLA program will find it to be both rewarding and fulfilling. Giving outstanding Catholic seniors the opportunity to compete for cash prizes, awards, and recognition is the very foundation of the CYLA program.

The CYLA program begins to take shape at the state officers' meeting held in June. CYLA is discussed at the Knights of Columbus leadership seminar held in July. The CYLA packets are mailed out to the council CYLA chairman or Grand Knight in November. Appeals are made on behalf of CYLA at the state officers' meeting and at Grand Knights' day, encouraging councils to participate in the program. Councils that anticipate in the program turn in their nomination forms to the Area Coordinators. Area Coordinators conduct their respective area competition and award one boy and one girl the distinction of being an area winner as well as a state finalist. The Area Coordinator then sends the nomination forms the finalist to the state chairman. A total of 24 finalists will compete for the state championship. The state chairman appoints ten state level judges who will grade the nomination forms of the finalists and conduct the verbal competition held in April. Then the copies of the nomination forms are mailed to the state judges for grading. Upon completion by the state judges, the scores are tallied by the state chairman and are used as part of the overall score of the finalist.

It is cogent to note that this year, again, we did not utilize the council reimbursement feature which allowed a rebate of up to \$50 per finalist in each council who nominated a finalist, and awarded them a cash prize. Because the CYLA program is funded by YEP, and due to decreased state revenues as a result of many councils being affected from the hurricanes in 2005, a budgetary decision was made by the State Council to forgo the rebates as not to place undue strain on the already limited

finances. Not surprisingly, there were no complaints by any councils regarding the absence of rebates. The moratorium on the rebate feature will continue until further notice.

Nearly 140 councils participated in the program this year. With this year's program, we saw that nearly every student nominee utilized the online interactive nomination form found at the state web site. This allows for a neater and more standardized application to be produced, permitting the maximum room for content to describe the nominee's activities and accomplishments. We will continue to streamline the online form and encourage all councils to promote its use. All councils should discard any old paper forms they may have in their files and wait for the new issue of the paper forms they will receive in their new packets, should they choose to use paper forms for their nominees. The use of old forms is strongly discouraged because of the changes in format and of the confusion it tends to create. Please do not use the old forms!

The State CYLA Finals were held at the Lafayette Catholic Diocesan office in Lafayette on April 13, 2008. Registration began at 8:00 a.m. and concluded at 8:45 a.m. The verbal interviews began at 10 a.m.. Lunch was served at noon, provided by St. Peter's Council from Carencro. Judging continued at 1 p.m.. The interviews concluded at 3:30 p.m.. The state deputy awarded all of the finalists a check in the amount of \$500 as their area level winnings. Pictures of the finalists were taken and all area coordinators in attendance had the opportunity to have a picture taken with their finalists. The auditing committee tallied the scores and presented the scores to the state chairman and a winner in the boy and girl division was declared by the state chairman.

In a similar situation to last year, where the State Winners were both from the same Council, this year, they Area, that is, Area D. William Dunckelman and Lindsay Walker, both from Houma, were the boy and girl winners this year. They received their 1st place winnings of \$4,000 each at the State Convention banquet in Kenner on May 3rd. William will be attending LSU this fall and will want to attend law school. He also has political aspirations. Lindsay also plans to attend LSU and then attend dental school there, hoping to specialize in orthodontics.

The 2nd Place winners were Richard Labranche, Jr. and Danielle Dubois. They received their \$3,000 prize money at the State finals. The 3rd Place winners were Eric Manuel and Brianna Horton, and they re-

ceived \$2,000 each that day, as well.



The Bishop Charles P. Greco Foundation has grown in dollar amount and support over the past twenty one years in our support for vocations in the State of Louisiana. We have over one million dollars in our core investments and we continue to move toward the two million dollar mark each year. This year we gave financial support of forty four thousand dollars to the young people studing for a religious life and we look to reach the fifty thousand dollar mark next year. These successes are due to your support and the direction given by the Brother Knights of the Louisiana Jurisdiction.

The board of directors changed the way the funds are to be disbursed in the future by disbursing the same dollar amount to each young person, without regards to the support given by the local councils. The board of directors continues to ask that every council in our jurisdiction use the RSVP program through the Supreme Council and support those young people studing for a religious life.


I would like to thank our Almighty and Living God for giving me strength and courage to fulfill the duties of the office of District Master and for blessing me with an understanding wife and family.



YEP Chairman Report

To: The Officers and Members of the 103rd Annual Meeting of the Louisiana State Council, Knights, Members and Guest assembled in Kenner, Louisiana

I would like to begin by thanking State Deputy Don Fontenot for his appointment of myself as Chairman of the Youth Expansion Program Fund drive. I have enjoyed the many meetings and invitations that the councils of Louisiana have shared with me and my wife Sonya. Our goals were centered on informing the councils and membership of the Jurisdiction of Louisiana of the many programs and benefit to the youth of our state that their donations make possible.

In August of 2007 each Grand Knight was sent a personal letter establishing the quota for their Council. This quota was derived using a \$10.00 fee for each active member on the Councils roster. The letter also went on to expound on all of the great programs that the donated monies would be supporting for the next Columbian Year. A copy of the states YEP quotas that were published in the Louisiana Knight were also mailed to each Grand Knight.

During the Annual KCLS meetings packets were provided to each council participating of the annual programs being funded and their goals to fund these programs. The information contained was intended to be used to enhance the council's awareness of the youth programs as well as pat ourselves on the back for having these great programs.

The Parade of Councils was held at Grand Knights Day. Each council was given the chance to present their donation directly to the State Deputy Don Fontenot. It was very well received by all of the councils. Total dollars collected that day in support of our youth programs was \$86,850.50 from 86 council's quotas and \$396.00 from the 50/50 raffle. In addition \$1,241.00 was donated to YEP from the Gumbo Contest that day.

In the months following Grand Knights day councils were reminded to make their donations towards the youth programs of the state. Each council was asked to remember the need for an investment in our youth and donate as much as they could to the program.

As of this date of this report, this year the councils have responded in a great fashion. We have 138 councils (44 Quota Plus, 46 Quota

and 47 Partial) that have donated \$ 125,466.58. This leaves 155 councils that have not donated to the program. Added to these funds are miscellaneous monies that have been collected this year of \$ 4,140.00. This now gives us a grand total of \$129,606.58 collected so far. The program will run until the end of June for this Columbian year. I do not however consider the program coming to a close this soon. I will continue to push and inform the importance of reaching our goals so that our youth programs can survive in these changing times.

Pro-Life Oratory Winner

One of the most celebrated authors of our time, Dr. Seuss, once stated, "A person's a person no matter how small." At conception a human being has begun to form inside its mothers uterus, and although this new life is less than one twenty-fifth of an inch long it has already begun to form the cells needed to become a fully developed person. After four weeks this growing bundle of human cells has formed a brain, spinal cord, and heart. After five weeks the baby's heart begins to beat. Although this child is no bigger than the tip of a pen he or she has already become a person. It is illegal to take the life of a human being, so how can taking the life of an unbom developing fetus possibly be justified? After all, this child will shortly be a talking, walking, cooing baby.

In week twelve of pregnancy the babies face has begun to form, fingernails and toenails have appeared and the baby can suck its thumb and get the hiccups. In week thirteen bones are beginning to form, the nose and chin are well defined, and the baby can open and close its mouth. By week fourteen the baby is 3 1/2 inches long. The ears and nose are fully developed and hair is beginning to appear. The fetus is clearly a moving functioning human life. Yet, weeks twelve through fourteen are the exact time frame when ninety percent of abortions are performed. The most common way of aborting baby in this stage of life is called dilatation and evacuation. The child is cut into pieces by a sharp knife, the nurse then "reassembles" the baby to ensure no part is still left in the mothers womb. At this stage the child has functioning neurological structures necessary to feel pain. All pain receptors that will be found in the newborn baby are present at this point. That means the child being aborted feels the same feelings of pain a newborn would feel being cut into pieces by a knife. Now that is the tragedy of abortion.

Pro-Choice advocates strive to make abortions seen like any other surgery. They strive to make the mother feel that aborting her baby will have no consequences, Mae Abbott of Long Beach, California knows this all too well. When going in for an abortion the doctor performing the abortion told her she would be out for 8 minutes and possibly feel discomfort after the procedure was finished, she later stated "The doctors lied, it has ruined 10 years of my life."

Society wants you to believe abortion is an easy way out of a disastrous problem. When in fact abortion is just the opposite, it is a diffi-

cult way out of a problem, and offers no real solution, as the effects of having an abortion are detrimental and felt for eternity by the mother. When asked how women seeking use of an abortion clinic are deceived, Carol Evrett, a former member of the abortion industry in Dallas, answered,

"Every woman has two questions, one is "Is it a baby?" and the other is "Does the abortion hurt?" The abortionist must answer no. He or she must lie to secure the consent of the woman and the collection of the clinic's fee. The women are told that we are merely dealing with a blob of tissue. They were told that there would only be slight cramping, whereas, in reality, an abortion is excruciatingly painful" Even more disturbing is her answer when faced with the question "How do you dispose of an aborted baby?" Evrett states,

"We put them down the garbage disposal."

Multiple physical complications come following an abortion. Woman having an abortion are four times more likely to die in the following year than women who carry their babies to term. One in every five hundred woman having an abortion die following the procedure. Women having abortions are also seven times more likely to commit suicide due to feelings of guilt. Women who receive abortions double their chance of getting breast cancer and cervical cancer. Not only do physical complications follow abortions, but emotional ones do as well. Many women state that after having an abortion they become depressed, have low self-esteem, and become violent. Lorie Nerad, former national President of Women Exploited by Abortion states

"I'll wake up in the middle of the night, thinking I hear a baby crying. And I still have nightmares in which I am forced to watch my baby being ripped apart in front of me. I simply miss my baby. I constantly wake up wanting to nurse my child, wanting to hold my child. And that's something the doctor never told me I would experience." And don't you agree that is the tragedy of abortion.

One abortion is performed every ten seconds, 1,2,3,4,5,6,7,8,9,10, abortion. See how quickly a child was killed? In the seven minutes I have spent giving this speech 42 children have been aborted. Pro-Life

When did God's most precious gift to us - his children - become a convenience rather than a blessing? Since the Roe v. Wade decision on January 22, 1973, our nation has lost an entire generation. How many doctors who could be finding a cure for cancer, or politicians striving towards equality, or even teachers educating our young people are not here today for the sake of convenience?

When the angel Gabriel told Mary that she would be, "With child, and would bear a son," he did not ask if the timing was convenient. In fact, if there was ever a woman who had a reason to object to pregnancy, it was Mary. She was, after all, young, unmarried, and of little financial means. Did God make a mistake when He chose Mary as the mother of our Savior? One can only imagine the depth of hurt and despair she experienced as she witnessed the persecution and crucifixion of her son. Yet Jesus' life of challenges and suffering evoked no less love from his mother.

There are those who would have us believe that since Jesus' birth was over two thousand years ago, Mary's difficulties as a mother were far different from women who conceive today. But if abortion was historically immoral, how could it have suddenly become moral on January 22nd, 1973?

The Law of God has never changed. The Commandment - Thou Shalt Not Kill - still applies in the 21st century. Jeremiah Chapter One, Verse Five states, "Before I formed you in the womb I knew you, and before you were born I consecrated you..." This intimate involvement of our Creator with the unborn clearly demonstrates that life begins at the moment of conception. Therefore, anyone who aborts an infant is guilty of murdering one of God's holy and sanctified children.

But the moral issue doesn't end here. For morality as determined by God's law cannot be defined by any man-made law. Thus the legality of abortion is independent of its morality. It is absurd to believe that no one has the right to oppose abortion just because it is currently legal. In fact, we have a right AND a moral obligation to oppose abortion. When morality and the justification of a law are in conflict, then our conscience must be our guiding force. Laws are subject to change, but truth and justice are not. Through recognizing this fact we are able to see abortion

for what it is, a devaluation of life.


Still there are pro-choice advocates who would argue that being pro-choice involves the very principles this country was founded upon: rights, freedom, and choice. Somehow these advocates have even tried to portray their stance on abortion as inherently honorable. On the contrary, the members of the 1973 Supreme Court and their pro-choice following condescendingly ignored what our founding fathers stated in the Declaration of Independence, "that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness." Abortion denies the unborn all rights while allowing the mother the right to choose to kill the most helpless of our society. As a pro-lifer, I do not advocate the elimination of all choice, only choices that end an innocent life. After all, we live in a rights-based society, and we are given the freedom to make choices daily. For instance, men and women have the right to choose to abstain from sex. Nonetheless, after a woman is pregnant, she no longer has the freedom to exercise her right to choose to become a mother. She already is a mother, the bearer of new life. After the baby is born, this mother has every right to choose whether to raise the baby herself or to give him up for adoption.

According to Barbara Ehrenreich, a former New York Times Columnist, 43% of all women will have an abortion by the time they are 45 years old. As Americans, we have an obligation to stand up and be heard as a beacon of hope for human rights throughout this world. But this can't be truly accomplished until we lift the darkened veil of doubt and despondency brought upon ourselves by the legalization of abortion.

Hope remains though, as the promise of change in our current law is reflected by the unique perspectives and experiences of the generation most impacted by abortion, today's youth. One 17 year old shares his story this way. His parents were married late in life, and due to his mother's health and age, doctors gave her little chance of conceiving. While they felt a calling to be parents, their age proved to be a hindrance in adopting a child. Seven years later, his mother conceived. Doctors advocated testing to determine if the child would be born as a so-called normal infant, but his parents chose to leave it in God's hands. After he was born, he was diagnosed with a disease, which, while not fatal, would cause the body to attack itself, one organ at a time. His disease resulted in daily

pain, numerous hospital visits, and limitations on many activities commonly associated with youth. Today, this teenager still faces health uncertainties. However, his parents' unconditional love has taught him his life worth is not defined by these obstacles, rather the success of his life lies in his ability to use his gifts to fulfill God's unique plan for him.

How many other youth, for the sake of what our society considers the norm or for personal gratification, will never get this teenager's opportunities? A recent Gallup poll indicated 72% of teens today desire a repeal of the Roe vs. Wade decision. Yet it is not enough to WANT change. We have to be the catalyst for it using our voice and right to vote to leverage this change. In case you haven't already guessed, I am the teenager in this story. As my mother taught me, there is no obstacle so great that it excuses you of your obligation to make a positive difference in the life of another. For many unborn children, this positive difference is the gift of a complete life.

Earlier this evening, I had the privilege of attending mass here and I found myself acutely aware of the Lord's presence not only in the Holy Eucharist, but also within each of you. I have always believed God has a unique plan for each of us, and He reveals this plan through the loving support of others.

Perhaps then, God has placed this opportunity for me to speak before you tonight that I might reflect upon my life and the innumerable blessings I have been given that have made me the person I am today.

If I had to describe my life, I would describe it as a journey of family and of faith. In fact, even my birth was described by doctors as a miracle. My name is William Andrew Dunckelman, taken from my father's and brother's respective first names. These two individuals would always be there for me as family, friends, and spiritual role models. Shortly after birth, I was diagnosed with an autoimmune disorder which has led to countless hospital visits, limitations on activities, and even the necessity to change schools five times. Yet, I do not think I have ever felt sorry for myself because my family and my faith taught me that everyone faces challenges in life and I had a choice to make—I could either dwell on these challenges or utilize them to better understand myself and others.

I believe even the necessity to transfer schools had a positive impact me, as each new environment uniquely enriched my life. However, change isn't always easy. In fact, I still remember the night before I was to begin the school I attend today. We joined as a family to pray for guidance. God did answer our prayers. From the moment I walked into HCS, I knew I had made the right decision. Here I would receive not only a strong academic foundation, but I would be surrounded by friends and faculty who would provide me with the academic and moral support I would need to overcome continued health difficulties. In this small school of only 200 students, I learned quickly the meaning of Ralph Waldo Emerson's statement, "A friend is a person with whom I may be sincere, before him I may think aloud." Moreover, attending a Christian school gave me the opportunity to strengthen my own faith while recognizing, regardless of our faith, we are all united as humans under the same Lord. As one of only a few Catholics attending my school, I was presented with the opportunity to

evangelize. Numerous times I found myself, after a discussion of faith, looking into the eyes of a staff member or peer and informing them what they believe was actually Catholicism.

I consider the strength that I have to defend my faith a direct result of the way youth are embraced within my church parish of St. Anthony. Here, I was taught that not only was learning doctrine important, but accepting my obligation to live my faith through service was equally important. Additionally, as a parishioner of St. Anthony, I have learned that God does not see age as a factor when he calls us to serve others.

During the past few years, I have had the privilege to travel throughout the United States promoting youth service learning opportunities. Yet, none of these experiences will ever compare to being recognized as the Catholic Youth Leader of Louisiana. Over the years, I have heard my mother tell how the KC's had profoundly changed her life through being named the CYLA recipient. And I remember my grandfather telling me he would one day return to this event with me. Now, as I share this night in a very special way with my grandfather and mother, I understand what they were trying to convey to me. This award provides me with a standard through which to live the rest of my life. The real worth of my existence as a Catholic will never be determined by my intelligence or fame, but rather by my ability to be guided by a higher power. Please know this faith lesson you have shared with me is one which will never fade due to time or distance.

So continues my journey of family and faith. Though the rest may not be completely certain, one thing remains steadfast; hope. Within our conscience desire to make a positive difference in the world, our actions are characterized by our continual look towards the future. The tomorrow of human existence is unpredictable, but the rising of the sun never is.

Pro-Life

On January 22, 1973, the United States Supreme Court ruled that a woman's right to privacy is more compelling than her unborn child's right to live. That decision legalizing abortion began an era that continues to witness the destruction of more than

1.3 million unborn babies each year by abortion. There have been more than 40 million abortions performed since 1973. Abortionists claim that the human fetus is only a "potential" human being. That word "potential" is tricky—something in future that has capacity to become actual and real, but at the present time it is not yet so. For example, an adolescent is a potential adult, but he is not yet an actual adult. Nevertheless, we all recognize that every adolescent is already an actual human being, **not** a potential one. These abortions kill unborn babies -whose heart beats at 22 days after conception, whose brain waves can be measured at six weeks, and who by three months are **completely** formed. Their humanity is actual, **not** potential.

Tragedy is defined as a "lamentable, dreadful, or fatal event; a calamity; a disaster."

- · When the doctors fail to tell the woman experiencing an abortion, that she may never be able to become pregnant again, that is a <u>tragedy</u>.
- There is strong evidence that abortion increases the risk of breast cancer that is a <u>tragedy</u>.
- · Women suffering Post-Abortion Syndrome may experience drug and alcohol abuse, personal relationship disorders, sexual dysfunction, repeated abortions, damaged self-esteem, and some even attempt suicide that is a <u>tragedy</u>.
- · Women have cited "social reasons" not their health or rape or incest as their motivation in approximately 93% of all abortions that is a <u>tragedy</u>.

Why do we need to reflect on the sanctity of human life? Pope John Paul II, in a journal review entitled *Human Rights and Population* said, "All human life from the moment of conception and through all subsequent stages is sacred, because human life is created in the image and likeness of God." Because of this, we must stand up every time that human life is threatened. A baby is **never** a mistake!

Even a baby conceived from rape – first of all, pregnancy from rape is very rare – less than 1%. But that baby should not be punished for the crime of its father. I ask you – if your father would commit a murder, would you expect to be punished for what he did - just so, this is an innocent human being.

Opposition to the right-to-life movement say they support the rights of others to choose. This sounds quite American and politically acceptable, until compared to other statements: I wouldn't gas a Jew, but I support the right of others to choose. I wouldn't own a slave, but I support your right to do so. I wouldn't take part in a rape, but I support your right to choose. Sometimes facts can be misleading through words people use. That is why it is important for us, as young citizens, to educate ourselves and watch for propaganda.

Abortion is an act of **violence**; its purpose is to kill another human life. The way of violence often attracts us, because it offers a sure and quick solution, but this solution is false and deceptive. It brings **death**, not life; **despair**, not hope. We must reject the way of death and choose the way of life. This way of violence brings **tragedy**.

In closing, I want to share a personal story – for three years now, and again this year, I have attended the National March for Life in Washington DC. Last year, we had the opportunity and what I would call a blessing to meet and talk to a very large group of women and men who were holding signs that read "I Regret My Abortion" and "I Regret My Lost Fatherhood." These women truly opened my eyes to the tragedy of abortion as they shared their stories with us, as they explained the **tragedy of their regret**, and I saw them look into our eyes and search for the eyes of their lost children.

Deuteronomy offers us a challenge: "I have set before you life and death, blessing and curse; therefore, choose life." We must pray as though it depends totally on God, but work and witness as though it totally depends on us. Abortion is murder, and we must choose life.

OCMAND: Our state membership program began on April 1, 2007; and concluded on March 31, 2008. During our state membership program year, our councils displayed a net membership intake of 498 or 27% of our quota of 1863. This information is in your registration packet for your reference and convenience.

Again this year, as in the past, we were fully supported by our insurance agency force. Unfortunately, there were NO NEW councils instituted this year. Hopefully the 2008-2009 Fraternal Year will bring numerous new councils.

We are proud to announce 48 K.C. Councils of Louisiana achieved or surpassed their assigned quotas in the STATE membership program. Please note that the time period for Supreme Council membership honors is from July 1, 2007 through June 30, 2008, and not the same as the state deadline...and as a reminder, our term is not over until June 30, 2008.

A council has to be instituted one year prior to the beginning of the state membership program year to be eligible for an award; that is, instituted prior to April 1, 2006. To win one of the State Membership trophies, an eligible council has to display the highest percentage of state quota achieved by any council in its membership group for the period from April 1, 2007 to March 31, 2008. **49** councils received 100 points in the membership program.
