# PROCEEDINGS

#### FIRST DAY'S SESSION

At 10:17 a.m., Saturday, May 5, 2012, State Deputy Ronnie L. Boudreaux called to order the 107th Annual Meeting of the Louisiana State Council, Knights of Columbus, in the Crowne Plaza Hotel, Baton Rouge, LA. Upon the State Deputy's direction, State Warden James Riente and his assistants, having predetermined the fact, reported that all in the council chamber have been verified and were in possession of a current KC membership card. State Deputy Boudreaux then called upon Bishop Ronald Herzog, State Chaplain, to lead the assembly in the opening prayer.

The State Deputy then requested the assembly to remain standing for the posting of the national colors, followed by the pledge of allegiance to the flag, conducted by Master Russell J. Ruh, Jr..

In opening remarks, State Deputy Boudreaux states "we would like to take this opportunity on behalf of Brother Vince Whittington and Brother Knights of the Baton Rouge area in welcoming you to the 107th Annual Meeting of the Louisiana State Council." Brother Boudreaux went on to welcome all clergy in attendance.

Bishop Robert Muench, Diocese of Baton Rouge welcomed all convention attendees.

State Deputy then recognized the Past State Deputies in attendance.

State Deputy Boudreaux noted that 100 Point Certificate Winners would be noted via a powerpoint presentation, that would be repeated throughout the weekend. Boudreaux also commented that "program awards" would be presented throughout the Saturday and Sunday business sessions, as well a during the Saturday evening Banquet. The State Deputy went on to note, that "all certificates would be placed in one envelope, that could be claimed during the voting process on Sunday morning, or at the conclusion of the convention, late Sunday morning.

Brother Boudreaux then called on State Advocate Paul deMahy to review the rules of the 107th Annual Meeting. Mr. deMahy reviewed all rules and also commented that the rules had been published in the *Louisiana Knight*. Brother deMahy then moved for acceptance of the printed rules. The motion was seconded by Danny Landry, Council 6103, Vinton.

State Deputy Boudreaux then formally announced the appointment of Eric Miller, Baton Rouge, as Convention Parliamentarian. Brother Miller gave a few remarks on the rules and instructions about being a delegate and visiting knights. He then explained the process of the elections.

The State Deputy then called upon State Secretary John Boudreaux for the presentation of the Temporary Roll. Boudreaux explained the procedure for conducting the Temporary Roll Call will be in effect until the Permanent Roll is developed and presented by the Credentials Committee and approved by the State Council. The State Secretary then moved to accept these records as the Temporary Roll Call of the State Council Meeting and seconded by Danny Landry, Council 6103, Vinton.

Since appointments to convention committees are well displayed on the convention bulletin board located in the foyer by the Registration Desk and since these appointees were notified by personal letters, State Deputy Boudreaux announced that these appointments would not be read unless he was requested to do so by the assembly, and if an appointee is replaced at the convention by his alternate, then the alternate shall serve on the committee. These appointments are found on page 16.

The State Deputy then called upon State Secretary Boudreaux for the presentation of the minutes of the last State Council Meeting. The State Secretary moved that due to the length of these minutes, that the minutes be referred to the Minutes Committee without reading them. The motion was seconded by Francis Zambrowski, Council 1357, Natchitoches.

State Deputy Boudreaux then recognized Grand Knight Keith C. Black, Council 8442, Violet, Chairman of the Minutes Committee for his committee's report. Upon his conclusion, Brother Vedros moved for the acceptance of the minutes committee report. The motion was seconded by Nolan LeBlanc, Council 1087, Donaldsonville.

CYLA Awards were then presented. A complete list of CYLA Awards can be found in the Awards Section of these proceedings beginning on page 98.

The State Deputy moved to close the open session to conduct business outside the normal scope of the third degree. The motion was seconded by Danny Landry, Council 6103, Vinton. Business conducted included Squires, Louisiana Knight Foundation and Bishop Greco Foundation. These reports can be found in the reports section.

The convention was reconvened at 11:45am

Being recognized for this purpose, State Deputy Boudreaux then announced that a number of communications have been received. He moved that these communications be referred to the Felicitations Committee without reading and/or debate. This motion was seconded by Danny Landry, Council 6103, Vinton. The report of the Felicitations Committee can be found on page 38.

At this time, the State Deputy then called for reports of State Officers. He requested State Secretary John Boudreaux assume the chair for the purpose of introducing the State Deputy, and requesting his rendering of the State Deputy Report. State Deputy Boudreaux then presented his report, encompassing the myriad of activities, projects, programs, and undertakings of Columbianism in the Louisiana Jurisdiction during the past fraternal year. Upon completion of that report, Dennis Cass, Council 2878, Metairie, moved for the adoption of the report. Clem Sparkman, Council 6870, Terrytown, seconded the motion, and the motion carried unanimously. The complete report of the State Deputy is reproduced in these proceedings beginning on page 18.

State Secretary Boudreaux then requested that the State Deputy again assume the chair and this was accomplished. State Deputy Boudreaux then called upon State Secretary John Boudreaux, Council 7557, Broussard, to render his report and recognized him for this purpose. The State Secretary then rendered a detailed report to the assembly. Upon his conclusion, Boudreaux moved that the report be received with thanks, and it be referred to the appropriate committees. The motion to adopt the report was made by John Tuminello, Council 3200, Alexandria, and was seconded by Don Cubbage, PSD, Council 8978, Sulphur. The motion carried unanimously. Reproduced in these proceedings, the State Secretary report as of June 30, 2012, begins on page 21.

The report of the State Treasurer was then called for by the State Deputy, who recognized State Treasurer Vernon Ducote for that purpose. State Treasurer Ducote presented his report, stating that the report to be reproduced in the minutes of this convention would be as of June 30, 2012. When he concluded his report, Ductoe moved for its acceptance and reference to appropriate committees. Donald Cubbage, PSD, Council 8978, Sulphur, moved to adopt the report, and it was seconded by Brett Hoffpauir, Council 5499, Crowley. The motion carried without dissent. The full report of the State Treasurer, as of June 30, 2012, can be found in these minutes beginning on page 23.

The State Deputy then called for the report of the State Advocate Paul deMahy, Council 1276, St. Martinville. The State Advocate report was read and upon its conclusion moved for the acceptance of his

report. Danny Landry, Council 6103, Vinton, moved for the adoption of the report. Seconded by Charles Foy, Council 12906, Covington, the motion unanimously carried. Reproduction of these minutes appear in this report beginning on page 27.

State Deputy Boudreaux then called for the report of the State Warden, recognizing State Warden James Riente, Council 7856, St. Francisville, for this purpose. State Warden Riente presented his report and upon its conclusion, he moved for its acceptance. The motion for acceptance was then presented by Danny Landry, Council 6103, Vinton, and was seconded by Derwin Savoy, Council 10293, Lafayette. The motion carried without dissent. The report of the State Warden can be found starting on page 28.

Calling for the report of the State Office Administrator, the State Deputy then recognized Robert Boudreaux, Council 3202, Lafayette, for this purpose. The State Office Administrator then rendered his report. Upon its completion, Danny Landry, Council 6103, Vinton, moved for its adoption and reference to appropriate committees. Seconded by Brett Hoffpauir, Council 5499, Crowley. The motion carried unanimously. The full report of the State Office Administrator is reproduced in these proceedings, beginning on page twenty nine.

State Deputy Boudreaux then called for the report of the Master of the Fourth Degree, recognizing Master Russell J. Ruh for this purpose. Master Ruh presented his report and upon its conclusion, he moved for its acceptance. The motion for acceptance was then presented by Maurice Evans, Council 7355, Houma, and was seconded by Danny Landry, Council 6103, Vinton. The motion carried without dissent. The report of the Master can be found starting on page 75.

MDF Awards were then presented. A complete list of MDF Awards can be found in the Awards Section of these proceedings beginning on page 98.

Proceeding to the receipt of convention committees, State Deputy Boudreaux called for the report of the Audit Committee and recognized Grand Knight John Manes, Council 1208, New Iberia, committee chairman, for this purpose. Brother Manes rendered the full report and having completed the report moved for its adoption. Seconded by Danny Landry, Council 6103, Vinton, and the motion carried. The Audit Committee report may be found on page 31.

The State Deputy then called for the report of the Memorials Committee and recognized Grand Knight Chris A. Desselles, Council 6326, Denham Springs, for this purpose. Chairman Desselles moved for the adoption of the amended procedure, which was then seconded by Robert Stevens, Council 3246, Metairie.

Calling for the report of the Felicitations Committee, the State Deputy recognized Grand Knight David W. Prusak, Council 13349, Waggaman, for this purpose. Prusak presented the committee report and moved for its adoption. Seconded by Nolan LeBlanc, Council 1087, Donaldsonville, the motion carried without dissent. The Felicitation Committee report is reproduced in these minutes and begins on page 38.

The State Deputy then called for the Good of the Order Report. The State Deputy recognized Grand Knight Rick Montet, Council 7557, Broussard, Committee Chairman for that purpose. Grand Knight Montet presented the committee report and moved for acceptance, and Danny Landry, Council 6103, Vinton, seconded. The motion carried without dissent. The report of the Good of the Order Committee is reproduced in these minutes and begins on page 39. The committee also recommended all future committee members be sent the entire "good of the order" with their "letter of appointment".

Under "special orders" of the State Council's By-Laws, in Section 6:1, the State Deputy then called for nomination for officers of the State Council and representative and alternate representatives of the State Council to the Annual Supreme Council Meeting. With the new balloting and counting procedure, all nominations will also be closed on the first day. He explained that our by-laws allow a maximum of three minutes for making a nomination and that nominations shall not be seconded. Boudreaux emphasized that all nominators must submit a written report of their respective nominees' names along with mailing addresses, council numbers and membership numbers to the State Secretary; and if the nomination is for State Deputy or insurance representative, a Knights of Columbus insurance certificate number of the nominee must also be provided in the written report.

The State Deputy further advised that the ballots would list candidates in alphabetical order. Besides those Knights of Columbus already entitled to the floor, any third degree member in good standing can be granted the privileges of the floor for the purpose of submitting a nomination; however, such action must be approved by the assembly. Printed nomination forms are available at the State Secretary's Registration Desk. Boudreaux then opened the floor for nomination for State Officers and the following nominations were received:

State Deputy Boudreaux then announced that nominations were officially closed and would not be received Sunday morning. State Deputy Boudreaux then recognized State Advocate Paul deMahy for the purpose of reviewing Resolution Number 9, adopted at the 1997 State Council Meeting in Shreveport. State Advocate deMahy then explained the purpose and intent of Resolution Number 9.

State Deputy Boudreaux then opened the floor for nominations for Insurance Delegate to the Supreme Council Meeting in August in Denver, Colorado, and the following were received:

The State Deputy then announced that "nominations are now closed."

State Deputy Boudreaux then moved that all nominees for the offices of insurance and/or associate delegate to the 2012 Supreme Council Meeting be hereby accepted as nominees for alternate representatives in their respective categories and be it further moved that after the elected representatives in each category, the next four candidates in descending vote position in each category be deemed elected as the alternate representative. Danny Landry, Council 6103, Vinton, seconded the motion and the the proposal was accepted unanimously.

YEPAwards were then presented. A complete list of YEPAwards can be found in the Awards Section of these proceedings beginning on page 98.

State Deputy Boudreaux then called for the submission of any resolutions not yet submitted for action. He explained that there was no need to read the resolutions but merely submit them to the State Advocate. He explained further that any resolutions submitted after this point would need the approval of the convention's delegates to be considered for action thereon.

State Deputy Boudreaux made announcements and urged all in attendance to be prompt for the 4:00pm Convention Vigil Mass and to remain until all Ministers of the Mass have proceeded out of the chamber.

He also commented that "voting would take place in the Crowne Plaza from 7am to 8:30am." He continued by saying "you will need your membership card and a pictured ID to vote". Boudreaux finished his comments on voting by saying that if a run off were needed, the business meeting would be recessed to accomplish the second balllot.

Boudreaux then called upon Bishop Ronald Herzog, State Chaplain to offer a closing prayer. State Deputy Ronnie Boudreaux then recessed the convention at 12:50pm.

#### SECOND DAY'S SESSION

State Deputy Ronnie Boudreaux called to order at 9:05am the second day of the 107th Annual Meeting of the Louisiana State Council, Knights of Columbus. After State Warden James Riente and his assistants had verified that all in the chamber were in possession of a current K.C. Membership Card. State Chaplain Ronald Herzog led the assembly in the opening prayer. The State Deputy then asked Master Russell Ruh to lead the body in the Pledge of Allegiance.

The State Deputy asked State Chaplain to remain at the podium to render his remarks to the convention. The State Deputy then commented that the Election Process had been completed, but encouraged all

Voting Delegates to remain, as a possible run-off could occur.

The State Deputy then distributed "Top 20" Certificates to those councils finishing in the top of the State Deputy scoring.

State Deputy Ronnie Boudreaux, with the assistance of YEP Chairman, Rennan Duffour, presented certificates to all councils who had made their YEP Quota for the year.

State Deputy Boudreaux then called upon Youth Expansion Program Chairman Duffour to render his report. In making his report, Chairman Duffour emphasized that his report, as it will appear in the proceedings of this meeting, will be inclusive of all receipts through June 30, 2012. He urged councils not yet participating in the YEP to date, to please do so, prior to that June 30th closing date.

Brother Duffour then thanked everyone for their great support of the offertory at both Masses and moved for the adoption of the YEP Report. Danny Landry, Council 6103, Vinton, motioned for the acceptance of Duffour's report, and then Gerald Marse, Council 2436, Reserve, seconded the motion, and the report was accepted by acclamation. The Convention then presented the following YEPAwards:

Returning to the receipt of Convention Committee reports, the State Advocate was then called upon, as Chairman of the Resolutions Committee, to present the committee report and then explained that when the report reached the point of calling for action on the specific resolutions, the chairman would read the purpose and resolved clauses of the resolution and then read the recommendation of the resolution committee. "Your silence would indicate your agreement with that recommendation in which case I will rap the gavel indicating that the recommendation of the Resolutions Committee is adopted," the State Deputy announced. "If you wish action other than the committee's recommendation, appropriate motions, seconds, discussion and action are in order," he concluded. He then recognized the Committee Chairman who explained that he would read the purpose of the resolution, then read the resolved clauses, then read the recommendations of the Elected State Officers, that of the Advisory Board, and the recommendation of the Resolutions Committee, and if necessary, the rationale of the committee's recommendation. Floor action would be on the recommendation of the resolutions committee. Utilizing this procedure, the chairman then presented the resolutions committee report, and upon its completion, Brother Paul deMahy moved for its adoption. Justin Lancon, Council 11792, New Iberia, seconded and the motion carried. The report of the Resolutions Committee can be found beginning on page 48.

For the purpose of rendering his committee report, State Treasurer Vernon Ducote, Chairman of the Budget & Finance Committee, was recognized. Chairman Ducote presented the comittee's report, and at its conclusion, moved for its adoption. Brett Hoffpauir, Council 5499, Crowley, seconded the motion. The complete text of this committee report is found in these minutes beginning on page 32.

The State Deputy then recognized Grand Knight Henry J. Jumonville, Council 10902, New Iberia, Chairman of the Elections Committee for his committee report. Brother Jumonville, rendered his report and then moved for its adoption. It was so moved, seconded by Wayne Hollier, Council 3425, New Iberia, and carried. The full report of the Elections Committee is found in these proceedings on page 37.

The State Deputy then called upon 2013 Convention Chairman Mike Malagarie for introductions and comments pertaining to next years convention in Lafayette.

The newly elected State Deputy, State Secretary, State Treasurer, State Advocate and State Warden then rendered closing comments. State Deputy Boudreaux commended the attendees still in attendance and reminded councils scoring sheets could be claimed at the conclusion of the meeting.

The convention sang "God Bless America".

State Chaplain Bishop Ronald Herzog led the delegation in the closing prayer.

State Deputy Boudreaux then adjourned the 107th Annual Meeting of the Louisiana State Council, Knights of Columbus at 10:55am.

### **State Treasurer Report**

To: The Officers, Past State Deputies and Delegates of the 107<sup>th</sup> Annual Meeting of the Louisiana Jurisdiction of the Knights of Columbus, assembled in Baton Rouge, Louisiana on May 4<sup>th</sup> to May 6<sup>st</sup> 2012.

In accordance with Section 7.2 of the By-Laws of the Louisiana State Council, all Officers of the State Council shall be required to submit a complete written report to the State Council of their official acts. I am honored to present the Annual Report of the State Treasurer to my Brother Knights of the Louisiana Jurisdiction, for Fraternal Year 2011-2012.

Serving as State Treasurer has been an honor and a privilege and I shall treasure the memories of serving the State Council for the rest of my life. The learning experience has been invaluable and it has given me the opportunity to experience a level of service to the Knights of Columbus that will serve me throughout life, many thanks to my Brother Knights in the Great State of Louisiana.

The accounting procedures established for handling the funds of the State Council are sound and have internal controls built into the system. Additional controls were implemented to ensure the accuracy of the MDF program as well as the State Convention and State Office Income and Expenses. In accordance with Section 9:2 of the By-Laws of the Louisiana State Council, the State Secretary shall receive all funds due to the State Council, prepare a transmittal and then turn over the funds to the State Treasurer for deposit. Referencing Section 10:1 of the By-Laws, the State Treasurer is the custodian of all State Council funds and is required to keep a true and accurate record of all funds. I have done my very best to comply to with the By-Laws and I certify that the financial statements presented in this report represents a true and accurate accounting of the state of financial condition of the Louisiana State Council.

The State Council has three active checking accounts that are balanced monthly by the State Treasurer. They are: *General Fund Checking, State Convention Checking, and MDF Checking. The General Fund Checking has sub-accounts, Acompano Checking, YEP Checking and Exemplification Fund Checking Accounts.* Funds are deposited in each of the three accounts to facilitate the payment of expenses directly related to each account mentioned.

The State Council maintains eleven trust accounts: *General Fund Trust, YEP Current Trust, YEP Fund Raiser Trust, Exemplification Trust, General Fund Unallocated Trust, YEP Unallocated Trust, Fourth Degree Trust, Louisiana Knights Foundation Trust, Benefit Reserve Trust, Disaster Relief Trust and Convention Reserve Trust.* These accounts are monitored and reports are given on the earnings or losses monthly. Referencing Section 10:4 of the State By-Laws, the State Treasurer shall segregate and keep in a separate depository funds designated Youth Expansion Program.

A voucher system is used for all disbursement of funds. The voucher is prepared by the State Deputy and sent to the State Secretary for recording and production of checks. The State Secretary then forwards the voucher along with the checks to the State Treasurer for action. The State Treasurer records this activity in the monthly accounting system of the State Council; he then makes copies of the checks then signs and mails the checks to the appropriate parties. In accordance with Sec.8:1 of the State By-laws; all checks issued are required to have the signature of two of the following State Officers: State Deputy, State Secretary, and/or State Treasurer.

The State Treasurer records all receipts and expenditures to the financial accounting records by posting transactions in the different accounts and prepares a report of all accounts for review by the State Deputy, Elected State Officers, the Immediate Past State Deputy, and Past State Deputies, at the end of each month.

Bank statements are also reconciled to the accounting records for checking and trust accounts.

Copies of the reconciled trust statements are included in the monthly reports to the State Deputy, Elected State Officers, Immediate Past State Deputy, and the Past State Deputies at the end of each month.

#### **State Directory**

Current information is key to this Louisiana Council product being effective. Form 185s must be submitted to the State Deputy and/or State Council for the info to be correct. The State Directory is posted on our State Website, and is updated weekly, where as the printed document is only updated annually.

This document is available for download at the KC State Website.

#### <u>The Louisiana Knight</u>

*The Louisiana Knight* newsletter continues to be published quarterly, however submission of council articles and photographs has dropped off considerably, and without council info, the newsletter becomes ordinary, at best.

Of note, the *Louisiana Knight* now publishes only four times per year. March, June, September and December are the publication months, while the deadline for submitting articles and photos will be the 15th of the publication month.

Unlike the early days, where the state office would create a document and send to the printer, now the State Office produces all facets of the publication, including the printing of, and the distribution.

### **Budget & Finance Committee Report**

To: The Officers and Members of the 107th Annual Meeting of the Louisiana State Council Knights of Columbus assembled in Baton Rouge, Louisiana. In accordance with Section 19 Committee on Budget and Finance of the By Laws of The Louisiana State Council Knights of Columbus the following report is presented.

On March 7, 2012, the Elected State Officers and Past State Deputies met to discuss the proposed Budget for the 2012-2013 Columbian year. A copy of the previous year's budget and the income/expense through December 31, 2011 were furnished to this group in advance, for their preparation for this meeting.

The proposed Budget was submitted to the Elected State Officers and Past State Deputies at the Advisory Board Meeting on March 8, 2012. The Past State Deputies offered their views and changes or comments that were then incorporated into the proposed Budget.

After this meeting, according to the By-Laws of the State Council, two copies were mailed by the State Office administrator to all Councils of record.

The Budget and Finance Committee meeting was held on Saturday, May 5, 2012 in CREOLE QUEEN room of the Crowne Plaza Hotel in Baton Rouge, Louisiana at 9:00 AM. This meeting was for the purpose of continuing the review of the proposed Budget.

Included in this review of the proposed Budget for the Louisiana State Council was: General Fund; Youth Expansion Funds; Youth Expansion Fund Raiser, Acompano Fund Raiser; State Council Office Operations; and Investment Transactions.

By accomplishing this task – the committee on the Budget and Finance has complied with the State Council By-Laws-Section 19-Committee on Budget and Finance.

The Committee took into account that the Proposed Budget carried the approval of the State Deputy and the Elected State Officers. Prior approval was given by the Advisory Board of Past State Deputies at their meeting in March 2011. Based on the review of the Budget and Finances of the State Council, the Budget and Finance Committee offers the following recommendations to you for your considerations here today.

I would ask that the Budget and Finance Committee please come and join me.

1. The Committee recommends that the State Council continue to perform an audit of the funds of the Louisiana State Council with the Committee of three (3) Past State Deputies, (3) seated Grand Knights, the State Financial Officers and up to (2) two at large members to oversee the audit.

2. The State Per-Capita Tax should stay the same as outlined in the Budget Proposal

3. The Acompano Raffle should continue to assist with the funding of the Acompano program.

4. Due to the uncertainty of receipts for the 2011-2012 Youth expansion Program Budget. The Committee recommends that the following: If total income for the 2011-2012 Fund Raiser does not equal budgeted income, selected Accounts will be decreased with the approval of the Elected State Officers. If funds exceed budget, selected accounts will share in the increased gain with the approval of the Elected State Officers.

5. Excess Funds in the General Fund and YEP be placed in existing investment accounts. Any shortfall resulting in the General Fund Budget: funds may be transferred from the General Fund Unallocated (G30.0 General Fund Unallocated) with the concurrence of the State Officers.

6. The State Treasurer presented a review of the investment account for the Louisiana State Council. Based on this report, the committee recommends continuing with Capital One Bank Trust Group and requests every effort continues to optimize interest on investments.

7. Since the 2011-2012 Budget was mailed to each Delegate to the State Council Meeting – the Budgetand Finance Committee recommends discontinuing the line item reading.

8. A final Financial Statement as of June 30<sup>th</sup> be distributed to each council of record by no later than August 31<sup>st</sup> of the same year.

Worthy State Deputy – the committee on Budget and Finance moves for the adoption of these line items before concluding this report.

Items 1 – 8 ADOPTION

The committee agrees that the Budgets for the General Fund, Youth Expansion Fund, Youth Expansion Fund Raiser for 2012-2013, Acompano Fund Raiser for 2012-2013, Exemplification Fund, the Investment Transactions and the State Council Office Operation will be included in the minutes of this State Council Meeting.

# To: The Officers and Members of the 107th Annual Meeting of the Louisiana State Council held in Baton Rouge, La.

Your committee on the Good of the Order met on Saturday, May 5, 2012, and fully discussed at length the following activity areas. After due deliberation, the committee urges all council, district and state leaders to see that the following recommendations are fully implemented.

The committee would also ask that at future conventions, each member of the Good of the Order Committee, as appointed, be forwarded a copy of the previous year's Good of the Order report to prepare committee members as to what is to be discussed.

#### FIRST AND FOREMOST WE ARE CATHOLIC

The committee recommends the recitation of the Serran Prayer for Vocations, or another appropriate vocations prayer, at each council meeting and that the council chaplain should encourage the recitation of this prayer at all Masses. The committee further recommends that a prayer be offered at each council meeting for the beatification of our founder Father Michael J. McGivney. The council chaplain should be encouraged to be actively involved in council activities. In the absence of the council Chaplain, a deacon shall be asked to bring the message of our faith. The committee urges all councils to participate in the Refund Support Vocations Program (RSVP). Each council should consider sponsoring a speaker on vocations to the various parochial schools. Recognizing that some clergy may still be apprehensive to Knights of Columbus involvement, the committee recommends each council strongly consider implementation of the Parish Round Table Program and thus show evidence of our belief that VOCATIONS ARE OUR BUSINESS and that each Grand Knight has a dialogue with each Pastor of churches in his council area. Each council should consider having a speaker on evangelization, to encourage each member to promote the Catholic faith to non-Catholics, and to help fallen-away Catholics to become again active in the Church. One way this can be done effectively is by supporting evangelization through the RCIA program.

#### PRO-LIFE

The committee recommends increased efforts from the state level to provide more timely and specific information to the council level about upcoming activities such as Pro-Life Rallies. The committee encourages area, district and local Right to Life Masses and demonstrations. It is also recommended that continued active exposure to the public by each council be pursued. The committee encourages each council to construct a monument to the unborn in a prominent place, preferably on the church grounds and those that have one to maintain and have programs to bring Pro-Life to parishioners attention. We urge right-to-life education, to fight abortion, and specific projects, such as enforcement by members and Grand Knights of letter writing campaigns from council members to state and federal governing bodies. We also urge the use of the vast amount of material that is available about the AIDS Virus, and promoting abstinence and chastity as a way of decreasing the threat of AIDS as well as decreasing abortions and moral decay.

The committee also recommends that councils become involved with local Right-To-Life organizations by way of participating in their events and getting on their mailing lists. The committee urges use of material available to them from the Supreme Council pertaining to Pro-Life. The committee also urges members to fight pornography at the council, family and school levels. The committee further recommends that the State Council provide updated information of current Federal and State legislation on Pro-Life and Euthanasia.

The Committee reommends each council appoints a Pro-Life Chairman or Chair-Couple; supports a youth Pro-Life Retreat as sponsored by the State Council; and offer a Pro-Life prayer at business meetings.

#### **BISHOP GRECO MEMORIAL FUND**

The committee recommends that all councils use the memorial cards to memorialize deceased council members. The card can be filled in with the name of the deceased and the name of the donating council. The

card is mailed to the member's family. A suggested donation of \$25.00, however any amount is accepted, and sent to the Greco Foundation for the trust fund.

The committee also recommends that councils make a voluntary contribution of \$1.00 per member, on an annual basis, to the Bishop Greco Memorial Fund..

#### **RETREATS**

The committee recommends that each council have a guest speaker with Catholic Retreats as the subject, and schedule retreats for its members, individual as well as couples, encouraging husband and wife retreats whenever offered.

#### FAMILY INVOLVEMENT

The committee recommends continual family involvement in council activities. The committee also recommends each council have a monthly Family Communion. The committee strongly recommends that widows of deceased council members be included and recognized in every aspect of the council's life and activity. This committee further recommends that the council members make themselves available to provide assistance to widows and receive a copy of the council news letter and provide transportation if needed.

#### **YOUTH EXPANSION PROGRAM**

The committee urges each council to actively support the Youth Expansion Program by annually exceeding it's YEP quota, and by involvement in a youth organization such as Columbian Squires, Boy or Girl Scouts and/or Catholic Youth Organization (CYO). The committee recommends that all members in each council be asked to make a personal contribution to our Youth Expansion Program and councils should not depend on fund-raisers only. Each council should consider either making it a part of the dues or adding to their billing a \$10.00 voluntary contribution by each member. The committee recommends that all councils participate in the CYLA Program and that efforts be made to properly recognize the applicants and winners on the council level.

#### SUBSTANCE ABUSE-HEALTH SERVICES

The committee recommends each council sponsor an educational program on substance abuse by the law enforcement agencies to local junior and senior high schools. The committee urges all Knights to recognize local, state and federal law enforcement agencies. The committee further recommends that councils establish blood donation drives, Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) training programs and community blood pressure surveys.

#### FRATERNAL MEMBERSHIP-NEW COUNCIL DEVELOPMENT

The committee wishes to compliment the first degree and major degree teams in the Louisiana Jurisdiction for their excellent exemplifications which act as catalysts in encouraging all councils to obtain new, active members. The committee wishes to remind all members that it is our Supreme Council's desire that we have a KC presence in every church parish and that we should aid all efforts to form a new council or a Parish Round Table. It is also recommended that all members proposing new members into our Order assume responsibility for insuring the first-degree member receives his major degree as soon as possible, and remains an active member. Also, we congratulate all councils that sponsor a first degree team and we strongly recommend that every council make an attempt to establish a team, and that all ceremonials be performed with the proper dignity. The committee recommends that every council make an effort to bring in new members, but that no less effort be expended to retain the members they now have. Council leaders and members should promote patriotism and encourage members of the third degree to join the fourth degree. Councils should make an effort to form and support a Columbian Squires Circle which can be a future source of membership and Ladies Auxiliary. The committee recommends the promoting of young members and make officers and active members promote young ideas. "Turn over the power". Make the KC's a place for young and old to blend and provide babysitters whenever possible. The committee also recommends that all councils send out bulletins monthly or quarterly, and that copies of the bulletin or newsletter be sent to five councils in the state, on a random basis, for the purpose of spreading and stimulating new ideas.

#### **INSURANCE**

In view of our Founder Father Michael J. McGivney's purpose to form a Fraternal Benefit Society so that the widows and children of members when the member dies would not find themselves in dire financial straights, Knights of Columbus Insurance was instituted. As the insurance program not only provides this coverage but also helps to finance many of the programs of the Knights of Columbus, we encourage all members to become insurance members, especially State and Council leaders. The committee recommends that all councils have adequate liability insurance as recommended by Supreme.

#### **PROTOCOL**

The committee recommends that members of the clergy and Knights of Columbus State Family and officers be properly recognized as to their titles or positions at all Knights of Columbus meetings and functions. Also, we remind members of all the important aspects of protocol as explained in the protocol booklet. The committee also recommends that the State Officers reinstate the policy of visiting subordinate councils and protocol be strictly adhered to.

#### SERVICE MENTALLY HANDICAPPED CITIZENS

The Louisiana Knights of Columbus are to be complimented for the tremendous support of the annual statewide fund raising program benefiting the learning impaired. Each council is called upon to continue this important work and to utilize to the fullest the involvement of families, Boy Scouts, Columbian Squires and Ladies Auxiliaries in the fund raising campaign. The committee recommends that councils use publicity to promote the Knight of Columbus donations by secular and religious newspapers. It is recommended that councils become more involved with activities of the learning impaired citizens at the local level and present the funds to them in a personal manner. The committee also urges councils to actively support the Special Olympics Program, as well as St. Mary's Training Facility in Alexandria.

#### SUPPORT OF THE ELDERLY AND INFIRMED

The committee urges each council to become actively involved in providing support for the elderly and infirmed citizens of our communities through such activities as weekly or monthly bingos at the retirement or health care facility, also Christmas-Thanksgiving Dinners, sponsoring Masses and communion services at the facility or just plain visitations. The committee also recommends that councils try to promote these programs at all times of the year, not only holidays and special occasions.

#### **CONCLUSION**

Pursuant to tradition as well as the request of State Deputy, Ronnie Boudreaux, I submit this report regarding the Louisiana State Council ceremonials covering the period July 1, 2011 through April 30, 2012. Accepting the ceremonials program, I embraced the tremendous importance which degree work plays in the growth of our order. Reality tells us that ceremonials are the "backbone" of our order and directly affect our efforts in recruitment and retention. In Louisiana, the lessons of each degree are taught by teams with long histories of professional, dignified and dedicated members. Without a doubt, the overwhelming majority of our First Degree Teams perform completely by memorization, placing them in the exceptional category. A small few are working towards total memorization and I want to commend them for their dedication. The only drawback in this area is the continued lack of an adequate number of First Degree admission teams.

The Supreme Council also recognized this inadequacy, and, as a result, instituted an order wide initiative permitting the reading of the First Degree Ceremonial. Every council in Louisiana is now approved to conduct its own First Degree Ceremonial. Each council has been provided a ceremonial CD that includes music, the narrative parts of the Chancellor, and the Deputy Grand Knight. **Please note that existing certified First Degree Teams were not affected by this initiative and are expected to continue frequent degree work, from memory.** This initiative was instituted to aid councils that are less experienced in admission degree work. The affected councils have been approved, on a trial basis, to conduct First Degrees within the council, when necessary to facilitate the entry of our new members without having to wait. Robes are not required, but if councils have them, they are encouraged to wear them, or utilize the Ceremonial Baldrics. Councils that do not have robes or Ceremonial Baldrics should conduct the degree wearing coat and tie, and jewel of office until Ceremonial Baldrics can be purchased. Each Council should have multiple members to serve as back ups for each role to ensure that a degree is never postponed or cancelled due to a lack of personnel. **While the performance of memorized parts remains the preferred method for the First Degree there will now be a trial period during the 2010-2011 and 2011-2012 fraternal years in which the first Degree may be conducted by reading the parts.** 

Major Degree work in Louisiana remains strong. This jurisdiction now boasts 6 active Second Degree Teams, one each from Alexandria, Baton Rouge, Houma/Thibodaux, Lafayette, Lake Charles and New Orleans. Conferring Officers have increased from 2 to 4. This gain has relieved a tremendous burden on Co's Curley Faulk and Robert Donlon. They have shouldered their burdens and performed admirably. I can't thank them enough for their dedication to ceremonials and the order as a whole. On the flip side of this issue, two brother knights, Scott Willis and Bill Marcantel have been certified as Conferring Officers. In addition two additional Brother Knights have expressed a desire to learn the CO part: Bobby Charpentier and Judge Paul deMahy. With their addition Louisiana will have Conferring Officers equal to the number of Major Degree Teams.

## **Report of Ethnic Program**

To: The Officers and Members of the 107<sup>th</sup> Annual State Convention Meeting of the Louisiana State Council of the Knights of Columbus held in Baton Rouge, Louisiana.

Lafayette. The second Hispanic council, Juan Pablo II, was finalized on March 29, 2012. This was accomplished through the assistance of the Diocese of Lafayette Hispanic Ministry, Cristina LeBlanc, the District Deputy, Robert Donlon, Supreme Consultant, José Jimenez, and Supreme Coordinator, Levy Leiba, coordinating various KC presentations and 1<sup>st</sup> degree exemplifications at five sites (Abbeville, Church Point, Lafayette, and New Iberia). In addition, a 1<sup>st</sup> Degree Team was established to conduct Spanish exemplifications every first Sunday of the month.

Alexandria. With the coordination of the Diocese of Alexandria Hispanic Ministry, two KC presentations were conducted at St. Rita parish: the first on Sunday, April 1, 2012, from the pulpit during the 12:30 PM mass, resulting with seven men filling out the 207 cards requesting more KC information; and the second, a power-point presentation, conducted on April 29, 2012, after their 12:30 PM mass. Following the presentation, six men signed the 100 Form for a 1<sup>st</sup> degree exemplification on May 12.

New Orleans. Two ethnic councils are presently being developed: \*Vietnamese Council: With the efforts of District Deputy Darrel Gonzales, it is anticipated that by June 2012, the first Vietnamese council will have been developed. \*Hispanic Council: The San Andrés men's club has been identified for a KC presentation on May 14, 2012. In addition, other parishes with Spanish masses have been identified to follow within the next months.

Bossier City. On February 16, 2012, during a conversation with Christ the King Church Associated Pastor, Father Rigoberto Betancourt, it was discussed to continue developing the Hispanic council through other presentations during and after the Silver Rose Program (October 2012).

Spanish Major Degrees. During a past major exemplification, a language problem was identified during the ceremonials - Hispanic candidates had difficulty understanding the English exemplification. Following Supreme Consultant José Jimenez's suggestion, on March 24, 2012, Supreme provided headphones and were used for the Lafayette ceremonials; that is, a Spanish speaking knight was situated in the chamber at a "safe" distance, narrating/reading the Spanish Ceremonial procedures to all non-English speaking candidates simultaneously (just like the UN) without disturbing the ceremony.

### **Report of the Marian Program Chairman**

What's in a word? For example, "Mother." All of us as Knights of Columbus have completed first degree exemplification. During our transition to knighthood and membership in the largest organization of Catholic men in the world, we were each "invested" with a Rosary of our Blessed Mother. "Invest." We were counseled, challenged, and commissioned to carry out our knighthood responsibilities with commitment. And we were reassured that we have been called by Christ, in the fellowship of our brother knights, to be witnesses to the Gospel, in our personal lives. We were assured that He would always be with us and that, if we would pray, especially, through His Mother, our prayers would be heard. We are her knights; she is our mother.

Just think of the times that many of us have gathered at the wake of a fellow knight or of a family member of a brother knight. As knights we are encouraged to focus on the lessons to be learned from focusing on the appearances and graces received from Our Lady of Guadalupe, even as we continue to keep up our celebrations of those many other titles of Marian Devotion appropriate to specific cultures and dimensions of the many gifts bestowed upon Our Blessed Mother by her Divine Son.

No longer does an ikon travel, on a fixed schedule, across areas to districts and on to each council with a fixed script. Now, each area coordinator is entrusted with an ikon of Our Lady of Guadalupe and urged to coordinate parish, council, or public celebration of our devotion. At the same time, coincidental with the appropriately increased emphasis on Hispanic Outreach, the custom of a traveling Silver Rose, symbolic of the roses in Saint Juan Diego's tilma, has become yet another way of celebrating devotion to our Blessed Mother. Both of these forms of celebration are available for our expression of this devotion. "Devotion." Blessed John Paul II called, continues to call the world to reinvigorated devotion to Our Blessed Mother, whether through the Rosary's twenty mysteries for meditation; celebration with a text provided, from Supreme Council, to all of our councils, at the recent state convention; or celebration of the hosting and sharing of the Silver Rose (not unlike the Hispanic tradition of *Los Pastores*); or other forms of celebrating our shared devotion.

The important point is that we are all, as knights, to cultivate and celebrate our devotion to Our Blessed Mother most especially in these times of increasing secularization, cultural orientation to the denial of the values of life: before birth, during life, and in the terminal stages of dying. What is important in our devotion is not the form of celebration as much as the committed devotion through Mary to Her Son for the needs which we all as God's family should being sharing with each other. Although there are not any points toward a council's annual report score for expressions of devotion, though perhaps there ought to be, there is a core value to be realized through all of our celebrations. Let us recommit ourselves in the coming fraternal year with reflection, prayer, and witnessing to others that our interests are the interests of Mary and of Her Son and that we celebrate our devotion knowing that "whatever we ask in [Their] name" will be granted to us.

We know this from the words of Our Blessed Mother to Saint Juan Diego, December 9, 1531: "I am your merciful mother of all of you who live united in this land, and of all mankind, of all those who love me, of those who cry to me, of those who have confidence in me. Here I will hear their weeping, their sorrow, and will remedy and alleviate all their multiple sufferings, necessities, and misfortunes."

## **Report of McGivney Guild Chairman**

To: The officers and Members of the 107th Annual State Meeting of the Louisiana State Council, Knights of Columbus, assembled in Baton Rouge, Louisiana on May 5-6, 2012

The Father Michael J. McGivney Guild serves as a source of information about the life, works and spirituality of Father McGivney, our founder. The Guild distributes informational materials about him, receives reports of favors granted through his intercession and oversees the distribution of relics. There are now more than 143,000 members of the Father McGivney Guild. We presently have a membership of over 1.8 million Knights of Columbus.

Each quarter, the Guild sends out updates on current membership in each jurisdiction. Our latest count, per information from the Guild (April 2, 2012), is 5,910 (up from 5,849 on October 1, 2011) members in Louisiana. That's an increase of 61 members.

Total membership in the Knights of Columbus in this jurisdiction, per Louisiana State Council Office, was 33,448 on October 1, 2011. Total membership as of April 2, 2012 was 33,424. Comparing the total membership numbers reveals a membership decrease of 24. The McGivney Guild increase during that same period was 61. This means that our new members are not being fully encouraged to become members of the Guild. The latest comparison reveals that our most recent membership percentage is only 17.7%. It is very possible that we have members that are not credited to us since the application form does not ask about Knights of Columbus membership. It has come to my attention that some Financial Secretaries have, in the past, sent in full roster membership to the Guild.

Based on conversations that I have had with a Representative of the McGivney Guild in the Supreme Office, the following are recommended in order to have our membership recognized as Knights of Columbus in the Louisiana District.

1. The McGivney Guild WILL NOT accept full roster membership applications. It will only accept individual applications in order to insure a true interest in the cause.

2. The Guild on-line application form does not ask for KofC membership information since the Guild is open to ALL interested parties. PLEASE CONSIDER USING OURS!

We ask Insurance General and Field Agents, Area Coordinators, District Deputies, Financial Secretaries and Grand Knights to emphasize this to the membership.

Membership may be gained by completing the attached form and sending in to the Guild. Joining is quick and painless. This will insure that we are recognized as Knights of Columbus in the Louisiana District.

Degree Teams: At the completion of all First Degree Exemplifications, give the new member a Form 100 and a copy of the attached membership application for the McGivney Guild.

Financial Secretaries: Send a copy of this letter and the attached application form to all members at time of billing with the proviso the member can join the Guild without cost. If he is already a member, the new application will ensure credit to the Knights of Columbus.

Insurance Agents: When discussing insurance programs with prospects, emphasize the McGivney Guild membership.

### **Report of Membership Director**

# To: The officers and Members of the 107th Annual State Meeting of the Louisiana State Council, Knights of Columbus, assembled in Baton Rouge, Louisiana on May 5-6, 2012

Brothers, we have had a most successful year in the area of MEMBERSHIP. Our intake goal this past Columbian year was 1,400 new Brother Knights. We attained 1,419 on June 30, 2012. I can't begin to thank all of those who took the recruitment of new Knights seriously. We went on a campaign three years ago to clean up our rosters, find out where we were, remove the deceased, and basically just get our records in order. This of course comes with a price but it will insure future correctness and a starting point for all of those councils who participated. We introduced a major change a couple of years ago which many thought would collapse the Membership program. We moved the State Columbian year to be congruent with the Supreme Columbian year. It took all the guess work out of how many new brothers were recruited during the calendar period. Every month when councils received their notices from Supreme it was exactly where they were in the areas of additions, losses, in both Membership and Insurance. There was sort of an excitement about recruiting. We "Bragged" about our accomplishments and publicized our achievements. We had 10 of the 61 DD's attain over 100% net net in-take. Truly an accomplishment by those DD's

Under the leadership of our State Deputy, Ronnie Boudreaux, and our Supreme Membership Program Director Jose Jimenez we were able to place the State of Louisiana in the Circle of Honor for the first time in over 10 years. Every degree, every function, every meeting our leaders preached Membership. Without new members, there are no ceremonials, Without new members more councils will join the 22 councils listed as Suspended with over 500 Brother Knights that remain unaccounted. Without new Brothers your councils will perish. We were most fortunate to have the leadership team in place that realized the importance of Membership. Two other Brother Knights to be recognized are Worthy State Treasurer Vernon Ducote and Worthy State Warden James Reinte who attended just about every major degree held in the state this past year. Thanks for the super effort.

We continued to promote the "Knight in Shining Armor" award, the V.I.P. program, the multiple "Medallion" programs, the doubling of premium points all which were effective in rewarding those who recruit. The local programs which put us over the top was the "TOP GUN" program. We focused on the positive and rewarded councils for intake attainment rather than the negative net net program. A council could recruit 30 new brothers but loose 25 and only attain a +5. We found a way to reward those councils who took the time to recruit, retain, readmit and to Degree new brothers. We rewarded the Ladies in those top councils for assisting in securing new Knights. We fully implemented the "Welcome Home" program headed up by Lee Allen Simon. We added more degree teams these last few years than ever before. There is just so much to be thankful and positive for and about.

Membership is the lifeblood of our order. I implore you to continue your efforts during this upcoming Columbian year to march forward with the recruitment process. I would once again like to thank all of those who this Columbian year helped to push Louisiana Over The Top. I have had just the best time, the most educational time, and rewarding time the last four years having been the States Membership Director. I hope that during this time I imparted knowledge about the recruitment process. As I retire from my position I can only ask all of you to,

### **Report of Pro-Life Chairman**

# To the Officers and members of the 107<sup>th</sup> Annual Meeting of the Louisiana State Council, Brother Knights, Members, and Guests assembled in Baton Rouge, Louisiana.

This year we were once again very pleased with the progress made in Louisiana in the Pro-Life Program area. More & more Councils have "jumped on the bandwagon" by appointing a Pro-Life Chair Couple & increasing their Pro-Life activities.

In this fiscal year we continued to encourage growth in our "newly created" program area. A major emphasis throughout the year was the accomplishment of four simple, but important tasks by our Grand Knights. These were (1) appoint a Pro-Life Chair Couple, (2) Send in a Pro-Life Chair Couple contact information form, (3) Invite Pro-Life Chair Couples to KCLS, & (4) Support Pro-Life Chair Couples with funding & manpower. This emphasis was included in our articles, in handouts, & in talks we gave, especially those directed towards our Grand Knights. We also encouraged our Council Pro-Life Chair Couples to set up a comprehensive Pro-Life Program which included a variety of activity types including activities that support & promote Pro-Life, activities that are educational & spiritual, and activities that will help influence our voters & elected officials to "think" Pro-Life when they cast their votes.

Also in the current fiscal year, we "fine-tuned" our new Pro-Life Activity Report, changing a few choice words to emphasize the intent of the questions & what was required to achieve 100% on each of the seven questions. Question one requires just one activity, but it must be "substantial" with a Council donating a substantial amount of man-hours or generating or donating a substantial amount of money to a worthy Pro-Life cause. Question two requires appointment of a Pro-Life Chair Couple, sending in a contact information form for the Couple, & providing them with any Pro-Life related materials sent from the State or Supreme. Question three requires two support activities that do not have to be substantial, but there has to be a "ben-eficiary" or someone who receives the "support" from the Council. Question four like number three requires two small activities, but these are "promotional" in nature. The two activities must help "promote" Pro-Life in some fashion. The other questions (numbers five, six, & seven) only require one activity in the areas of Pro-Life and cover educational, spiritual, & influencing political officials or voters.

As was the case last fiscal year, much of our personal time & talents were focused on our annual Pro-Life Seminar at KCLS. We were able to provide some Pro-Life education to many old & new (seasoned & rookie) Pro-Life Chair Couples and have a little fun as well at our two seminars for South & North Louisiana in Prarieville (Geismer) and Natchitoches in July.

This year our agenda included some of the same subjects such as: "What is a Pregnancy Resource Center?", "How to Sponsor a Pro-Life Baby Bottle Campaign", and more information on "Planned Parenthood & Susan G. Komen". Once again we heard from Vince Whittington, Chairman of Louisiana Camp Joshua, our Pro-Life camp for youth.

At KCLS, we also emphasized "promotion" of Pro-Life by handing out "door prizes" throughout the day to the Council Chair Couples, which consisted of promotional materials available from online resources. This included Pro-Life jewelry, t-shirts, brochures, bumper stickers, and other similar items. We even purchased a small tank of helium at the local Wal-Mart and handed out filled helium balloons with Pro-Life messages to encourage purchase of this hi-visibility item for Pro-Life marches. All of the materials can be purchased by Councils to promote Pro-Life or to educate others on Pro-Life issues.

This year we also had a few "new" topics on the agenda including contraception & abortion procedures. The talk on contraception emphasized the many inherent dangers to the mother & her offspring associated with artificial birth control. This includes the fact that women have in increased risk of cancer and other health risks and that all available hormone based birth control products also have an abortifacient quality, meaning that they can actually cause a baby to be aborted if the product is utilized. The abortion procedures talk included a graphic PowerPoint presentation, which included fetal development & a summary of the actual

types of procedures used by abortionists. In order to help provide for a more meaningful presentation, we secured surgical instruments that were actually used in an abortion clinic that was closed down several years ago in Baton Rouge. The clinic was purchased by a Pro-Life group and is now a Pro-Life museum, the "National American Holocaust Memorial". These instruments were passed around at the seminar so that the Couples could examine them "hands-on".

After KCLS, much of our time was spent sending out "alerts" & current event articles to our Council Chair Couples, answering questions via e-mail or telephone, and writing articles for the Louisiana Knight. We turned in four articles for publication once again this year for the quarterly State KC publication.

We also encouraged local Councils in the Acadiana area to help support *Students for Life* at the UL Lafayette campus. This group is presently trying to "grow" their ministry, something that will have a positive impact on our State Pro-Life program. The *Students for Life* groups are an integral part of our *Louisiana Camp Joshua*, providing the youth counselors for this important project, which is a cooperative effort between the *Louisiana Knights of Columbus, Louisiana Right to Life Federation, & Students for Life*. With continued growth in *Students for Life* groups we will enjoy a greater potential in establishing even more Camp Joshua weekends throughout the State.

In January 2012, we had the opportunity to speak very briefly at Grand Knights Day. We let those in attendance know that we understood the difficulty of trying to fill all of the positions for their Officers & Directors each year since it takes over thirty persons to fill these slots. Despite this challenge, we emphasized to the Grand Knights the importance of doing the four tasks mentioned earlier and reminded them that while all of our program areas are important, improving the quality of life for many, only Pro-Life is truly "life or death", and therefore carries with it special importance.

In March & April, we graded the State Activity Reports and saw continued growth in the Pro-Life area. We could also see though that a few Councils may need to appoint a "fresh" couple with more energy & new ideas. The "job" of the Pro-Life Chair Couple is no longer what it used to be, given the substantially increased requirements suggested by the new activity report.

As we prepare this report, we continue to work on the material & plans for this coming year's KCLS seminar, something we started on the way home from KCLS this past year. We are planning a more "fun" agenda with an emphasis on discussion among the Couples about the programs they performed this past year. This year we hope that even more Councils will send their Pro-Life Chair Couples to KCLS to help educate them & provide them a little "reward" for their hard work this year.

It has once again been a pleasure & privilege to serve as Pro-Life Chair Couple for the Louisiana State Council. ## **Report of Scouting Chairman**

# To: The Officers and Members of the 107<sup>th</sup> Annual State Convention Meeting of the Louisiana State Council of the Knights of Columbus held in Baton Rouge, LA.

First, I would like to thank our State Deputy for placing his trust and confidence in me in asking me to be the State Scouting Chairman. I would also like to thanks the many Brother Knights who have supported and helped this program in its fourth year in its current format.

As we reach the end of another year of the State Scouting Program for the Louisiana State Council, the slow growth of the program and the lack of use by councils continues to be a concern. However, it is important to remember that the Worthy State Deputy and I decided that the Knights of the State of Louisiana could do so much more than the program supported by Supreme, in conjunction with the National Catholic Committee on Scouting. Just as a reminder our state program actually has five areas of concentration:

1. Retention of Cub Scout, Boy Scout and Venturing units that are in danger of folding due to the loss of their chartering partner;

2. The creation of new Cub Scout, Boy Scout and Venturing units to bring the Scouting program to underserved areas;

3. The promotion and sponsorship of the Catholic Religious Emblems program;

4. The promotion of increased volunteerism in the Scouting program by our Brother Knights, at the unit, district and/or diocesan levels;

5. Recognition of Brother Knights who have given years of service to the Boy Scouts of America though a new state award, the Francis J. Parater Award.

During this fourth year of the program we have had the slow down in the actual use of the program by councils continue, but we have still had some progress in the areas of concentration:

1. In terms of unit retention we have not been contacted by any units this year that were looking for help in finding a new chartered partner. While this may initially seem like a negative, we can only hope that the reason for no calls is that no units are in danger of losing their charter due to non-Scouting issues;

2. We have had no new units chartered to Councils or Assemblies to date this year but seven councils and two Assemblies have asked for information on how to bring Scouting to their areas;

3. A major change was undertaken in the scoring for the State Deputy's Award two years ago. While we still want councils to promote and sponsor the Catholic Religious Emblems program, some councils have not been able to participate in this program due to lack of interest from their local Scouting units. The scoring is now based on councils explaining how they have supported the Scouting program throughout the year. Promotion and sponsorship of the Catholic Religious Emblems program is just one way to meet this item. A list of suggested ways councils can support Scouting can be found on the state website at http://www.louisianakc.org/ programs/scouting/;

4. While many of our Brother Knights are very visible in their volunteerism with the Scouts, there are many more that fly under the radar. This makes it very difficult to track how we are doing in increasing the number of Knights who are volunteering with the Scouts at various levels. We will continue to emphasize the crossover potential of Knights and Scouting volunteers in the years to come;

5. The number of qualified nominations for the Parater Award continues to grow. Presentation of the awards to the nominees has not yet occurred as we ran into some logistical issues in having the actual awards made. These issues have been overcome and I am looking forward to the opportunity to make the first award presentation. Due to issues in scheduling with the various Diocesan Catholic Committees on Scouting to make presentations, we will be scheduling with each nominating council a presentation date so we can recognize these worthy Brothers. The nomination form and a biography of the awards namesake can be found on the state website at http://www.louisianakc.org/programs/scouting/. In addition, we are asking councils to complete the information on Scouting units in their areas chartered by Catholic Churches or Schools that are not served by a council. This form will be included in the packets that councils receive at KCLS. In this upcoming year we hope to make this form available on the state website and to distribute it to Assemblies as well. It is our hope that we can get a comprehensive listing of Scouting units chartered to Catholic institutions.

The State Scouting program also publishes a tri-fold brochure that contains information on the Scouting Religious Emblems Program, the history of Scouting & the Knights, the contact information for each Diocesan Catholic Committee on Scouting and the contact information for each Scouting Council in the State of Louisiana. This brochure can be downloaded from the state website at http://www.louisianakc.org/programs/scouting/.

While the state Scouting program is still in its infancy, we are making great strides in turning this into one of the state's preeminent programs. The Boy Scouts of America is one of this country's great youth programs and we will find many of our future Knights in their ranks.

### **Report of Y.E.P. Program**

To the officers and members of the 107th Annual State Convention of the Louisiana State Council assembled in Baton Rouge on May4-6, 2012.

I would like to thank our Worthy State Deputy Ronnie Boudreaux for appointing me as the State YEP Chairman over the past two years. It has been a wonderful experience and opportunity for me to serve as your YEP Chairman and promote the Youth Expansion Program (YEP).

The Youth Expansion Program (YEP) is an important Knights of Columbus Fund Raising activity for the Youth Programs that are sponsored by the Knights of Columbus in the State of Louisiana. As of April 29, 2012, the total YEP funds collected is \$110,247. These funds represent the Contributions from Councils and Individuals directly to YEP, as well as 50/50 Raffles at all State functions/meetings/activities. Additionally, the Duffour Family requested donations to YEP in leu of flowers for the Funeral of Brother Knight Rene J Duffour, \$780.00 was collected on behalf of Brother Rene J Duffour and donated to YEP.

The \$110,247 YEP amount collected is short of the 2012 YEP Goal this year of \$135,000, but collections are still coming in and we are hopeful that we can still meet the 2012 YEP Goal. The State Deputy and State Family would like to thank those Councils who have contributed to and participated in YEP this year.

The YEP funds collected this year will be the budget amount for Youth Activities for the 2012-2013 year. To maintain the funding level next year for the KC Youth Programs and Youth Benefits as provided this year, we must meet the \$135,000 YEP Goal.

The YEP program is considered an investment in our Youth, which is an investment in the future of our Church, Family and Community. As of April 29, 2012, there are 185 Councils in the State of Louisiana that have yet to contribute any amount to the YEP program. The Knights of Columbus State Council in Louisiana is requesting a better participation from the Councils in our state. Only 39% of our Councils in Louisiana participated at any level in the YEP Program. Any amount contributed to YEP makes a difference to this worthy cause and is greatly appreciated. Our goal is to have all councils participate at some level in YEP to stand side-by side with our Brothers across Louisiana to support the Youth of our Great State of Louisiana.

A five page Follow-up Summary of answers and recommendations were provided with the YEP Quiz to explain YEP and provide suggestions to Councils for planning and implementing a successful Youth Expansion Program. Positive feedback was received on this YEP Quiz and the Follow-up Summary Report.

YEP articles were published in State Newsletters as well as on the State Website. Handouts were put in all packets for State Meetings, including KCLS and GK Day. Numerous emails and phone calls were fielded by the YEP Chairman in response to YEP issues.

Financial responsibilities for YEP was handled by the YEP Chairman. Receipt of all funds through check and cash (50/50 raffles) were tallied recorded and submitted to the State Secretary / State Treasurer through a voucher system. Reconciliation of the YEP Collections with the State Secretary / State Treasurer was performed. Spread sheets of YEP performance was maintained by the YEP Chairman and submitted to the State Office Administrator upon request. All YEP Award data was tabulated by the YEP Chairman and submitted to be presented at the 2012 State Convention.

The State Council wishes to thank all Councils and Individual contributors for their support of YEP and look forward to your continued support in future years for this Worthy Program. May God bless you, your family and your Council for your support of our Youth and Unborn through your generous participation in YEP.

#### **Pro Life Oratory Contest**

On January 22<sup>nd</sup>, 1973 Roe vs. Wade was passed shortly followed by the lesser case of Doe vs. Bolton stating that a woman could legally have an abortion any time before labor for practically any reason, whatsoever. There are many arguments concerning the subject of abortion and today I'll focus on one in particular. I intend to address the lie which states that because the unborn is still within the womb, it is not a human person, tell you what the Catholic Church believes on this matter, and then, I will tell you a personal story about a lovely little girl who is the reason I chose this subject.

What defines a living human being? When does its life begin? After all, if the unborn is not a human being, no justification for abortion would be necessary; however, if the unborn is a human being, no justification would be adequate because then abortion would just be another word for murder. Some may argue that the baby is dependent on the mother for nutrition and life, and therefore cannot be regarded as its *own* human life.

However, it is a fact that the child is "alive, distinct, and human". The unborn is always growing and is therefore alive, removing the concept of non-life. It is distinct: it has a gender, a totally different blood type, in fact a totally different blood stream, and a unique fingerprint. And it is human; you cannot change what you are; the principle of non-contradiction states that an item cannot be and not be something at the same time. The DNA of this fetus is distinctly human. The reason I don't include *when it can live* independently is because I'm fairly certain that you can put a newborn into the woods and it still is dependent on your care.

Going beyond science, even in the earliest beginnings of the Church there was a distinct belief regarding Abortion. I believe it was best stated by Tertullian, an early Church Father in the third century, who once said, "Now we allow that life begins with conception because we contend that the soul also begins from conception; life taking its commencement at the same moment and place that the soul does" (Apology 27). So, from the point of view of the Church, and not just the biology, Abortion is still *wrong* because it destroys not only the body, but the life, which stems from the soul.

Having explained why the fetus is a human life, we must recognize exactly what could be wrong with killing an innocent life. For this debate is ongoing not because of the arguments, but because it deals with real *people*. Us. Our Lives, not just someone 'out there'. Here's a story to bring it closer to home.

It was November 20<sup>th</sup>, 1997... 6:30 a.m. a young scared prostitute drove herself to the hospital for extreme abdominal pain. The doctor told her that she was in labor and must stay there; the law at the time said that after a woman is in labor she may not leave the hospital. The girl was especially worried now. She couldn't be in labor; she had an abortion scheduled for 9 o'clock that morning. And she was only 24 weeks along. No, it wasn't possible.

Needless to say, at 7:30 this frightened young woman gave birth to a baby girl, 1lb 7oz, named Angel Life; the girl left and wasn't seen again; Baby Angel's father is unknown. Angel was given to a young adoptive couple, fresh out of college, with two little children already. They renamed her Emily Elizabeth. She is my little sister. She is a delightful young lady now, at the age of 14. I grew up being kicked awake by this same sister, until a surgery left her unable to walk. She has beautiful black, wavy hair and a smile that lights up the world. She was the cutest baby ever. She was so tiny; you could hold her in one hand. She has inspired many, including myself. Her mother gave her more than genetics, unfortunately. She has fetal alcoholism syndrome as a result of her mother's drinking problem and, though she has since been weaned off it, was born addicted to crack.

My little sister was *this close* to not existing, *this close* to not being the smiling little girl who makes the old ladies cry as they walk past her wheelchair in Sunday morning Mass. And what if she *had* been aborted; what then? My family wouldn't be complete. It would be minus a vital member. She was nearly murdered by the number one killer of Americans, the number one killer of people anywhere under the age of... any age for that matter. This bestial slaughterer is called Abortion.

Did you know that many of my best friends were murdered by this horror? Imagine for a moment, if 30,000 people were killed and missing from Tiger Stadium. Do you think anyone would notice? One third of my generation has been lost to Abortion. A *third*! I am a survivor of the American *Holocaust*. If any of you are born after January 22<sup>nd</sup>, 1973, you too are counted among the survivors. Do we ever feel any survival's guilt as a result? I mean, it's not like I knew any of them personally, but then, neither did I know any of the victims of 9/11. Yet, we mourn them every year and then some. However, if you combined all genocidal occurrences together, it would pale in comparison to the number of abortions! 4,000 infants are killed *every* day and that's in America alone! These fetuses or "young ones", as it means in Latin, are slaughtered like common beasts.

No matter how you describe a human being, according to my own belief the human being's life begins at the *moment* of conception because it is alive, distinct, and human at that *moment*. I have told my sister's story and as much as this story is miraculous it is not an exclusive story; there are many of its kind that I have had the privilege to hear. There are many arguments I could dispute, many points I could make, but the simple fact is that since the unborn is a human being, it has those basic human rights to "*Life*, Liberty, and the pursuit of happiness".

However society is structured, the basic cell remains the individual family. It should be a principle of good government therefore, that no law should be passed with possible social consequences without first considering what effect it would have on family life and especially on children.

Religion is always personal, but never just a private affair. Discipleship involves seeking God in this world, was well as preparing to meet him in the next. Gospel imperative to love our neighbor entails not only that we should help those in need, but also address the causes of destitution and poverty. The deepening of the spiritual life must go hand in hand with practical concern of our neighbor, and thus with social action.

Charity is the first principle of the Order. It's the first lesson we learn upon becoming a Knight. Ideally, it should be the first thing people think of when they think about the Knights of Columbus.
