# Knights of Columbus Louisiana State Council 102nd ANNUAL MEETING

May 4-6, 2007...Alexandria, Louisiana

### **PROCEEDINGS**

#### FIRST DAY'S SESSION

At 10:45 a.m., Saturday, May 5, 2007, State Deputy Donald Fontenot called to order the 102nd Annual Meeting of the Louisiana State Council, Knights of Columbus, in the Riverfront Center, Alexandria. Upon the State Deputy's direction, State Warden Ronnie Boudreaux and his assistants, having pre-determined the fact, reported that all in the council chamber have been verified and were in possession of a current KC membership card. State Deputy Fontenot then called upon Msgr. Joseph Susi, State Chaplain, to lead the assembly in the opening prayer.

The State Deputy then requested the assembly to remain standing for the posting of the national colors, followed by the pledge of allegiance to the flag, conducted by Master Tim Boudreaux.

In opening remarks, State Deputy Fontenot states "we would like to take this opportunity on behalf of Brother Kenneth Ducote and Brother Knights of the Alexandria area in welcoming you to the 102nd Annual Meeting of the Louisiana State Council." Mr. Fontenot went on to welcome all clergy in attendance.

State Deputy then recognized the Past State Deputies in attendance.

Brother Fontenot then called on State Advocate John Boudreaux to review the rules of the 102nd Annual Meeting. Mr. Boudreaux reviewed all rules and also commented that the rules had been published in the *Louisiana Knight*. Brother Boudreaux then moved for acceptance of the printed rules. The motion was seconded by Don Cubbage, Council 8978, Sulphur.

State Deputy Fontenot then formally announced the appointment of Honorable Paul J. deMahy, St. Martinville, as Convention Parliamentarian. Judge deMahy gave a few remarks on the rules and instructions about being a delegate and visiting knights. He then explained the process of the elections.

The State Deputy then called upon State Secretary Ben Davidson for the presentation of the Temporary Roll. Davidson explained the procedure for conducting the Temporary Roll Call will be in effect until the Permanent Roll is developed and presented by the Credentials Committee and approved by the State Council. The State Secretary then moved to accept these records as the Temporary Roll Call of the State Council Meeting and seconded by Henry Sobon, Council 3246, Metairie.

Since appointments to convention committees are well displayed on the convention bulletin board located in the foyer by the Registration Desk and since these appointees were notified by personal letters, State Deputy Fontenot announced that these appointments would not be read unless he was requested to do so by the assembly, and if an appointee is replaced at the convention by his alternate, then the alternate shall serve on the committee.

These appointments are found on pages 19-20.

The State Deputy then called upon State Secretary Davidson for the presentation of the minutes of the last State Council Meeting. The State Secretary moved that due to the length of these minutes, that the minutes be referred to the Minutes Committee without reading them. The motion was seconded by Ronald Authement, Council 2925, New Orleans..

State Deputy Fontenot then recognized Brad A. Picard, Council 8978, Sulphur, Chairman of the Minutes Committee for his committee's report. Upon his conclusion, Brother Picard moved for the acceptance of the minutes committee report. The motion was seconded by Donald Cubbage, Council 8978, Sulphur.

The complete report of the Minutes Committee can be found on page 80.

The State Deputy moved to close the open session to conduct business outside the normal scope of the third degree. The motion was seconded by Paul Gagnet, Council 1437, New Orleans. Business conducted included Squires, Louisiana Knight Foundation and Bishop Greco Foundation. These reports can be found in the reports section.

The convention was reconvened at 11:35am

Being recognized for this purpose, State Deputy Fontenot then announced that a number of communications have been received. He moved

that these communications be referred to the Felicitations Committee without reading and/or debate. This motion was seconded by Edward Gill, Council 2925, New Orleans. The report of the Felicitations Committee can be found on pages 63-64.

At this time, the State Deputy then called for reports of State Officers. He requested State Secretary Ben Davidson assume the chair for the purpose of introducing the State Deputy, and requesting his rendering of the State Deputy Report. State Deputy Fontenot then presented his report, encompassing the myriad of activities, projects, programs, and undertakings of Columbianism in the Louisiana Jurisdiction during the past fraternal year. Upon completion of that report, the State Deputy was accorded a standing ovation from the State Council. PSD Don Cubbage, Council 8978, Sulphur, moved for the adoption of the report. Ernest Larose, Council 8743, Chackbay, seconded the motion, and the motion carried unanimously. The complete report of the State Deputy is reproduced in these proceedings beginning on page 21..

State Secretary Davidson then requested that the State Deputy again assume the chair and this was accomplished. State Deputy Fontenot then called upon State Secretary Ben Davidson, Council 3407, Shreveport, to render his report and recognized him for this purpose. The State Secretary then rendered a detailed report to the assembly. Upon his conclusion, Davidson moved that the report be received with thanks, and it be referred to the appropriate committees. The motion to adopt the report was made by Albert Duplantis, Council 3208, Lake Charles, and was seconded by Leonard Rogers, Council 5755, Westlake. The motion carried unanimously. Reproduced in these proceedings, the State Secretary report as of June 30, 2007, begins on page 38.

The report of the State Treasurer was then called for by the State Deputy, who recognized State Treasurer Earl Bulot for that purpose. State Treasurer Bulot presented his report, stating that the report to be reproduced in the minutes of this convention would be as of June 30, 2007. When he concluded his report, Bulot moved for its acceptance and reference to appropriate committees. Randy Guillor, Council 9294, Echo, moved to adopt the report, and it was seconded by Dennis Cass, Council 2878, Metairie. The motion carried without dissent. The full report of the State Treasurer, as of June 30, 2007, can be found in these minutes beginning on page 42.

The State Deputy then called for the report of the State Advocate John Boudreaux, Council 7557, Broussard. The State Advocate report was read and upon its conclusion moved for the acceptance of his report. Jerry Tarrantino, Council 8546, Metairie, moved for the adoption of the report. Seconded by Brandon Hendricks, Council 8442, Violet, the motion unanimously carried. Reproduction of these minutes appear in this report beginning on page 46.

State Deputy Fontenot then called for the report of the State Warden, recognizing State Warden Ronnie Boudreaux, Council 10902, New Iberia, for this purpose. State Warden Boudreaux presented his report and upon its conclusion, he moved for its acceptance. The motion for acceptance was then presented by Dennis Cass, Council 2898, Metairie, and was seconded by Joe Perque, Council 8743, Chackbay. The motion carried without dissent. The report of the State Warden can be found starting on page 49.

Calling for the report of the State Office Administrator, the State Deputy then recognized Robert Boudreaux, Council 3202, Lafayette, for this purpose. The State Office Administrator then rendered his report. Upon its completion, Kerry Naquin, Council 8616, Pointe-Aux-Chenes, moved for its adoption and reference to appropriate committees. Seconded by George Martinez, Council 8743, Chackbay. The motion carried unanimously. The full report of the State Office Administrator is reproduced in these proceedings, beginning on page 51.

State Deputy Fontenot then called for the report of the Master of the Fourth Degree, recognizing Master Tim Boudreaux, Council 10902, New Iberia, for this purpose. Master Boudreaux presented his report and upon its conclusion, he moved for its acceptance. The motion for acceptance was then presented by Billy Picou, Council 1710, Patterson, and was seconded by Wayne Duhon, Council 12997, New Iberia. The motion carried without dissent. The report of the Master can be found starting on page 132.

State Deputy Don Fontenot then recognized Supreme Treasurer/Board Member Jack O'Reilly for comments. Brother O'Reilly then addressed the body and at his conclusion, the State Deputy moved for his comments to be placed in the proceedings of this convention. Randy Guillory, Council 9294, Echo, motioned and Gerald Marse, Council 2436, Reserve, seconded. By unanimous vote, the comments were approved.

Having completed receipt of reports of state officers, State Deputy Fontenot then called for the submission of any resolutions not yet submitted for action. He explained that there was no need to read the resolutions but merely submit them to the State Advocate. He explained further that any resolutions submitted after this point would need the approval of the convention's delegates to be considered for action thereon.

Proceeding to the receipt of convention committees, State Deputy Fontenot called for the report of the Audit Committee and recognized Grand Knight Mike D. Rose, Council 3779, Shreveport, committee chairman, for this purpose. Brother Rose rendered the full report and having completed the report moved for its adoption. Seconded by Kenny Eberts, Council 3061, Covington, and the motion carried. The Audit Committee report may be found on page 49.

The State Deputy then called for the report of the Memorials Committee and recognized Grand Knight Ray Riviere, Council 9623, Laplace, for this purpose. Riviere presented the committee report and moved for its adoption. Seconded by Edward Gill, Council 2925, New Orleans, the motion carried. The Memorials Committee report begins on page 71.

Calling for the report of the Felicitations Committee, the State Deputy recognized Grand Knight Louis T. Calato, Council 1437, New Orleans, for this purpose. Calato presented the committee report and moved for its adoption. Seconded by Jerry Tarrantino, Council 8546, Metairie, the motion carried without dissent. The Felicitation Committee report is reproduced in these minutes and begins on page 63.

The State Deputy then called for the Good of the Order Report. The State Deputy recognized Grand Knight Gordon Plaisance, Council 3150, Cut Off, Committee Chairman for that purpose. Grand Knight Plaisance presented the committee report and moved for acceptance, and Henry Landry, Council 5352, Pierre Par-Belle River, seconded. The motion carried without dissent. The report of the Good of the Order Committee is reproduced in these minutes and begins on page 65. The committee also recommended all future committee members be sent the entire "good of the order" resolution prior to convention.

Under "special orders" of the State Council's By-Laws, in Section 6:1, the State Deputy then called for nomination for officers of the State Council and representative and alternate representatives of the State Council to the Annual Supreme Council Meeting. With the new balloting and

counting procedure, all nominations will also be closed on the first day. He explained that our by-laws allow a maximum of three minutes for making a nomination and that nominations shall not be seconded. Fontenot emphasized that all nominators must submit a written report of their respective nominees' names along with mailing addresses, council numbers and membership numbers to the State Secretary; and if the nomination is for State Deputy or insurance representative, a Knights of Columbus insurance certificate number of the nominee must also be provided in the written report. The State Deputy further advised that the ballots would list candidates in alphabetical order. Besides those Knights of Columbus already entitled to the floor, any third degree member in good standing can be granted the privileges of the floor for the purpose of submitting a nomination; however, such action must be approved by the assembly. Printed nomination forms are available at the State Secretary's Registration Desk. Fontenot then opened the floor for nomination for State Officers and the following nominations were received:

The State Deputy then announced that "nominations are now closed."

State Deputy Fontenot then moved that all nominees for the offices of insurance and/or associate delegate to the 2007 Supreme Council Meeting be hereby accepted as nominees for alternate representatives in their respective categories and be it further moved that after the elected representatives in each category, the next four candidates in descending vote position in each category be deemed elected as the alternate representative. Karl Guidry, Council 10293, Lafayette, seconded the motion and the the proposal was accepted unanimously.

State Deputy Fontenot then made announcements and urged all in attendance to be prompt for the 5:00pm Convention Vigil Mass and to remain until all Ministers of the Mass have proceeded out of the chamber. Fontenot then called upon Msgr. Francis Carabello, New Orleas Diocesan Chaplain to offer a closing prayer.

State Deputy Don Fontenot then recessed the convention at 2:10pm.

#### SECOND DAY'S SESSION

State Deputy Donald Fontenot called to order at 9:20am the second day of the 102nd Annual Meeting of the Louisiana State Council, Knights of Columbus. After State Warden Ronnie Boudreaux and his assistants had verified that all in the chamber were in possession of a current K.C. Membership Card. State Chaplain Msgr. Joseph Susi led the assembly in the opening prayer. The State Deputy then asked Master Tim Boudreaux to lead the body in the Pledge of Allegiance.

The State Deputy asked State Chaplain to remain at the podium to render his remarks to the convention.

The State Deputy then called State Secretary Ben Davidson to the podium to begin the procedures for certifying the Permanent Rolls of this State Council Meeting. During the collection of these Permanent Rolls, State Deputy Fontenot called on Elections Committee Advisor, PSD David Bakeler to instruct the delegates on the procedure for completion of the ballot and also instructed his committee to prepare the ballot box. Upon completion of balloting, State Deputy Fontenot ordered Elections Committee to seize the ballot box and to retire to tally votes. The State Secretary then completed his report of the Credentials Committee and he moved for its adoption. Larry Comeaux, Council 8901, Lafayette, seconded the motion and the report carried unanimously. The full report of the Credentials Committee along with the Permanent Roll of the Annual Meeting is found in these proceedings beginning on page 53.

The State Deputy asked Associate State Chaplain Carson LaCaze to the podium to render his remarks to the convention.

The State Deputy then recognized the three (3) "Most Improved Councils" for the previous fraternal year. They were:

The State Deputy then distributed "Top 20" Certificates to those councils finishing in the top of the State Deputy scoring.

State Deputy Don Fontenot, with the assistance of YEP Chairman, Joel Ocmand, presented certificates to all councils who had made their YEP Quota for the year.

State Deputy Fontenot then called upon Youth Expansion Program Chairman Ocmand to render his report. In making his report, Chairman Ocmand emphasized that his report, as it will appear in the proceedings of this meeting, will be inclusive of all receipts through June 30, 2007. He urged councils not yet participating in the YEP to date, to please do so, prior to that June 30th closing date.

Brother Ocmand then thanked everyone for their great support of the offertory at both Masses and moved for the adoption of the YEP Report. Carson Kelly, Council 1134, Alexandri, then seconded the motion, and the report was accepted by acclamation. The complete YEP report may be found beginning on page 144.

Returning to the receipt of Convention Committee reports, the State Advocate was then called upon, as Chairman of the Resolutions Committee, to present the committee report and then explained that when the report reached the point of calling for action on the specific resolutions, the chairman would read the purpose and resolved clauses of the resolution and then read the recommendation of the resolution committee. "Your silence would indicate your agreement with that recommendation in which case I will rap the gavel indicating that the recommendation of the Resolutions Committee is adopted," the State Deputy announced. "If you wish action other than the committee's recommendation, appropriate motions, seconds, discussion and action are in order," he concluded. He then recognized the Committee Chairman who explained that he would read the purpose of the resolution, then read the resolved clauses, then read the recommendations of the Elected State Officers, that of the Advisory Board, and the recommendation of the Resolutions Committee, and if necessary, the rationale of the committee's recommendation. Floor action would be on the recommendation of the resolutions committee. Utilizing this procedure, the chairman then presented the resolutions committee report, and upon its completion, Brother John Boudreaux moved for its adoption. Rufus Nolands, Council 3208, Lake Charles, seconded and the motion carried. The report of the Resolutions Committee can be found beginning on page 81.

For the purpose of rendering his committee report, State Treasurer Earl Bulot, Chairman of the Budget & Finance Committee, was recognized. Chairman Bulot presented the committee's report. Brother Bulot moved for its adoption and was seconded by Maurice Evans, Council 7355, Houma. The complete text of this committee report is found in these minutes beginning on page 50.

The State Deputy then recognized Grand Knight Trevor P. Benoit, Council 8371, Amelia, Chairman of the Elections Committee for his committee report. Brother Benoit, rendered his report and then moved for its adoption. It was so moved, seconded by Nolan Leblanc, Council 1087, Donaldsonville, and carried. The full report of the Elections Committee is found in these proceedings on pages 61-62.

The State Deputy then called upon 2008 Convention Co-Chairmen Donald Ducote and David Guillot for introductions and comments pertaining to next years convention in Kenner.

The re-elected State Deputy, State Secretary, State Treasurer, State Advocate and State Warden then rendered closing comments. State Deputy Fontenot commended the attendees still in attendance and reminded councils scoring sheets could be claimed at the conclusion of the meeting.

State Chaplain Msgr. Joseph Susi led the delegation in the closing prayer.

State Deputy Fontenot then adjourned the 102nd Annual Meeting of the Louisiana State Council, Knights of Columbus at 12:01pm.

#### SUPREME CONVENTION

Louisiana is always well represented by true Brother Knights who serve as delegates to the Supreme Council Meeting. And this past year was no different. There were (30) thirty men and women present in Orlando to represent Louisiana. And as usual we served King Cakes and Hurricanes. There was also some of the best southern hospitality to be had. in our hospitality room. The room was decorated and staffed by ladies and men from our delegation, and what a job they did. Members should be encouraged to schedule visits and communicate by phone, E-Mails, and or letters. So it is that I would ask each Grand Knight to please promote this worthwhile program at the Council level. Who knows your Council winner may one of the twenty four (24) finalists at the State finals next year. I want to THANK Wayne Lemoine for his dedication to the program. Thank you Wayne for a job well done. Thank you to each and everyone who helped Wayne on the State level, Job Well Done.

# MEMBERSHIP AND NEW COUNCIL DEVELOPMENT

Membership growth is necessary for the Order in Louisiana to continue our good works. Membership Director Joel Ocmand and I talked early on about how we would convey this message to the Councils. I am happy to say that early on it worked. The efforts of the Area Coordinators, District Deputies and the leadership of the local Councils paid off and we were looking at a banner first six months. ## **State Treasurer Report**

To: The Officers and Delegates to the  $102^{nd}$  Annual Meeting of the Louisiana Jurisdiction of the Knights of Columbus, assembled in Alexandria, Louisiana on May  $4^{th}$ ,  $5^{th}$  and  $6^{th}$ , 2007.

In accordance with Section 7.2 of the By-Laws of the Louisiana State Council, it is with Great Pride and Honor for me to present this Annual Report of the State Treasurer for the Fraternal Year 2006-2007.

Serving as State Treasurer for the Louisiana Jurisdiction has been a most rewarding opportunity and an even greater learning experience for me this past year. It has given me the opportunity to experience another level of the Knights of Columbus and to be of service to the Membership of the Louisiana Jurisdiction.

The accounting procedures established for handling the funds of the State Council are sound and have very good internal controls.

For the State Council as State Treasurer, I handled four financial checking accounts: General Fund Checking, Youth Expansion Current Checking, Acompano Checking, and the Exemplification Fund Checking Account.

The State Council maintains eight trust accounts: General Fund Trust, YEP Current Trust, YEP Fund Raiser Trust, Exemplification Trust, General Fund Unallocated Trust, YEP Unallocated Trust, Fourth Degree Trust and Louisiana Knights Foundation Trust. These accounts I monitor and report on the earnings monthly. I also make every effort to insure that the maximum amount remains in each account for the maximum return on interest.

All monies are received by the State Secretary, and then forwarded to the State Treasurer for deposit and posting to the proper fund. The voucher system is used for all disbursement of funds. The voucher is prepared by the State Deputy and sent to the State Secretary for recording and production of checks. The State Secretary then forwards the voucher along with the checks to the State Treasurer for action. The State Treasurer records this activity in the monthly accounting system of the State Council; he then signs and mails the checks to the appropriate parties. All checks issued are required to have the signature of two of the following: State Deputy, State Secretary, and/or State Treasurer.

The State Treasurer records all receipts and expenditures to the financial accounting records using the different accounts and prepares a report of all accounts for review of the Elected State Officers, the Immediate Past State Deputy, the State Office Administrator, and the independent auditors office after the end of each month. The bank statement is also reconciled to the State Council accounting records for the checking and trust accounts. Copies of the reconciled statements are forwarded to the State Deputy and State Secretary at the end of each month.

## **State Office Administrator Report**

In accordance with the provisions of the by-laws of the Louisiana State Council, I herby submit my annual report as your State Office Administrator for your consideration.

I would like to thank State Deputy Donald Fontenot for his support in his first year as State Deputy, under the moniker of Invest, Promote & Communicate. His dedication to the Order is paramount, and his desire to see each council succeed is unparralled. It is has been a pleasure serving him this past year.

Susan Camel and Gloria Richard create the support staff for the State Council and I stand before you today, to assure the State Family you can not find any more dedicated individuals.

As I have mentioned in all past convention reports, the State Office is involved, to some degree, in almost every undertaking of the State Council. I am quite confident the reports of your elected and appointed officials will discuss details, thus I will limit my remarks to specific responsibilities of your State Office.

## State Officers Meetings/KCLS/Grand Knights Day

It is the responsibility of this office to prepare ALL printed material for these meetings, and through the help of brother knights at the meeting sites, this important information is distributed during these conferences. A constant concern however, would be the NO SHOWS. The 140 to 180 councils who fail to participate in one or all of these meetings, drive the cost of operating these meetings higher, as we are forced to mail this same literature to the absent councils at the conclusion of each meeting. I would challenge each council in attendance this weekend, to go back and talk to the councils not in attendance, and do what ever it takes to have these NO SHOWS in attendance in the future.

In recent SOM and Grand Knights Day, the State Office has prepared and facilitated Power Point Presentations for the use of meeting presenters. It is the intent of this office to make presentations more interesting for the audience and essentially making the presentation an item meeting goers will retain and take back to their membership.

## State Directory

The current directory included all the changes in the updated state family and we have attempted to publish all corrections in the *Louisiana Knight*., as well as our state website. We have been updating information as it has been provided throughout the year. Timely distribution of the directory is contingent on councils providing the necessary information on a timely basis as well. Once again, we will ask District Deputies to assist the State Office in accumulating this pertinent information. This year directories were distributed in early September, and I would like to thank all District Deputies and Area Coordinators, who helped to expedite the process.

Our plan is to continue to include e-mail addresses in future publications of the State Directory. Our hope and goal is for every state officer to have an email account, and within the very near future, every council with an email address.

The State Office has placed the directory on line, thus making it an up-to-date source of information.

## The Louisiana Knight

As is the standing promise, The Louisiana Knight will attempt to publish every article sent by local councils. I would encourage you to send local information. Articles and pictures that deal with items with a state final may have little opportunity of making it to the pages of the Louisiana Knight.

Of note, the *Louisiana Knight* now publishes only four times per year. Budget cuts has forced the reduction of issues and the production process. For future reference, the *Louisiana Knight* will publish on the last THURSDAY of the months of March, June, September and December. The deadline for submitting articles and photos will be the 15th of the publication month.

Unfortunately, with less issues, some items may not make the pages of the *Louisiana Knight*, and for that, I apologize. But as mentioned above, we will make every attempt to publish local informative articles.

## Athletic Bids

Of note, the 2007 State Bowling Tournament was hosted by the State Council and the State Basketball Tournament was co-hosted by the State Council, and the profit realized is being used to fund the Louisiana State Council Office. The 2007 State Free Throw Contest was also hosted by the State Council, and was a break-even event.

Lee Roy has volunteered to manage the web site at no cost to the State Council, as this retired brother knight has the time and is willing to constantly update our site to make it a wealth of information for the brother knights.

As many of you may know, a web site will only remain popular, if you are constantly making changes and updating information. And with the commitment of Mr. Cates is unbelievable. Our hope is that the web

site will more than compensate for the fewer issues of the Louisiana Knight.

Our plan for the web site to include ALL forms utilized by councils on the state and supreme level is ongoing. Many of these forms are now interactive.

Also, we encourage councils to submit items for our website electronic calendar. That includes any event you would like to have posted. Please send your entries to staff@louisianakc.org, and we will be happy to include your event on the state calendar.

Lastly, we encourage ALL COUNCILS to secure an email account. We believe that within the very near future, all communication will be conducted electronically. The dawn of the new era is NOW.

## State Convention

## **Audit Committee Report**

To: Officers and members of the  $102^{nd}$  Annual Meeting of the Louisiana State Council, Knights of Columbus.

The AUDIT COMMITTEE met in the Red River "A" Room of the Holiday Inn, Alexandria, Louisiana on May 4th, 2007, at 4:00 p.m. The committee's responsibilities were to verify that a certified audit has been completed by competent auditors for the fraternal year 2005 – 2006 and that there were no significant variances with the State Treasurer's Financial Statement of the State Council as of June 30, 2006.

The committee reviewed the auditors' report on the financial transactions of the Louisiana State Council for the period from July 1, 2005 to June 30, 2006. Upon completing its review of the certified audit, the committee found no major discrepancies.

The state officers are to be commended for maintaining expense, essentially within the various fund balances.

The committee on Audit recommends that the State Council continue to perform an audit of all the funds of the Louisiana State Council. The committee further recommends that the State Deputy continue to select a committee of three (3) Past State Deputies, three (3) Grand Knights, the State Financial officers and up to two (2) at large members to oversee the audit.

## **Budget & Finance Committee Report**

To: The Officers and Members of the 102nd Annual Meeting of the Louisiana State Council, Knights of Columbus assembled in Alexandria, Louisiana.

In accordance with Section 19 – Committee on Budget and Finance – of the By-Laws of The Louisiana State Council Knights of Columbus, the following report is presented.

On February 10, 2007, the Elected State Officers met to discuss the proposed Budget for the 2007-2008 Columbian year. A copy of the previous year's budget and the income/expenses through December 31, 2006 were furnished to this group in advance, for their preparation for this meeting.

The proposed Budget was submitted to the Past State Deputies at their Advisory Meeting, on March 3, 2007. The Past State Deputies offered their views and their changes or comments were incorporated in the proposed Budget.

After this meeting, according to the By-Laws of the State Council, two copies were mailed by the State Office administrator to all Councils of record.

The Budget and Finance Committee meeting was held on Friday, May 4th beginning at 4:00 PM in the Red River "B" Room of the Holday Inn in Alexandria, Louisiana. This meeting was for the purpose of continuing the review of the proposed Budget. Included in this review of the proposed Budget for the Louisiana State Council was: General Fund; Youth Expansion Fund; Youth Expansion Fund Raiser; Accompano Fund Raiser; State Council Office Operations; and Investment Transactions.

By accomplishing this task – the Committee on the Budget and Finance has complied with the State Council By-Laws – Section 19 – Committee on Budget and Finance.

The Committee took into account that the Proposed Budget carried the approval of the State Deputy and the Elected State Officers. Prior approval was given by the Advisory Board of Past State Deputies at their meeting in March. Based on the review of the Budget and Finances of the State Council, the Budget and Finance Committee offers the following recommendations to you for your considerations here today.

I would ask that the Budge Finance Committee please come and join me.

- #1: The Committee recommends that the State Council continue to perform an audit of the funds of the Louisiana State Council with the Committee of three (3) Past State Deputies, (3) seated Grand Knights, the State Financial Officers and up to (2) two at large members to oversee the audit. An accountant member should also be appointed if one is available. If no member can be appointed, the committee may hire an accountant to assist.
- #2: The State Per-Capita Tax should stay the same as outlined in the Budget Proposal.
- #3: The Accompano Raffle should continue to assist with the funding of the Accompano program,
- #4: Due to the uncertainty of receipts for the 2006 2007 Youth Expansion Program Budget, The Committee recommends the following: If total income for the 2006.-2007 Fund Raiser does not equal budgeted income, selected Accounts will be decreased with the approval of the Elected State Officers. If funds exceed budget, selected accounts will share in the increased gain with the approval of the Elected State Officers.
- #5: Excess Funds in the General Fund and Y.E.P. be placed in existing investment accounts. Any shortfall resulting in the General Fund Budget: funds may be transferred from the General Fund Unallocated (G-30.0 General Fund Unallocated) with the concurrence of the State Officers.
- #6: The State Treasurer presented a review of the investment account for the Louisiana State Council. Based on this report, the committee recommends continuing with Hibernia Bank Trust Group and requests every effort continues to optimize interest on investments.
- #7: Since the 2007-2008 Budget was mailed to each Delegate to the State Council Meeting the Budget and Finance Committee recommends discontinuing the line item reading.
- #8: A final Financial Statement as of June 30<sup>th</sup> be distributed to each council of record by no later than August 31<sup>st</sup> of the same year.

Worthy State Deputy- the Committee on Budget and Finance moves for the adoption of these line items before concluding this report.

ITEMS 1 – 8 Adoption

The committee agrees that the Budgets for the General Fund, Youth Expansion Fund, Youth Expansion Fund Raiser for 2006-2007, Accompano Fund Raiser for 2006-2007, Exemplification Fund, the Investment Transactions and the State Council Office Operation will be included in the minutes of this State Council Meeting.

## **Good of the Order Committee Report**

# To: The Officers and Members of the 102nd Annual Meeting of the Louisiana State Council held in Alexandria, La.

Your committee on the Good of the Order met on Friday, May 4, 2007, and fully discussed at length the following activity areas. After due deliberation, the committee urges all council, district and state leaders to see that the following recommendations are fully implemented.

The committee would also ask that at future conventions, each member of the Good of the Order Committee, as appointed, be forwarded a copy of the previous year's Good of the Order report to prepare committee members as to what is to be discussed.

## FIRST AND FOREMOST WE ARE CATHOLIC

The committee recommends the recitation of the Serran Prayer for Vocations at each council meeting and that the council chaplain should encourage the recitation of this prayer at all Masses. The committee further recommends that a prayer be offered at each council meeting for the beatification of our founder Father Michael J. McGivney. The council chaplain should be encouraged to be actively involved in council activities. In the absence of the council Chaplain, a deacon shall be asked to bring the message of our faith. The committee urges all councils to participate in the Refund Support Vocations Program (RSVP). Each council should consider sponsoring a speaker on vocations to the various parochial schools. Recognizing that some clergy may still be apprehensive to Knights of Columbus involvement, the committee recommends each council strongly consider implementation of the Parish Round Table Program and thus show evidence of our belief that VOCATIONS ARE OUR BUSINESS and that each Grand Knight has a dialogue with each Pastor of churches in his council area. Each council should consider having a speaker on evangelization, to encourage each member to promote the Catholic faith to non-Catholics, and to help fallen-away Catholics to become again active in the Church. One way this can be done effectively is by supporting evangelization through the RCIA program.

## **PRO-LIFE**

The committee recommends increased efforts from the state level to provide more timely and specific information to the council level about upcoming activities such as Pro-Life Rallies. The committee encourages area, district and local Right to Life Masses and demonstrations. It is also recommended that continued active exposure to the public by each council be pursued. The committee encourages each council to construct a monument to the unborn in a prominent place, preferably on the church grounds and those that have one to maintain and have programs to bring Pro-Life to parishioners attention. We urge right-to-life education, to fight abortion, and specific projects. Such an enforcement by members and Grand Knights of letter writing campaigns from council members of state and federal governing bodies. We also urge the use of the vast amount of material that is available about the AIDS Virus, and promoting abstinence and chastity as a way of decreasing the threat of AIDS as well as decreasing abortions and moral decay.

The committee also recommends that councils become involved with local Right-To-Life organizations by way of participating in their events and getting on their mailing lists. The committee urges use of material available to them from the Supreme Council pertaining to Pro-Life. The committee also urges members to fight pornography at the council, family and school levels. The committee further recommends that the State Council provide updated information of current Federal and State legislation on Pro-Life and Euthanasia.

Each council appoints a Pro-Life Chairman or Chair-Couple. Each council supports a youth Pro-Life Retreat as sponsored by the State Council. Each council offer a Pro-Life prayer at business meetings.

## **BISHOP GRECO MEMORIAL FUND**

The committee recommends that all councils use the memorial cards to memorialize deceased council members. The card can be filled in with the name of the deceased and the name of the donating council. The card is mailed to the member's family. A donation of \$25.00 is then sent to the Greco Foundation for the trust fund.

## **RETREATS**

The committee recommends that each council have a guest speaker with Catholic Retreats as the subject, and that each council schedule retreats for its members, individual as well as couples, encouraging husband and wife retreats whenever offered.

## **FAMILY INVOLVEMENT**

The committee recommends continual family involvement in council activities. The committee also recommends each council have a monthly Family Communion. The committee strongly recommends that widows of deceased council members be included and recognized in every aspect of the council's life and activity. This committee further recommends that the council members make themselves available to provide assistance to widows and receive a copy of the council news letter and provide transportation if needed.

## YOUTH EXPANSION PROGRAM

The committee urges each council to actively support the Youth Expansion Program by annually exceeding it's YEP quota, and by involvement in a youth organization such as Columbian Squires, Boy or Girl Scouts and/or Catholic Youth Organization (CYO). The committee recommends that all members in each council be asked to make a personal contribution to our Youth Expansion Program and councils should not depend on fundraisers only. Each council should consider either making it a part of the dues or adding to their billing a \$10.00 voluntary contribution by each member. The committee recommends that all councils participate in the CYLA Program and that efforts be made to properly recognize the applicants and winners on the council level. The committee further recommends continued financial support of YEP.

## SUBSTANCE ABUSE-HEALTH SERVICES

The committee recommends each council sponsor an educational program on substance abuse by the law enforcement agencies to local junior and senior high schools. The committee urges all Knights to recognize local, state and federal law enforcement agencies. The committee further recommends that councils establish blood donation drives, Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) training programs and community blood pressure surveys.

## **FRATERNAL**

## MEMBERSHIP-NEW COUNCIL DEVELOPMENT

The committee wishes to compliment the first degree and major degree teams in the Louisiana Jurisdiction for their excellent exemplifications which act as catalysts in encouraging all councils to obtain new, active members. The committee wishes to remind all members that it is our Supreme Council's desire that we have a KC presence in every church parish and that we should aid all efforts to form a new council or a Parish Round Table. It is also recommended that all members proposing new members into our Order assume responsibility for insuring the first-degree member receives his major degree as soon as possible, and remains an active member. Also, we congratulate all councils that sponsor a first degree teams and we strongly recommend that every council make an attempt to establish a team, and that all ceremonials be performed with the proper dignity. The committee recommends that every council make an effort to bring in new members, but that no less effort be expended to retain the members they now have. Council leaders and members should promote patriotism and encourage members of the third degree to join the fourth degree. Councils should make an effort to form and support a Columbian Squires Circle which can be a future source of membership and Ladies Auxiliary. The committee recommends the promoting of young members and make officers and active members promote young ideas. "Turn over the power". Make the KC's a place for young and old to blend and provide babysitters whenever possible. The committee also recommends that all councils send out bulletins monthly or quarterly, and that copies of the bulletin or newsletter be sent to five councils in the state, on a random basis, for the purpose of spreading and stimulating new ideas.

#### **INSURANCE**

In view of our Founder Father Michael J. McGivney's purpose to form a Fraternal Benefit Society so that the widows and children of members in the group when the member dies would not find themselves in dire financial straights, Knights of Columbus Insurance was instituted. As the insurance program not only provides this coverage but also helps to finance many of the programs of the Knights of Columbus, we encourage all members to become insurance members, especially State and Council leaders. The committee recommends that all councils make sure that they have adequate liability insurance as recommended by Supreme.

## **PROTOCOL**

The committee recommends that members of the clergy and Knights of Columbus State Family and officers be properly recognized as to their titles or positions at all Knights of Columbus meetings and functions. Also, we remind members of all the important aspects of protocol as explained in the protocol booklet. The committee also recommends that the State Officers reinstate the policy of visiting subordinate councils and protocol be strictly adhered to.

## SERVICE MENTALLY HANDICAPPED CITIZENS

The Louisiana Knights of Columbus are to be complimented for the tremendous support of the annual statewide fund raising program benefiting the learning impaired. Each council is called upon to continue this important work and to utilize to the fullest the involvement of families, Boy Scouts, Columbian Squires and Ladies Auxiliaries in the fund raising campaign. The committee recommends that councils use publicity to promote the Knight of Columbus donations by secular and religious newspapers. It is recommended that councils become more involved with activities of the learning impaired citizens at the local level and present the funds to them in a personal manner. The committee also urges councils to actively support the Special Olympics Program.

## SUPPORT OF THE ELDERLY AND INFIRMED

The committee urges each council to become actively involved in providing support for the elderly and infirmed citizens of our communities through such activities as weekly or monthly bingos at the retirement or health care facility, also Christmas-Thanksgiving Dinners, sponsoring Masses and communion services at the facility or just plain visitations. The committee also recommends that councils try to promote these programs at all times of the year, not only holidays and special occasions.

## **CONCLUSION**

The committee urges all councils to implement to the fullest extent, the foregoing recommendations. In order to obtain the fullest implementation of these recommendations, the committee urges the State Deputy to insure that all councils receive and display a copy of this report, and that a summary of this report be published in the June issue of the LOUISIANA KNIGHT. Then fliers are sent out to all councils.
- 3. Ask for suggestions to improve the participation of more councils and K.C. members.
  - 4. Change grading forms if necessary
- 5. Be present at every athletic event in the state to assist the council and problem solving.
- 6. Present awards with host to winners of events. Introduce yourself to as many council members at the events. Promote Brotherhood among members.

State Softball Tournament This is a two day tournament. Make sure host council has everything taken care of for their event. If the Miller Family takes care of the event, just sit back and watch a well run tournament. Be present to present awards with host .

State Horseshoe Tournament: This is a one day tournament. Work with host council and chairman to make sure tournament goes well. Make decisions on questions concerning the rulings that may arise. Present awards with host to winners

State Softball tournament: This is a two day tournament. Be available to make decisions if there are conflicts. Be present to present trophies with hose. Be present to present winners with awards.

State Pool Tournament: This is the second year for this event. It is brand new. All went well last year but we are expecting a large turn out for this years event. This was a one day tournament in 2006. Depending on registrations whether or not it will be a one day or two day. Send out paperwork and entry forms. Decide when and where to hold tournament and set up brackets. Be present to present awards to winners.

## **CYLA Chairman Report**

To the officers and members of the 102 State Convention Meeting of the Louisiana State Council Assembled in Alexandria, La. on May 4-6, 2007.

The Catholic Youth Leadership Award Program is one of the most dynamic and rewarding programs that the State Council offers to the Membership. CYLA places an emphasis on Catholic values, scholastic achievement, athletics, and leadership in the areas of church, school and community. Catholic seniors throughout the state of Louisiana are eligible to participate in the CYLA program. The only requirement is that they must be nominated by a council within the Louisiana jurisdiction. Each council that participates in the CYLA program will find it to be both rewarding and fulfilling. Giving outstanding Catholic seniors the opportunity to compete for cash prizes, awards, and recognition is the very foundation of the CYLA program.

The CYLA program begins to take shape at the state officers' meeting held in June. CYLA is discussed at the Knights of Columbus leadership seminar held in July. The CYLA packets are mailed out to the council CYLA chairman or Grand Knight in November. Appeals are made on behalf of CYLA at the state officers' meeting and at Grand Knights' day, encouraging councils to participate in the program. Councils that anticipate in the program turn in their nomination forms to the Area Coordinators. Area Coordinators conduct their respective area competition and award one boy and one girl the distinction of being an area winner as well as a state finalist. The Area Coordinator then sends the nomination forms the finalist to the state chairman. A total of 24 finalists will compete for the state championship. The state chairman appoints ten state level judges who will grade the nomination forms of the finalists and conduct the verbal competition held in April. Copies are made of the finalist nomination forms, but, the names of the finalists are censored so that the state judges are not aware of the names of the finalist or who nominated the finalist. Then the copies of the nomination forms are mailed to the state judges for grading. Upon completion by the state judges, the scores are tallied by the state chairman and are used as part of the overall score of the finalist.

It is cogent to note that this year we did not utilize the council reimbursement feature which allowed a rebate of up to \$50 per finalist in each

council who nominated a finalist, and awarded them a cash prize. Because the CYLA program is funded by YEP, and due to decreased state revenues as a result of many councils being affected from the hurricanes in 2005, a budgetary decision was made by the State Council to forgo the rebates as not to place undue strain on the already limited finances. Not surprisingly, there were no complaints by any councils regarding the absence of rebates. Nearly 150 councils participated in the program this year. This is an excellent result considering that nearly 40 councils were either inactive, or very limited, in the aftermath of the storms. The moratorium on the rebate feature will continue until further notice. With this year's program, we saw that nearly every student nominee utilized the online interactive nomination form found at the state web site. This allows for a neater and more standardized application to be produced, permitting the maximum room for content to describe the nominee's activities and accomplishments. We will continue to streamline the online form and encourage all councils to promote its use. All councils should discard any old paper forms they may have in their files and wait for the new issue of the paper forms they will receive in their new packets, should they choose to use paper forms for their nominees. The use of old forms is strongly discouraged because of the changes in format and of the confusion it tends to create. Please do not use the old forms!

The State CYLA Finals were held at the Lafayette Catholic Diocesan office in Lafayette on April 15, 2007. Registration began at 8:00 a.m. and concluded at 8:45 a.m. All 24 finalists registered for the competition. The verbal interviews began at 10 a.m.. Lunch was served at noon, provided by Council 5499 from Crowley. Judging continued at 1 p.m.. The interviews concluded at 3:30 p.m.. The state deputy awarded all of the finalists a check in the amount of \$400 as part of their area level winnings. Pictures of the finalists were taken and all area coordinators in attendance had the opportunity to have a picture taken with their finalists. The auditing committee tallied the scores and presented the scores to the state chairman and a winner in the boy and girl division was declared by the state chairman.

A rare occurrence this year was that the 2007 State Winners were both nominated by the same Council, that being the Sacre' Coeur Council 5499 in Crowley. **Blandon David of Crowley and Katie Rimmer of Rayne** were the boy and girl winners this year. Blandon will be at-

tending Tulane University, majoring in business, and will then pursue the study of medicine, finally aspiring to become a dermatologist. He also aspires to get married, be a positive role model in his community, and become an outstanding husband and father, like his dad. Katie plans to attend an out-of-state college, like Harvard, Dartmouth or Georgetown. She plans to major in nursing, and study abroad. Then she plans to attend Harvard Medical School for obstetrics, and someday open her own practice.

# **Knights for Life Chairman Report**

To: The Officers and Members of the 102 Annual Meeting of the Louisiana State Council, Knights of Columbus and Members of the Bishop Charles P. Greco Foundation assembled in Alexandria, Louisiana.

For fraternal year 2006, Knights for Life worked to help advance the Culture of Life in the Louisiana Jurisdiction.

KFL continues to work closely with ACCESS Pregnancy & Referral Centers, which is operated by Catholic Charities Archdiocese of New Orleans. With the tremendous help of several Councils and Parish Respect Life ministries, the baby bottle fundraiser program has been a huge success. Together we helped ACCESS raise \$68,545, which went towards acquiring three Ultrasound machines for their Centers in Metairie, Kenner and Marrero.

Because of the wonderful outpouring of generosity by parishioners, 100% support of Pastors and great enthusiasm from KC Council's and Parish Respect Life groups, ACCESS is now moving towards opening a fourth Center in New Orleans. Since Hurricane Katrina there are no pregnancy centers in New Orleans. Also a large abortion mill opened at 3500 St. Charles Avenue in what was a Presbyterian Church prior to Katrina.

The goal of the fourth Center is to help mothers and their babies who are truly most in need in New Orleans. ACCESS wants to involve both parents whenever possible so that they know they have good options and why abortion is not one of them. The new Center will quickly become important to the growing Hispanic population, where they will find friendly Spanish-speaking staff.

Like the three existing Centers, the fourth one will be a limited medical facility, as they also do STD testing which is reaching epidemic levels, especially in the inner city.

Knights for Life is not asking for Council donations. We need Councils to help bring the baby bottle fundraiser program to your parishes. ACCESS and KFL are very grateful to all of your great work and commitment to Life, as our last fundraiser was a great success.

The cost to open, furnish and staff a Center is approximately \$200,000+. All checks are made payable to ACCESS PRC, which is a 501c3 tax-exempt organization. Any Council that wishes to participate is asked to e-mail us at <a href="mailto:ProLifeChair@yahoo.com">ProLifeChair@yahoo.com</a>. You can also contact Michele Black at ACCESS directly at, 504-832-1503. We know that with your help a fourth ACCESS Center will happen soon.

Since we started the baby bottle fundraising program in 2004 Knights for Life has worked with dozens of KC Councils and Respect Life groups to help raise over \$315,000 for 7 pregnancy centers across Louisiana that have since acquired a total of six ultrasound machines. We want to again thank every Council and every Brother Knight who helped to build a Culture of Life.

There or more than 20 crisis pregnancy centers throughout Louisiana and Knights for Life wants to encourage Councils throughout the jurisdiction to consider contacting and helping the Center nearest to you. To cover all the details we have a one page outline on how to have a successful baby bottle fundraiser at our web site. If you're interested please visit <a href="www.KnightsForLife.org">www.KnightsForLife.org</a> and feel free to contact us with any questions.

Knights for Life continues to promote comprehensive Respect Life education for school students as well as for adults. We have on our Web site two complete Respect Life curriculum programs for kindergarten through high school and also for adult learning. Both programs are free and have been downloaded hundreds of times in the last year. We have received several messages from people who are working to implement Respect Life education in their schools, and we have corresponded with several from across the country.

# Masters' Report

Reverend Fathers, Worthy State Deputy, Worthy Elected State Officers, Worthy Past State Deputies, Worthy Convention Delegates, and my Brother Knights all. It is indeed an honor and a privilege for me to come before you today at this  $102^{\rm nd}$  annual convention of the Knights of Columbus in this great state of Louisiana to report on the activities of the Fourth Degree of the Louisiana District.

On March 5, 2006, the delegates of the 28th Biennial Convention of Louisiana District Fourth Degree held in Lafayette, LA elected me to serve as Master of the Fourth Degree for the ensuing two years. Knowing that this was only part of the process in the appointment to the office of District Master, I never the less began to assemble what I think is a most dedicated and proficient staff of brother knights to serve the Louisiana District Fourth Degree.

On August 2, 2006 I received official notification of my appointment to the position of Master of the Louisiana District effective September 1, 2006 by letter from the Supreme Master Joseph P. Schultz. The first order of business was to proceed with an exemplification of the fourth degree in Carencro, LA on September 23, 2006 already scheduled by then Master George Zimmer, Jr. Forty-four new sir knights were exemplified into the fourth degree at this time. In this class of 44 new sir knights there was on priest. After this exemplification it was time to schedule my installation to the office of Master by our Worthy State Deputy Don Fontenot. The installation was conducted on October 14, 2006 by our Worthy State Deputy with the assistance of Former Master Art Campo who currently serves as the District Advisor for the Louisiana District Fourth Degree at a special mass in my church parish. Fr. Mark Derise, Pastor of Our Lady Of Perpetual Help Catholic Church in New Iberia, LA, celebrated the mass. I would be remiss if I would not say that I was truly overwhelmed by the attendance of many brother knights from throughout the state to help me celebrate this most joyous occasion. Special thanks goes to my own assembly. Without the help and dedication of the brother sir knights from the Msgr. J.M. Langlois Assembly this installation would not have been the success it was. One week after this installation, my wife and I traveled to Pelham, Alabama for a provincial meeting with C. Michael Horten, the Vice Supreme Master of the Bienville Province and the four other District Masters of the Bienville Province. All five Masters were installed into office by the Vice Supreme Master at a mass on Saturday October 21, 2006. I would like to thank the members and their wives who made the trip to attend this meeting and installation. I think the Louisiana District had more sir knights in attendance than any other district.

After returning from this meeting it was time to begin focusing on activities of the fourth degree in the Louisiana District. A district meeting was held on December 9, 2006 in Brusly, LA for the purpose of announcing goals and programs for the fraternal year. The next function was an exemplification held in Baton Rouge, LA on March 10, 2007. At this exemplification 66 new brother knights received the honors of the fourth degree. In this class there were two priests and one seminarian. This exemplification was attended by the Vice Supreme Master, eight Former Masters, four Elected State Officers and many brother sir knights from throughout the state.

My brother knights, I am proud to say that in eight short months we have recruited 110 brother knights into the fourth degree. I am also sad to report we have lost nearly approximately 35 sir knights to death. Currently we have approximately 5400 members of the fourth degree in Louisiana. With nearly 35,000 members in the Knights of Columbus in Louisiana this represents barely 15% of the membership.

The main goal of the fourth degree is to promote patriotism. In the Louisiana District we strive to accomplish this through our District Patriotic Program. Through this program we provide topics pertaining to patriotism for an essay contest open to 7th and 8th students. A winner from each diocese is chosen and a district winner is chosen from the seven diocesan winners. The district winner and the diocesan winners are awarded cash prizes. Through this program we also recognize outstanding high school senior students with a special Patriotic medallion. Again with this program, we honor outstanding high school junior ROTC cadets with a special medallion and service bar. We also award a plaque to an outstanding college ROTC cadet. The cadet's name is also placed on a plaque at the college he or she is attending along with previous recipients from this college.

The Excellence in Religious Education (ERE) program is a unique program. Money derived from voluntary donations from the assemblies in the district is donated to the seven bishops in Louisiana. Monies donated by assemblies in a diocese remains in that diocese and these funds are used as a supplement towards tuition at Loyola University of the South for individuals studying for a Master of Arts degree in religious education or a Master of Arts degree in pastoral ministry. Extension courses from Loyola are offered in each diocese.

Following the principle of fraternalism, the District of Louisiana honors our brother sir knights on the assembly level with the Order of Merit Award, the Clergyman of the Year Award, the Sir Knight of the Year Award and the Family of the Year Award. The Master awards a District Clergy of the Year Award, a District Sir Knight of the Year Award, and a District Family of the Year Award from the assembly level honorees. The Civic Award and the To Be A Patriot Award are given on the District, Provincial and Supreme level.

I would like to express my sincere gratitude and most heartfelt thanks to our State Deputy and the other Elected State Officers for their unending support of the Fourth Degree in Louisiana. Don, Ben, Earl, John, Ronnie, and Don Cubbage, you brothers have truly shown to me a level of brotherhood beyond words can explain and you have truly made be feel a part of a part of the team.

My wife, Mary Kay, and I would like to thank all the brother knights for the many invitations to both council and assembly functions. I only wish we could have attended more and we both hope you will continue to invite us to your functions.

Brother Knights, I will close with this one final request. To you, my third degree brother knights, please consider making a strong effort to join the fourth degree. To my fourth degree brother knights, I ask you to actively recruit new members, not just into the fourth degree but into the order as well. Membership recruitment should be and must be a constant commitment we must all make.

# **YEP Chairman Report**

To: The Officers and Members of the 102 Annual Meeting of the Louisiana State Council, Knights, Members and Guest assembled in Alexandria, Louisiana.

I would like to begin by thanking State Deputy Don Fontenot for his appointment of myself as Chairman of the Youth Expansion Program Fund drive. I have enjoyed the many meetings and invitations that the councils of Louisiana have shared with me and my wife Sonya. Our goals were centered on informing the councils and membership of the Jurisdiction of Louisiana of the many programs and benefit to the youth of our state that their donations make possible.

In August of 2006 each Grand Knight was sent a personal letter establishing the quota for their Council. This quota was derived using a \$10.00 fee for each active member on the Councils roster. The letter also went on to expound on all of the great programs that the donated monies would be supporting for the next Columbian Year. A copy of the states YEP quotas that were published in the Louisiana Knight were also mailed to each Grand Knight.

During the Annual KCLS meetings packets were provided to each council participating of the annual programs being funded and their goals to fund these programs. The information contained was intended to be used to enhance the council's awareness of the youth programs as well as pat ourselves on the back for having these great programs.

The Parade of Councils was held at Grand Knights Day. Each council was given the chance to present their donation directly to the State Deputy Don Fontenot. It was very well received by all of the councils. Total dollars collected that day in support of our youth programs was \$90,826.05 from 93 council's quotas and \$385.00 from the 50/50 raffle. In addition \$1,335.00 was donated to YEP from the Gumbo Contest that day.

In the months following Grand Knights day councils were reminded to make their donations towards the youth programs of the state. Each council was asked to remember the need for an investment in our youth and donate as much as they could to the program.

As of this date of this report, this year the councils have responded in a great fashion. We have 135 councils (63 Quota Plus, 22 Quota and 50 Partial) that have donated \$ 126,670.09. This leaves 158 councils that have not donated to the program. Added to these funds are miscellaneous monies that have been collected this year of \$ 7,749.87. This now gives us a grand total of \$134,419.96 collected so far. The program will run until the end of June for this Columbian year. I do not however consider the program coming to a close this soon. I will continue to push and inform the importance of reaching our goals so that our youth programs can survive in these changing times.

#### **Pro-Life Oratory Winner**

It was a terrible tragedy and it was all over the news. On September 11<sup>th</sup>, 2001, over 3,000 people died in one day – and the entire world mourned. What the media didn't tell you, though, was that over 3,000 died the next day, and the next day, and the next day. Over 3,000 died yesterday, and today, and over 3,000 will die tomorrow – and no one is mourning. To equal the number of abortions that take place in the United States in one year alone, the terrorist attacks on the World Trade Center would have had to have been almost 440 times more lethal.

I want to talk to you about **the Tragedy of Abortion**. This evening we are going to <u>first</u>, look at the tragedy of abortion from several different angles and then <u>second</u>, examine the even greater tragedy that the people of America do not care enough to stand together and ban abortion in the United States.

- 1) The Tragedy of Abortion
- I'd like to look at abortion in the following ways:
- 1) Planned Parenthood's lies
- 2) What the Bible says
- 3) Context

This past November election cycle I was in the state of South Dakota working with 30 young people such as myself, in the effort to pass an abortion ban in the state. The abortion ban bill had passed through the House and Senate and was signed by the Governor, but Planned Parenthood challenged it in court and it was sent back for a vote by popular referendum.

Along with many others, I was standing at the busiest intersection in South Dakota holding a sign that said, "Vote Yes on 6 – For Life". The light was red and cars were lining up. A car pulled up with two women in it and one of the women rolled he window down and they began to scream profanity and obscenities at us. Then one of the women said, "No one is going to tell me what to do with my own body!"

Sounds reasonable, right? However, an unborn baby is definitely not part of a woman's own body. I replied to the woman, "Ma'am, no one is trying to tell you what to do with your own body, but a baby's heart starts beating at 18 days. Abortion stops the beating of a human heart – abortion is murder."

Well, the light turned green and the car drove off and that ended our conversation, but that is the biggest lie Planned Parenthood has! "Nobody is gonna tell me what to do with my body!"

It's not your body! Not only does a baby's heart start beating at 18 days, but its nervous system starts feeling at roughly 36 days. Yes, this means that the baby feels its body being ripped apart, or being poisoned. Science can prove beyond a shadow of a doubt that life begins at conception, but I'd like to look to God's word on this subject.

#### Bible Verses:

Psalm 139:13 – For you formed my inward parts; you knitted me together in my mother's womb. 14- I praise you, for I am fearfully and wonderfully made.

Jeremiah 1:5 – Before I formed you in the womb I knew you, and before you wee born I consecrated you;

The Bible makes it abundantly clear that life begins at conception. Abortion takes the life of a human being created in the image of the living God. The tragedy of abortion is that over 45 million babies have been ruthlessly murdered since that fateful day of January 21, 1973.

#### Context:

- · Abortion worldwide kills more people in 42 days than the Holocaust did in 12 years.
  - · 1 out of every 4 American babies is aborted.
- · More innocent people were murdered by abortion in 2006, than were killed by crime over the past 40+ years.
- $\,\cdot\,\,$  Abortion killed 64 times more Americans than all 12 of our wars combined.

Abortion is a terrible, terrible tragedy. And the majority of Americans recognize this. On March 24, 2006, Zolgby International took a poll asking the question: "Do you agree or disagree that abortion ends a human life?" Agree: 59% - Disagree: 29% - Not sure: 12%.

Given the fact that the majority of Americans believe abortion is murder, why is it legal? No other form of murder is legal!

### 2) The Tragedy of Inaction

Though the majority of Americans will vote in Zolgby poll or a Gallup poll and say that abortion is murder, they won't do much besides that. They'll even go vote in the elections every few years — but that is the extent of their political involvement. It's a bi-annual event! Let me tell you, though you may have an extremely strong conviction that abortion is murder, if that isn't enough to inspire you to take action — it's not worth much.

People have been doing that since 1973 and abortion is still legal, so obviously more effort is needed. As Einstein said, "the definition of insanity is doing the same thing over and over again and expecting different results".

What should we do? Well, there are numerous political organizations that will put you on their "alerts" list and get you to contact your representatives on pro-life issues. I certainly recommend doing that and I've sent more emails than I can count, but this is not necessarily the answer. See, I can email Mary Landrieu quite a few times and not change her mind.

So what will have a profound effect? Replacing bad officials with good ones.

While I was in South Dakota, I began working with some of the folks there and discussing forming an organization specifically for the purpose of helping good men get elected. We formed the National Christian Action Coalition, an organization whose purpose is to campaign for good men and help them get into office.

Upon returning from South Dakota in November, I heard about a special election for a state senate seat that was being held in December. After researching the two candidates, I found that one was a career politician who was very much pro-abortion. The other was a doctor who had never been in politics before. He was a God-rearing man who was strongly pro-life and pro-family.

I gathered roughly 20 kids and we went to work on the campaign of Dr. Bill Cassidy for the last week of the campaign. When we arrived on the scene, Dr. Cassidy was 4% behind in the polls. After 3 days of campaigning, he was 6% ahead a 10% turnaround. The last poll taken before the election showed Dr. Cassidy ahead by 13%, and by the grace of God, we won the election by a solid 20%. The campaign credited us with the victory, and, of course, we credited God with the victory.

In the words of Samuel Adams, "It does not take a majority to prevail, simply an irate, tireless minority keen to set brush fires in people's minds."

Since the Cassidy campaign, we have worked in another special election and since Louisiana is the only state holding elections this year, we are looking to work in several campaigns in Louisiana this fall.

The point is that a very small number of people can have a tremendous effect on who gets elected and who doesn't. Over 3,000 innocent babies will be murdered tomorrow and what are you going to do about it? 45 million have already wound up, not living in a good home, but just more ink on the statistics – inhabiting a dumpster out back of an abortion clinic.

This is a tragedy – how long must this tragedy continue? How many more millions must be slain before we stand together and put a stop to legalized murder in America?

Last August, Pope Benedict XVI had a little question and answer session with a group of Italian priests, and he told them, "The parish priest cannot do it all! It is impossible! He cannot be a 'soloist'; he cannot do everything, but needs other pastoral workers."

Clearly, the Pope is talking about people like us. We Knights have always taken pride in our description as "the strong right arm of the church."

At the 125<sup>th</sup> Anniversary dinner in New Haven on Founder's Day this year, we welcomed all of the priests of Connecticut. And in his remarks, the Supreme Knight said,

This year, in honor of the parish priest who was our founder, the Knights of Columbus pledges to devote new energy to increasing the vitality and spirituality that will help our parishes become the leading edge of a renewed and energetic Catholic Church. . . let us all rededicate ourselves to Father McGivney's dream: Every parish must have an active Knights of Columbus presence, and every parish priest should see in the Knights of Columbus his strong right arm to lead a renewal of parish life."

That's our theme during this 125<sup>th</sup> Anniversary year. The effort will mean different things in different jurisdictions, depending on how well we've done in achieving our goal of having a presence in every parish.

In at least one state our councils serve 99% of all Catholic parishes, and other states aren't far behind. But in one state we serve only 23% of the parishes there. Fortunately, in most places in the US and Canada we serve at least two-thirds of all parishes. In the Philippines, we have seen spectacular growth over the past several decades. We are looking forward to tremendous growth in Mexico and Poland, where both the need and the potential are great.

But having a presence in every parish is just the beginning of reaching our goal. In order to be the strong right arm of every parish priest, we need to offer every eligible Catholic man the opportunity to become a Knight. In one state where we serve more than 99% of all parishes, we count only 1.5% of eligible Catholic men as brother Knights. As a practical matter, we have almost unlimited opportunities for growth and the greater service to our priests, our churches and our communities that this growth will make possible.

In addition to helping revitalize parish life, we Knights also have an opportunity and a responsibility as faithful Catholics to confront some of the most serious public policy issues of our time.

In February, in a document called *Sacramentum Caritatis*, or *Sacrament of Love*, Pope Benedict said that "Worship pleasing to God can never be a purely private matter, without consequences for our relationships with others: it demands a public witness to our faith." And he added that this was especially true of "fundamental values, such as respect for human life, its defense from conception to natural death, the family built upon marriage between a man and a woman, the freedom to educate one's children and the promotion of the common good in all its forms. These values," he said, "are not negotiable."

**JOEL OCMAND:** Our state membership program began on April 1, 2006; and concluded on March 31, 2007. During our state membership program year, our councils displayed a net membership intake of 717 or 83% of our quota of 866. This information is in your registration packet for your reference and convenience.

Again this year, as in the past, we were fully supported by our insurance agency force. Unfortunately, there were NO NEW councils instituted this year.

Hopefully the 2007-2008 Fraternal Year will bring numerous new councils.

We are proud to announce 68 K.C. Councils of Louisiana achieved or surpassed their assigned quotas in the STATE membership program. Please note that the time period for Supreme Council membership honors is from July 1, 2006 through June 30, 2007, and not the same as the state deadline...and as a reminder, our term is not over until June 30, 2007.

A council has to be instituted one year prior to the beginning of the state membership program year to be eligible for an award; that is, instituted prior to April 1, 2006. To win one of the State Membership trophies, an eligible council has to display the highest percentage of state quota achieved by any council in its membership group for the period from April 1, 2006 to March 31, 2007. 43 councils received 100 points in the membership program.

**DON FONTENOT:** Annually through its Service Program Awards Contest, Supreme Council recognizes publicly, councils in each state jurisdiction conducting the most outstanding individual project in each of the service program's five divisions: Church, Community, Council, Family Life and Youth Activities. Whatever the project, they all contribute to the well-being of the individual councils and their communities. Through these service program events, councils and members demonstrate that the order is indeed a "Catholic, Family, Fraternal, and Service Organization."

All councils in Louisiana are eligible to compete for the awards in the statewide competition. Statewide winners will be entered in the International Competition. The Grand Knights and their wives of the five councils selected as international service program award winners will receive an all expense paid trip to the Supreme Council Meeting this August in Nashville, Tennessee, and I may mention here, that Louisiana has had such winners in the past...let's hope we can add to that record in 2007.

The awards are based upon a SINGLE council project and not an accumulation of projects that make up the council's program in a given field of activity. These projects were also utilized to break ties towards the "State Deputy Award".

And now, for the **2007 State Winners**. I would like to ask these Grand Knights to come forward to receive their award and remain for a group picture.


