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
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# FOREWORD

# Knights of Columbus Louisiana State Council 104th ANNUAL MEETING

May 1-3, 2009...Shreveport, Louisiana

## PROCEEDINGS

#### FIRST DAY'S SESSION

At 10:45 a.m., Saturday, May 2, 2009, State Deputy Ben Davidson called to order the 104th Annual Meeting of the Louisiana State Council, Knights of Columbus, in the Shreveport Convention Center, Shreveport, LA. Upon the State Deputy's direction, State Warden Vernon Ducote and his assistants, having predetermined the fact, reported that all in the council chamber have been verified and were in possession of a current KC membership card. State Deputy Davidson then called upon Msgr. Joseph Susi, State Chaplain, to lead the assembly in the opening prayer.

The State Deputy then requested the assembly to remain standing for the posting of the national colors, followed by the pledge of allegiance to the flag, conducted by Master Gerard Thomas.

In opening remarks, State Deputy Davidson states "we would like to take this opportunity on behalf of Brother Ed Twohig and Brother Knights of the Shreveport area in welcoming you to the 104th Annual Meeting of the Louisiana State Council." Mr. Davidson went on to welcome all clergy in attendance.

State Deputy then recognized the Past State Deputies in attendance.

Brother Davidson then called on State Advocate Paul deMahy to review the rules of the 104th Annual Meeting. Mr. deMahy reviewed all rules and also commented that the rules had been published in the *Louisiana Knight*. Brother deMahy then moved for acceptance of the printed rules. The motion was seconded by Danny Landry, Council 6103, Vinton.

State Deputy Davidson then formally announced the appointment of Honorable Paul J. deMahy, St. Martinville, as Convention Parliamentarian. Judge deMahy gave a few remarks on the rules and instructions about being a delegate and visiting knights. He then explained the process of the elections.

The State Deputy then called upon State Secretary Ronnie Boudreaux for the presentation of the Temporary Roll. Boudreaux explained the procedure for conducting the Temporary Roll Call will be in effect until the Permanent Roll is developed and presented by the Credentials Committee and approved by the State Council. The State Secretary then moved to accept these records as the Temporary Roll Call of the State Council Meeting and seconded by J.C Dugas, Council 1276, St. Martinville.

Since appointments to convention committees are well displayed on the convention bulletin board located in the foyer by the Registration Desk and since these appointees were notified by personal letters, State Deputy Davidson announced that these appointments would not be read unless he was requested to do so by the assembly, and if an appointee is replaced at the convention by his alternate, then the alternate shall serve on the committee.

These appointments are found on pages 16-17.

The State Deputy then called upon State Secretary Boudreaux for the presentation of the minutes of the last State Council Meeting. The State Secretary moved that due to the length of these minutes, that the minutes be referred to the Minutes Committee without reading them. The motion was seconded by Carson Kelly Council 1134, Alexandria.

State Deputy Davidson then recognized Michael R. Bernard, Council 9240, Mandeville, Chairman of the Minutes Committee for his committee's report. Upon his conclusion, Brother Bernard moved for the accep-

tance of the minutes committee report. The motion was seconded by Dennis Broussard, Council 7275, Lafayette.

The complete report of the Minutes Committee can be found on page 53.

The State Deputy moved to close the open session to conduct business outside the normal scope of the third degree. The motion was seconded by John Tumminello, Council 3200, Alexandria. Business conducted included Squires, Louisiana Knight Foundationon and Bishop Greco Foundation. These reports can be found in the reports section beginning on page 91.

The convention was reconvened at 11:20am

Being recognized for this purpose, State Deputy Davidson then announced that a number of communications have been received. He moved that these communications be referred to the Felicitations Committee without reading and/or debate. This motion was seconded by Cecil Cormier, Council 3409, Opelousas. The report of the Felicitations Committee can be found on page 45.

At this time, the State Deputy then called for reports of State Officers. He requested State Secretary Ronnie Boudreaux assume the chair for the purpose of introducing the State Deputy, and requesting his rendering of the State Deputy Report. State Deputy Davidson then presented his report, encompassing the myriad of activities, projects, programs, and undertakings of Columbianism in the Louisiana Jurisdiction during the past fraternal year. Upon completion of that report, the State Deputy was accorded a standing ovation from the State Council. Danny Landry, Council 6103, Vinton, moved for the adoption of the report. Carson Kelly, Council 1134, Alexandria, seconded the motion, and the motion carried unanimously. The complete report of the State Deputy is reproduced in these proceedings beginning on page 18.

State Secretary Boudreaux then requested that the State Deputy again assume the chair and this was accomplished. State Deputy Davidson then called upon State Secretary Ronnie Boudreaux, Council 10902, New Iberia, to render his report and recognized him for this purpose. The State Secretary then rendered a detailed report to the assembly. Upon his conclusion, Boudreaux moved that the report be received with thanks, and it be referred to the appropriate committees. The motion to adopt the report was made by Dennis Cass, Council 2878, Metairie, and was seconded by Ricky Boutte, Council 10902, New Iberia. The motion carried unanimously. Reproduced in these proceedings, the State Secretary report as of June 30, 2009, begins on page 24.

The report of the State Treasurer was then called for by the State Deputy, who recognized State Treasurer John Boudreaux for that purpose. State Treasurer Boudreaux presented his report, stating that the report to be reproduced in the minutes of this convention would be as of June 30, 2009. When he concluded his report, Boudreaux moved for its acceptance and reference to appropriate committees. Larry French Council 3779, Shreveport, moved to adopt the report, and it was seconded by Johnny Mayeux, Council 13296, Kolin. The motion carried without dissent. The full report of the State Treasurer, as of June 30, 2009, can be found in these minutes beginning on page 27.

The State Deputy then called for the report of the State Advocate Paul deMahy, Council 1276, St. Martinville. The State Advocate report was read and upon its conclusion moved for the acceptance of his report. Wayne Hollier, Council 3425, New Iberia, moved for the adoption of the report. Seconded by Wayne Duhon, Council 12997, New Iberia, the motion unanimously carried. Reproduction of these minutes appear in this report beginning on page 32.

State Deputy Davidson then called for the report of the State Warden, recognizing State Warden Vernon Ducote, Council 8342, Prairieville, for this purpose. State Warden Ducote presented his report and upon its conclusion, he moved for its acceptance. The motion for acceptance was then presented by Harry Domingue, Council 10745, Cankton, and was seconded by Anthony Micelli, Council 4030, Baton Rouge. The motion carried without dissent. The report of the State Warden can be found starting on page 33.

Calling for the report of the State Office Administrator, the State Deputy then recognized Robert Boudreaux, Council 3202, Lafayette, for this purpose. The State Office Administrator then rendered his report. Upon its completion, Jimmy Saltzman, Council 11407, Grand Lake, moved for its adoption and reference to appropriate committees. Seconded by Jim Rabalais, Council 7856, St. Francisville. The motion carried unanimously. The full report of the State Office Administrator is reproduced in these proceedings, beginning on page 34.

State Deputy Davidson then called for the report of the Master of the Fourth Degree, recognizing Master Gerard Thomas for this purpose. Master Thomas presented his report and upon its conclusion, he moved for its acceptance. The motion for acceptance was then presented by Darryl Fontenot, Council 3857, DeRidder, and was seconded by Leonard Boudreaux, Council 4787, Hathaway. The motion carried without dissent. The report of the Master can be found starting on page 118.

Having completed receipt of reports of state officers, State Deputy Davidson then called for the submission of any resolutions not yet submitted for action. He explained that there was no need to read the resolutions but merely submit them to the State Advocate. He explained further that any resolutions submitted after this point would need the approval of the convention's delegates to be considered for action thereon.

Proceeding to the receipt of convention committees, State Deputy Davidson called for the report of the Audit Committee and recognized Grand Knight Mike D. Rose, Council 3779, Shreveport, committee chairman, for this purpose. Brother Rose rendered the full report and having completed the report moved for its adoption. Seconded by Wayne Hollier, Council 3425, New Iberia, and the motion carried. The Audit Committee report may be found on page 36.

The State Deputy then called for the report of the Memorials Committee and recognized Grand Knight E. Richard Yandle, Council 10293, Lafayette, for this purpose. Yandle presented the committee report and moved for its adoption. Seconded by Easton Pitre, Council 9000, Golden Meadow, the motion carried. The Memorials Committee report begins on page 49.

Calling for the report of the Felicitations Committee, the State Deputy recognized Grand Knight Barry Comeaux, Council 970, Plaquemine, for this purpose. Comeaux presented the committee report and moved for its adoption. Seconded by Paul Gagnet, Council 1437, New Orleans, the motion carried without dissent. The Felicitation Committee report is reproduced in these minutes and begins on page 45.

The State Deputy then called for the Good of the Order Report. The State Deputy recognized Grand Knight Patrick Vidrine, Council 1710, Patterson, Committee Chairman for that purpose. Grand Knight Vidrine presented the committee report and moved for acceptance, and Bob Donlon, Council 4683, Lafayette, seconded. The motion carried without dissent. The report of the Good of the Order Committee is reproduced in these minutes and begins on page 46. The committee also recommended all future committee members be sent the entire "good of the order" resolution prior to convention.

Under "special orders" of the State Council's By-Laws, in Section 6:1, the State Deputy then called for nomination for officers of the State Council and representative and alternate representatives of the State Council to the Annual Supreme Council Meeting. With the new balloting and counting procedure, all nominations will also be closed on the first day. He explained that our by-laws allow a maximum of three minutes for making a nomination and that nominations shall not be seconded. Davidson emphasized that all nominators must submit a written report of their respective nominees' names along with mailing addresses, council numbers and membership numbers to the State Secretary; and if the nomination is for State Deputy or insurance representative, a Knights of Columbus insurance certificate number of the nominee must also be provided in the written report. The State Deputy further advised that the ballots would list candidates in alphabetical order. Besides those

Knights of Columbus already entitled to the floor, any third degree member in good standing can be granted the privileges of the floor for the purpose of submitting a nomination; however, such action must be approved by the assembly. Printed nomination forms are available at the State Secretary's Registration Desk. Davidson then opened the floor for nomination for State Officers and the following nominations were received:

State Advocate deMahy then explained the purpose and intent of Resolution Number 9.

The State Deputy then announced that "nominations are now closed."

State Deputy Davidson then moved that all nominees for the offices of insurance and/or associate delegate to the 2009 Supreme Council Meeting be hereby accepted as nominees for alternate representatives in their respective categories and be it further moved that after the elected representatives in each category, the next four candidates in descending vote position in each category be deemed elected as the alternate representative. Brandon Hendricks, Council 8442, Violet, seconded the motion and the the proposal was accepted unanimously.

State Deputy Davidson then made announcements and urged all in attendance to be prompt for the 5:00pm Convention Vigil Mass and to remain until all Ministers of the Mass have proceeded out of the chamber. Davidson then called upon Msgr. Joseph Susi, State Chaplain to offer a closing prayer.

State Deputy Benjamin Davidson then recessed the convention at 1:25pm.



#### SECOND DAY'S SESSION

State Deputy Ben Davidson called to order at 9:15am the second day of the 104th Annual Meeting of the Louisiana State Council, Knights of Columbus. After State Warden Vernon Ducote and his assistants had verified that all in the chamber were in possession of a current K.C. Membership Card. State Chaplain Msgr. Joseph Susi led the assembly in the opening prayer. The State Deputy then asked Master Gerard Thomas to lead the body in the Pledge of Allegiance.

The State Deputy asked State Chaplain to remain at the podium to render his remarks to the convention.

The State Deputy then called State Secretary Ronnie Boudreaux to the podium to begin the procedures for certifying the Permanent Rolls of this State Council Meeting. During the collection of these Permanent Rolls, State Deputy Davidson called on Elections Committee Advisor, PSD David Bakeler to instruct the delegates on the procedure for completion of the ballot and also instructed his committee to prepare the ballot box. Upon completion of balloting, State Deputy Davidson ordered Elections Committee to seize the ballot box and to retire to tally votes. The State Secretary then completed his report of the Credentials Committee and he moved for its adoption. Tim Boudreaux, Council 10902, New Iberia, seconded the motion and the report carried unanimously. The full report of the Credentials Committee along with the Permanent Roll of the Annual Meeting is found in these proceedings beginning on page 39.

The State Deputy asked Associate State Chaplain Carson LaCaze to the podium to render his remarks to the convention.

The State Deputy then distributed "Top 20" Certificates to those councils finishing in the top of the State Deputy scoring.

State Deputy Ben Davidson, with the assistance of YEP Chairman, James Riente, presented certificates to all councils who had made their YEP Quota for the year.

State Deputy Davidson then called upon Youth Expansion Program Chairman Riente to render his report. In making his report, Chairman Riente emphasized that his report, as it will appear in the proceedings of this meeting, will be inclusive of all receipts through June 30, 2009. He urged councils not yet participating in the YEP to date, to please do so, prior to that June 30th closing date.

Brother Riente then thanked everyone for their great support of the offertory at both Masses and moved for the adoption of the YEP Report. Ernest Babineaux, Council 9753, Alexandria, then seconded the motion, and the report was accepted by acclamation. The complete YEP report may be found beginning on page 107.

Returning to the receipt of Convention Committee reports, the State Advocate was then called upon, as Chairman of the Resolutions Committee, to present the committee report and then explained that when the report reached the point of calling for action on the specific resolutions, the chairman would read the purpose and resolved clauses of the resolution and then read the recommendation of the resolution committee. "Your silence would indicate your agreement with that recommendation in which case I will rap the gavel indicating that the recommendation of the Resolutions Committee is adopted," the State Deputy announced. "If you wish action other than the committee's recommendation, appropriate motions, seconds, discussion and action are in order," he concluded. He then recognized the Committee Chairman who explained that he would read the purpose of the resolution, then read the resolved clauses, then read the recommendations of the Elected State Officers, that of the Advisory Board, and the recommendation of the Resolutions Committee, and if necessary, the rationale of the committee's recommendation. Floor action would be on the recommendation of the resolutions committee report, and upon its completion, Brother Paul deMahy moved for its adoption. Danny Landry, Council 6103, Vinton, seconded and the motion carried. The report of the Resolutions Committee can be found beginning on page 54.

For the purpose of rendering his committee report, State Treasurer John Boudreaux, Chairman of the Budget & Finance Committee, was recognized. Chairman Boudreaux presented the committee's report. Brother Boudreaux moved for its adoption and was seconded by Danny Landry, Council 6103, Vinton. The complete text of this committee report is found in these minutes beginning on page 37. Also during the report a line item was added, motioned by State Treasurer John Boudreaux, and seconded by Dennis Cass, Council 2878, Metairie.

The State Deputy then recognized Grand Knight Michael P. Malagarie, Council 7557, Broussard, Chairman of the Elections Committee for his committee report. Brother Malagarie, rendered his report and then moved for its adoption. It was so moved, seconded by Danny Landry, Council 6103, Vinton, and carried. The full report of the Elections Committee is found in these proceedings on page 44.

The State Deputy then called upon 2010 Convention Chairman Ismael "Gus" Agosto for introductions and comments pertaining to next years convention in Alexandria. Shortly after the completion of convention, booking issues in the Alexandria area caused the State Council to move the 2010 Convention to Lafayette.

The re-elected State Deputy, State Secretary, State Treasurer, State Advocate and State Warden then rendered closing comments. State Deputy Davidson commended the attendees still in attendance and reminded councils scoring sheets could be claimed at the conclusion of the meeting.

State Chaplain Msgr. Joseph Susi led the delegation in the closing prayer.

State Deputy Davidson then adjourned the 104th Annual Meeting of the Louisiana State Council, Knights of Columbus at 11:40am.

This is one program that the State can be proud of.

#### **COLUMBIAN SQUIRES**

Marvin Guillot, our State Squires Chairman, continues to lead our Columbian Squires. This past year the State Squires had State Softball, Horseshoe and Bowling Tournaments. They had a State Retreat with Father Scott Chemino, State Prior. They publish a State Newsletter 4 times a year. #### RETENTION

Retention is always one of the hardest programs to achieve a good grade. I give credit to Malcolm Faucheux for his efforts as Retention Chairman. This is a thankless job that is hard to show improvement. We are still losing more members than I would like, but without the Councils support, it is hard to keep them. We have to have active participation of our members for Councils to retain our members.

#### NEW COUNCIL DEVELOPMENT & REACTIVATION

New Councils are an important part in the growth of our State Council. Russell Ruh Chairman has actively perused areas for new Councils. He has been able to establish two New Councils this year. We added one in Covington, Louisiana, Most Holy Trinity Council #14614, Jay Helluin, District Deputy #14. The other New Council was in Pineville, Louisiana, John Paul II Council #14657. Keith Broussard, District Deputy #53. Russell is currently working on the Reactivation of Port Sulphur Council #8703 and the merger with Buras Council #4033. Our Chairman and the District Deputies are working several other areas for additional Councils.

#### CEREMONIALS

They provide a service and promotion to our State Knights of Columbus for which we are grateful.

#### AREA COORDINATORS & DISTRICT DEPUTIES

Our Area Coordinators and our District Deputies have been a major link in our promotion of our Programs and Membership. They are our link from Supreme, State Officers and Directors to the Councils. We have to depend on these Brother Knights visit their Councils and push them to exceed in all categories. We have a number of A.Cs and D.Ds that have done an excellent job.

#### STATE WEB PAGE AND WEBMASTER

Our Web page is an important link to our members to gain Information, News and Forms. His has been an available asset for the Louisiana Knights of Columbus. We thank Lee Roy Cates for his time and dedication to produce the Web Page.

#### STATE CHAPLAIN

The Louisiana Knights of Columbus are truly blessed to have Msgr. Joseph Susi as our State Chaplain and Msgr. Carson Lacaze as our Assistant State Chaplain. Our State has benefited by their guidance and spiritual leadership. They are dedicated as our Chaplains and have always been able to attend our Functions. We are honored to have these two men of God to lead us Spiritually.

#### FOURTH DEGREE

Our Fourth Degree Knights of Columbus are the Patriotic and visible branch of our Order of which we can all be proud. The Fourth Degree has always selected dedicated leaders and Gerald Thomas, this years Master, is no exception. It has been a pleasure to work with our Master and to promote the goals of our Order.

#### FINANCIAL SECRETARY ASSOCIATION

The Financial Secretaries take a major role in our Councils as they are the link to the Supreme Council. Thru the leadership of President Keith Gautreau the Financial Secretaries are trained to use the most recent computer programs. The Financial Secretaries are one of the people that can make a Council a success.

#### LOUISIANA LADIES AUXILIARY ASSOCIATION

The Ladies Auxiliary President Beverly Hains, asked me if I would install their Officers. We had a very nice conversation and I agreed to the Installation. My feeling was to make peace with the Association. I believe that a supportive wife can make a better Knight. The State Council has enjoyed a nice relationship with the Ladies Auxiliary. They have been invited to hold there Meeting and Luncheon at the same time as our Convention. We hope that we can continue to function and corporate with each other in the future.

#### STATE OFFICE

As a first year State Deputy the State Office as been a real life saver for me. Robert Boudreaux, State Office Administrator, and Susan Camel have done anything that I have asked them to do, they have reminded me of letters and notices that needed to be sent in a timely matter, published the Louisiana Knight and many other chores.

There has been a concern about the rising cost of the State Office along with the decline of revenue. The State Officers decided to take over the writing of all checks, so we could monitor the cash flow. Robert has been very helpful in helping us to reduce the operating cost of the office. We have been successful in reducing the Budgeted cost of \$153,500 to about \$145,000 and are continuing to monitor the figures each month. Our Revenue is raised by the Per Capita Tax and it has remained steady as budgeted.

I thank Robert and Susan for all of their help and assistance that they given me to do my duties as State Deputy.

#### **COMMENTS**

This year we have encountered a number of problems that we had not foreseen. When checking the State By-laws we found that the State Finance Officers were to handle all funds concerning State council. When we started writing the checks for the State Office, we also assumed the writing of all the checks for the Mental Disability Fund. This year these checks have totaling over \$336,000. We have had to cover all the expenses and prizes for the State run Athletic Events.

We were presented a past due Convention bill that we were able to negotiate a lower price. Considering the problems with a Convention it was decided that the State Finance Officers would do all check writing for the State Convention.

Now, the State Finance Officers has to maintain books on General Fund, Yep, YEPFund Raiser, Acompano Program, Exemplification Fund, Trust, MDF Program, State Office and State Convention. This is a pretty good size job for 3 Elected State officers to accomplish. It is like running a good sized business. We have had to learn how to handle all of the different accounts, but we feel we have done that.

#### CONCLUSION

My first year as your State Deputy has been Challenging, Sadness, Gratifying, Enjoyable and Rewarding. This Administration has had a number of Challenges this past year and we were able to face them and resolve them. It is always sad when we lose our Brother Knights. It is always Gratifying when you see a New or Revised Function or Program succeed. We have attended many Functions this past year that were Enjoyable. It is very Rewarding when you reach a goal or able to see a new Council being Installed.

I want to thank all of my Elected Officers, Ronnie Boudreaux, John Boudreaux, Paul deMahy and Vernon Ducote, for helping me through the Challenges that we have encountered this year. My fellow officers have been dedicated and committed to our goals. We have had meetings almost every month, and they were more than willing to give up their time.

A special Thanks to my Membership and Program Directors for their time and dedication to our needs. Without the support of all of the Appointed Positions, I would not have been able to promote our Programs and Membership.

I have been very fortunate to have the support and advice of our Past State Deputies. Being a New State Deputy you often need the help of some Past State Deputies advice.

Emma and I appreciate the many invitations and warm hospitality extended to us. We regret that we were not able to accept many of them, due to other commitments, church, or family obligations. Please continue to include us in your functions and on your mailing list. We do enjoy reading and hearing what our Councils across the State are doing.

To my loving wife, Emma, I can't thank you enough for all of your love, support and prayers that you have given me this past year as State Deputy. The many miles you have traveled with me this past year, have made these trips much more enjoyable. Thank you for always being at my side. You have been a perfect First Lady for the Louisiana Knights of Columbus. May God bless you always.

I have enjoyed serving as your State Deputy and have many fond memories that will last a lifetime. Remember to "SMILE." I want to thank you all for making the Louisiana Knights of Columbus one of the best in the country. May God Bless and Keep you always.

The records of the State Secretary for income and disbursements agreed with the records of the State Treasurer.

State Per-Capita Invoices were mailed to the Councils during July 2008 for the First half of Per-Capita Billing. The second half Per-Capita Tax Bills were sent out during January 2009. The amount billed are as follows: Inactive Members \$5.00: Honorary Members- \$5.00: Honorary Members and Disabled Memberno charge: Regular Members- \$8.50

The July Billing amounted to \$120,780.00 for Per-Capita, \$2,810.00 for K.C.L.S. and \$2,810.00 for Grand Knights Day. We collected a total of \$127,236.00 for the first six months of the fraternal year. The second half was billed in January 2009. The amount of Per-Capita billed was \$119,569.75. Councils that did not pay the first half were billed for both periods. As of this date five (5) councils did not pay for the first half period.

My records indicate that a total of 25 councils have not paid their indebtness to the State Council for percapita tax. We are working to receive these funds to the State Council. It should be noted that no council owing money to the State Council will be seated at the State Meeting.

All checks were written for the State Council are prepared using computer software; QuickBooks Pro 2008. This program allows the use of several easy to use reports and tracks all of the money of the State Council. These reports enable the balancing and records of the State Secretary and the State Treasurer. This software allows a legible printout of the checks prepared by the State Secretary. The State Council uses a voucher and receipts system similar to the system used in councils. The State Deputy issues a voucher to authorize checks to be written. The State Secretary then writes the checks and signs them and forwards them to the State Treasurer who countersigns the checks and mails the checks to the payee and records them to the proper account.

This last year as your State Secretary has been very rewarding in my learning the working of the State Council. It has been a rewarding pleasure for me to work with the councils across the state in helping them understand the per-capita tax structure for billing. This is still the most misunderstood part of our structure. I appreciate the patience of our councils in helping me as they come to a better understanding of this process.

To our elected State Deputy and my boss **Ben** I would like to thank you for your understanding of this poor Cajun boy in learning the working of the State Council. To my fellow elected State Officers **John, Paul and Vernon** thank you for all of your help in everything we do as officers and brother Knights. ### **State Treasurer Report**

To: The Officers, Past State Deputies and Delegates of the 104<sup>th</sup> Annual Meeting of the Louisiana Jurisdiction of the Knights of Columbus, assembled in Shreveport, Louisiana on May 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup>, and 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2009.

In accordance with Section 7.2 of the By-Laws of the Louisiana State Council, it is an honor for me to present the Annual Report of the State Treasurer to my Brother Knights of the Louisiana Jurisdiction, for Fraternal Year 2008-2009.

Serving as State Treasurer has not only been a rewarding opportunity but an experience that has enhanced my knowledge of the financial principals and instruments in place by the State Council. This learning experience has been invaluable. It has given me the opportunity to experience a level of service to the Knights of Columbus that will serve me throughout life, as well as my Brothers in the Great State of Louisiana in the future.

The accounting procedures established for handling the funds of the State Council are sound and have internal controls built into the system. Additional controls were implemented to ensure the accuracy of the MDF program as well as the State Convention and State Office Income and Expenses. In accordance with Section 9:2 of the By-Laws of the Louisiana State Council, the State Secretary shall receive all funds due to the State Council, prepare a transmittal and then turn over the funds to the State Treasurer for deposit. Referencing Section 10:1 of the By-Laws, the State Treasurer is the custodian of all State Council funds and is required to keep a true and accurate record of all funds. I have done my very best to comply to with the By-Laws and I certify that the financial statements presented in this report represents a true and accurate accounting of the state of financial condition of the Louisiana State Council.

The State Council has four checking accounts that are balanced monthly by the State Treasurer. They are: *General Fund Checking, Youth Expansion Current Checking, Acompano Checking, and the Exemplification Fund Checking Account. MDF* is operated out of the General Fund Checking Account as an "*In and Out,*" transaction. Funds are deposited, expenses are taken out and then net funds are sent to the councils for distribution. A sub-account specifically for MDF, will be established for next fraternal year's MDF Program, to ensure a smoother flow of funds.

The State Council maintains eleven trust accounts: *General Fund Trust, YEP Current Trust, YEP Fund Raiser Trust, Exemplification Trust, General Fund Unallocated Trust, YEP Unallocated Trust, Fourth Degree Trust, Louisiana Knights Foundation Trust, Benefit Reserve Trust, Disaster Relief Trust and Convention Reserve Trust.* These accounts are monitored and reports are given on the earnings or losses monthly. Referencing Section 10:4 of the State By-Laws, the State Treasurer shall segregate and keep in a separate depository funds designated Youth Expansion Program.

A voucher system is used for all disbursement of funds. The voucher is prepared by the State Deputy and sent to the State Secretary for recording and production of checks. The State Secretary then forwards the voucher along with the checks to the State Treasurer for action. The State Treasurer records this activity in the monthly accounting system of the State Council; he then makes copies of the checks then signs and mails the checks to the appropriate parties. In accordance with Sec.8:1 of the State By-laws; all checks issued are required to have the signature of two of the following State Officers: State Deputy, State Secretary, and/or State Treasurer.

The State Treasurer records all receipts and expenditures to the financial accounting records using the different accounts and prepares a report of all accounts for review of the State Deputy, Elected State Officers, the Immediate Past State Deputy, and Past State Deputies, after the end of each month.

Bank statements are also reconciled to the accounting records for checking and trust accounts.

Copies of the reconciled trust statements are forwarded to the State Deputy, Elected State Officers, Immediate Past State Deputy, and the Past State Deputies at the end of each month.

In accordance with the provisions of the by-laws of the Louisiana State Council, I herby submit my annual report as your State Office Administrator for your consideration.

I would like to thank State Deputy Benjamin Davidson for his support as State Deputy, under the moniker of "SMILE". His dedication to the Order is unique, and his desire to see each council succeed is unparalled. It has been a pleasure serving him this inaugural year of his tenure.

Susan Camel and myself create the support staff for the State Council and I stand before you today, to assure the State Council, you can not find any more dedicated individuals.

As I have mentioned in all past convention reports, the State Office is involved, to some degree, in almost every undertaking of the State Council. I am quite confident the reports of your elected and appointed officials will discuss details, thus I will limit my remarks to specific responsibilities of your State Office.

#### State Officers Meetings/KCLS/Grand Knights Day

It is the responsibility of this office to prepare ALL printed material for these meetings, and through the help of brother knights at the meeting sites, this important information is distributed during these conferences. In recent SOM and Grand Knights Day, the State Office has prepared and facilitated Power Point Presentations for the use of meeting presenters. It is the intent of this office to make presentations more interesting for the audience and essentially making the presentation an item meeting goers will retain and take back to their membership.

#### **State Directory**

Current information is key to this Louisiana Council product being effective. Form 185s must be submitted to the State Deputy and/or State Council for the info to be correct. The State Directory is posted on our State Website, and is updated weekly, where as the printed document is only updated annually.

#### The Louisiana Knight

*The Louisiana Knight* newsletter continues to be published quarterly, however submission of council articles and photographs has dropped off considerably, and without council info, the newsletter becomes ordinary.

Of note, the *Louisiana Knight* now publishes only four times per year. .March, June, September and December are the publication months, while the deadline for submitting articles and photos will be the 15th of the publication month.

#### **Athletic Bids**

Of note, the 2009 State Bowling Tournament was hosted by the State Council and the State Basketball Tournament was co-hosted by the State Council and Council 9347, and the profit realized is being used to fund the Louisiana State Council Office. The 2009 State Free Throw Contest was also hosted by the State Council, and was a break-even event.

#### Web Site

I would like to THANK Lee Roy Cates of Carlyss as the State Council's webmaster. Lee Roy has volunteered to manage the web site at no cost to the State Council, as this retired brother knight has the time and is willing to constantly update our site to make it a wealth of information for the brother knights.

Our plan for the web site to include ALL forms utilized by councils on the state and supreme level is ongoing. Most of these forms are now interactive.

Lastly, we encourage ALL COUNCILS to secure an email account. We believe that within the very near future, all communication will be conducted electronically. The dawn of the new era is NOW.

#### **State Convention**

## **Budget & Finance Committee Report**

To: The Officers and Members of the 104th Annual Meeting of the Louisiana State Council Knights of Columbus assembled in Shreveport, Louisiana. In accordance with Section 19 Committee on Budget and Finance of the By Laws of The Louisiana State Council Knights of Columbus the following report is presented.

On March 7, 2009 the Elected State Officers and Past State Deputies met to discuss the proposed Budget for the 2009-2010 Columbian year. A copy of the previous year's budget and the income/expense through December 31, 2008 were furnished to this group in advance, for their preparation for this meeting.

The proposed Budget was submitted to the Elected State Officers and Past State Deputies at the Advisory Board Meeting on March 7<sup>th</sup>, 2009. The Past State Deputies offered their views and changes or comments that were then incorporated into the proposed Budget.

After this meeting, according to the By-Laws of the State Council, two copies were mailed by the State Office administrator to all Councils of record.

The Budget and Finance Committee meeting was held on Friday, May 1st, 2009 in Room 202 of the Shreveport Convention Center in Shreveport, Louisiana at 4:00 PM. This meeting was for the purpose of continuing the review of the proposed Budget.

Included in this review of the proposed Budget for the Louisiana State Council was: General Fund; Youth Expansion Funds; Youth Expansion Fund Raiser, Acompano Fund Raiser; State Council Office Operations; and Investment Transactions.

By accomplishing this task – the committee on the Budget and Finance has complied with the State Council By-Laws-Section 19-Committee on Budget and Finance.

The Committee took into account that the Proposed Budget carried the approval of the State Deputy and the Elected State Officers. Prior approval was given by the Advisory Board of Past State Deputies at their meeting in March 2009. Based on the review of the Budget and Finances of the State Council, the Budget and Finance Committee offers the following recommendations to you for your considerations here today.

I would ask that the Budget and Finance Committee please come and join me.

1. The Committee recommends that the State Council continue to perform an audit of the funds of the Louisiana State Council with the Committee of three (3) Past State Deputies, (3) seated Grand Knights, the State Financial Officers and up to (2) two at large members to oversee the audit.

2. The State Per-Capita Tax should stay the same as outlined in the Budget Proposal

3. The Acompano Raffle should continue to assist with the funding of the Acompano program.

4. Due to the uncertainty of receipts for the 2009-2010 Youth expansion Program Budget. The Committee recommends that the following: If total income for the 2009-2010 Fund Raiser does not equal budgeted income, selected Accounts will be decreased with the approval of the Elected State Officers. If funds exceed budget, selected accounts will share in the increased gain with the approval of the Elected State Officers.

5. Excess Funds in the General Fund and YEP be placed in existing investment accounts. Any shortfall resulting in the General Fund Budget: funds may be transferred from the General Fund Unallocated (G30.0 General Fund Unallocated) with the concurrence of the State Officers.

6. The State Treasurer presented a review of the investment account for the Louisiana State Council. Based on this report, the committee recommends continuing with Capital One Bank Trust Group and requests every effort continues to optimize interest on investments.

7. Since the 2009-2010 Budget was mailed to each Delegate to the State Council Meeting – the Budgetand Finance Committee recommends discontinuing the line item reading.

8. A final Financial Statement as of June  $30^{th}$  be distributed to each council of record by no later than August  $31^{st}$  of the same year.

Worthy State Deputy – the committee on Budget and Finance moves for the adoption of these line items before concluding this report.

Items 1-8 ADOPTION

The committee agrees that the Budgets for the General Fund, Youth Expansion Fund, Youth Expansion Fund Raiser for 2010-2011, Acompano Fund Raiser for 2009-2010, Exemplification Fund, the Investment Transactions and the State Council Office Operation will be included in the minutes of this State Council Meeting.

## To: The Officers and Members of the 104th Annual Meeting of the Louisiana State Council held in Shreveport, La.

Your committee on the Good of the Order met on Friday, May 1, 2009, and fully discussed at length the following activity areas. After due deliberation, the committee urges all council, district and state leaders to see that the following recommendations are fully implemented.

The committee would also ask that at future conventions, each member of the Good of the Order Committee, as appointed, be forwarded a copy of the previous year's Good of the Order report to prepare committee members as to what is to be discussed.

## FIRST AND FOREMOST WEARE CATHOLIC

The committee recommends the recitation of the Serran Prayer for Vocations at each council meeting and that the council chaplain should encourage the recitation of this prayer at all Masses. The committee further recommends that a prayer be offered at each council meeting for the beatification of our founder Father Michael J. McGivney. The council chaplain should be encouraged to be actively involved in council activities. In the absence of the council Chaplain, a deacon shall be asked to bring the message of our faith. The committee urges all councils to participate in the Refund Support Vocations Program (RSVP). Each council should consider sponsoring a speaker on vocations to the various parochial schools. Recognizing that some clergy may still be apprehensive to Knights of Columbus involvement, the committee recommends each council strongly consider implementation of the Parish Round Table Program and thus show evidence of our belief that VOCATIONS ARE OUR BUSINESS and that each Grand Knight has a dialogue with each Pastor of churches in his council area. Each council should consider having a speaker on evangelization, to encourage each member to promote the Catholic faith to non-Catholics, and to help fallen-away Catholics to become again active in the Church. One way this can be done effectively is by supporting evangelization through the RCIA program.

## PRO-LIFE

The committee recommends increased efforts from the state level to provide more timely and specific information to the council level about upcoming activities such as Pro-Life Rallies. The committee encourages area, district and local Right to Life Masses and demonstrations. It is also recommended that continued active exposure to the public by each council be pursued. The committee encourages each council to construct a monument to the unborn in a prominent place, preferably on the church grounds and those that have one to maintain and have programs to bring Pro-Life to parishioners attention. We urge right-to-life education, to fight abortion, and specific projects. Such an enforcement by members and Grand Knights of letter writing campaigns from council members of state and federal governing bodies. We also urge the use of the vast amount of material that is available about the AIDS Virus, and promoting abstinence and chastity as a way of decreasing the threat of AIDS as well as decreasing abortions and moral decay.

The committee also recommends that councils become involved with local Right-To-Life organizations by way of participating in their events and getting on their mailing lists. The committee urges use of material available to them from the Supreme Council pertaining to Pro-Life. The committee also urges members to fight pornography at the council, family and school levels. The committee further recommends that the State Council provide updated information of current Federal and State legislation on Pro-Life and Euthanasia.

Each council appoints a Pro-Life Chairman or Chair-Couple. Each council supports a youth Pro-Life Retreat as sponsored by the State Council. Each council offer a Pro-Life prayer at business meetings.

## **BISHOP GRECO MEMORIAL FUND**

The committee recommends that all councils use the memorial cards to memorialize deceased council members. The card can be filled in with the name of the deceased and the name of the donating council. The

card is mailed to the member's family. A donation of \$25.00 is then sent to the Greco Foundation for the trust fund.

The committee also recommends that councils make a voluntary contribution of \$1.00 per member, on anannual basis, to the Bishop Greco Memorial Fund..

## **RETREATS**

The committee recommends that each council have a guest speaker with Catholic Retreats as the subject, and that each council schedule retreats for its members, individual as well as couples, encouraging husband and wife retreats whenever offered.

## FAMILY INVOLVEMENT

The committee recommends continual family involvement in council activities. The committee also recommends each council have a monthly Family Communion. The committee strongly recommends that widows of deceased council members be included and recognized in every aspect of the council's life and activity. This committee further recommends that the council members make themselves available to provide assistance to widows and receive a copy of the council news letter and provide transportation if needed.

## YOUTH EXPANSION PROGRAM

The committee urges each council to actively support the Youth Expansion Program by annually exceeding it's YEP quota, and by involvement in a youth organization such as Columbian Squires, Boy or Girl Scouts and/or Catholic Youth Organization (CYO). The committee recommends that all members in each council be asked to make a personal contribution to our Youth Expansion Program and councils should not depend on fund-raisers only. Each council should consider either making it a part of the dues or adding to their billing a \$10.00 voluntary contribution by each member. The committee recommends that all councils participate in the CYLA Program and that efforts be made to properly recognize the applicants and winners on the council level. The committee further recommends continued financial support of YEP.

## SUBSTANCE ABUSE-HEALTH SERVICES

The committee recommends each council sponsor an educational program on substance abuse by the law enforcement agencies to local junior and senior high schools. The committee urges all Knights to recognize local, state and federal law enforcement agencies. The committee further recommends that councils establish blood donation drives, Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) training programs and community blood pressure surveys.

## FRATERNAL MEMBERSHIP-NEW COUNCIL DEVELOPMENT

The committee wishes to compliment the first degree and major degree teams in the Louisiana Jurisdiction for their excellent exemplifications which act as catalysts in encouraging all councils to obtain new, active members. The committee wishes to remind all members that it is our Supreme Council's desire that we have a KC presence in every church parish and that we should aid all efforts to form a new council or a Parish Round Table. It is also recommended that all members proposing new members into our Order assume responsibility for insuring the first-degree member receives his major degree as soon as possible, and remains an active member. Also, we congratulate all councils that sponsor a first degree teams and we strongly recommend that every council make an attempt to establish a team, and that all ceremonials be performed with the proper dignity. The committee recommends that every council make an effort to bring in new members, but that no less effort be expended to retain the members they now have. Council leaders and members should promote patriotism and encourage members of the third degree to join the fourth degree. Councils should make an effort to form and support a Columbian Squires Circle which can be a future source of membership and Ladies Auxiliary. The committee recommends the promoting of young members and make officers and active members promote young ideas. "Turn over the power". Make the KC's a place for young and old to blend and provide babysitters whenever possible. The committee also recommends that all councils send out bulletins monthly or quarterly, and that copies of the bulletin or newsletter be sent to five councils in the state, on a random basis, for the purpose of spreading and stimulating new ideas.

### **INSURANCE**

In view of our Founder Father Michael J. McGivney's purpose to form a Fraternal Benefit Society so that the widows and children of members in the group when the member dies would not find themselves in dire financial straights, Knights of Columbus Insurance was instituted. As the insurance program not only provides this coverage but also helps to finance many of the programs of the Knights of Columbus, we encourage all members to become insurance members, especially State and Council leaders. The committee recommends that all councils make sure that they have adequate liability insurance as recommended by Supreme.

## **PROTOCOL**

The committee recommends that members of the clergy and Knights of Columbus State Family and officers be properly recognized as to their titles or positions at all Knights of Columbus meetings and functions. Also, we remind members of all the important aspects of protocol as explained in the protocol booklet. The committee also recommends that the State Officers reinstate the policy of visiting subordinate councils and protocol be strictly adhered to.

## SERVICE MENTALLY HANDICAPPED CITIZENS

The Louisiana Knights of Columbus are to be complimented for the tremendous support of the annual statewide fund raising program benefiting the learning impaired. Each council is called upon to continue this important work and to utilize to the fullest the involvement of families, Boy Scouts, Columbian Squires and Ladies Auxiliaries in the fund raising campaign. The committee recommends that councils use publicity to promote the Knight of Columbus donations by secular and religious newspapers. It is recommended that councils become more involved with activities of the learning impaired citizens at the local level and present the funds to them in a personal manner. The committee also urges councils to actively support the Special Olympics Program.

## **SUPPORT OF THE ELDERLY AND INFIRMED**

The committee urges each council to become actively involved in providing support for the elderly and infirmed citizens of our communities through such activities as weekly or monthly bingos at the retirement or health care facility, also Christmas-Thanksgiving Dinners, sponsoring Masses and communion services at the facility or just plain visitations. The committee also recommends that councils try to promote these programs at all times of the year, not only holidays and special occasions.

## **CONCLUSION**

The committee urges all councils to implement to the fullest extent, the foregoing recommendations. In order to obtain the fullest implementation of these recommendations, the <u>committee urges the State Deputy to</u> <u>insure that all councils receive and display</u> a copy of this report, and that a summary of this report be published in the June issue of the <u>LOUISIANA KNIGHT</u>. State Convention Policy

1. Convention

1.01 The State Council Meeting shall be planned and executed by the State Convention Committee, composed of the General Chairman, Co-Chairman (both appointed by the State Deputy), the State Deputy, the State Secretary, the State Office Administrator, the Convention Secretary, and Convention Committee Chairmen.

1.02 The State Deputy shall appoint the General Chairman and Co-Chairman by July 1. The General Chairman shall appoint the Convention Secretary, the Finance Chairman and the Committee Chairmen by September 30.

1.03 The Convention Committees shall include Finance, Housing, Registration, Publicity, Medical Services, Ladies Entertainment, Decorations, Financial Secretaries Association, Ladies Auxiliaries, Golf, Dance, Banquet, Breakfast, Protocol, PSD Programs, Printing, Program/Photography, Meeting Facilities, Sound & Recording Systems, State Deputy Hospitality, Masses, Exhibits, Youth, Transportation, and Parking & Security. The General Chairman may merge, eliminate or add committees with the consent of State Deputy.

1.04 No funds shall be expended nor obligated and no contract shall signed prior to the approval of the convention budget by the Elected State Officers. No funds shall be expended nor obligated in excess of a convention budget line item without a budget amendment, approved by the Elected State Officers.

1.05 No contracts, obligating the State Council, shall be entered into without the prior specific approval of the State Deputy.

1.06 The Finance Committee shall be composed of the General Chairman, the Co-Chairman, the Finance Committee Chairman, the State Secretary and the State Treasurer. The Finance Committee will propose a budget, based on anticipated expenditures provided by individual chairmen, to the State Convention Committee.

1.07 The State Convention Committee shall present a detailed budget, including the registration fee, to the Elected State Officers for approval by November 1.

1.08 The Finance Chairman will receive all convention funds, identify their source and forward them to the State Secretary. The Finance Chairman will receive all convention invoices. He will confirm accuracy of each invoice & forward it to the State Deputy. The State Convention finances, as State Council funds, will be administered in accordance with the State By-Laws. The Finance Chairman will maintain a record of all income and expenses. The Finance Chairman will provide a financial report to the State Deputy by the last day of each month, beginning in the first month following adoption of the budget, and a final report by the 15<sup>th</sup> day of June, immediately following the Convention.

**Be It Further Resolved** that the each State Deputy present a copy of this policy to the State Convention Chairman when the Chairman accepts his appointment.

Several changes occurred in the Acompano Raffle this past year. The prizes were changed from money prizes to merchandise prizes. This would make the tickets easier to sell knowing exactly what you would receive if you won. The date of the Raffle was also moved from Grand Knights Day in January to the State Convention in May. This would allow an additional 3 months to sell tickets.

The permit from the Louisiana Department of Revenue was then requested outlining the changes to our program. Upon approval from the State, the program presentation was prepared for KCLS.

Presentations were made at the KCLS meetings on July 19<sup>th</sup> in Prairieville and July 20<sup>th</sup> in Natchitoches to the Grand Knights. Tickets were designed and printed and distributed to District Deputies and Area Coordinators at the State Family Meeting held in December. The program was also presented at Grand Knights Day in Lafayette.

Prizes were drawn after the Awards presentation on Saturday, May 2.

The number in parenthesis is the council/assembly that sold the ticket.

A total of 6,669 tickets were sold by 151 Councils, 13 Assemblies and 1 Chapter. This is fewer than the previous year, but because the expenses were lower, the net proceeds increased. After taking out expenses and projected administrative costs for next year's Raffle, the net proceeds distributed to the two Seminaries was \$29,000. Checks will be presented to Notre Dame Seminary and St. Joseph Seminary College for \$14,500 each.

## **Report of CYLA Program**

# To: The Officers and Members of the 104<sup>th</sup> Annual State Convention Meeting of the Louisiana State Council of the Knights of Columbus held in Shreveport, LA.

The Catholic Youth Leadership Award Program is one of the most dynamic and rewarding programs that the State Council offers to the Membership. CYLA places an emphasis on Catholic values, scholastic achievement, athletics, and leadership in the areas of church, school and community. Catholic seniors throughout the state of Louisiana are eligible to participate in the CYLA program. The only requirement is that they must be nominated by a council within the Louisiana jurisdiction. Each council that participates in the CYLA program will find it to be both rewarding and fulfilling. Giving outstanding Catholic seniors the opportunity to compete for cash prizes, awards, and recognition is the very foundation of the CYLA program.

The CYLA program begins to take shape at the state officers' meeting held in June. CYLA is discussed at the Knights of Columbus leadership seminar held in July. The CYLA packets are mailed out to the council CYLA chairman or Grand Knight in November. At the same time the State Office mailed out a packet of information to every High School Counselor in the State. Appeals are made on behalf of CYLA at the state officers' meeting and at Grand Knights' day, encouraging councils to participate in the program. Councils that anticipate in the program turn in their nomination forms to the Area Coordinators. Area Coordinators conduct their respective area competition and award one boy and one girl the distinction of being an area winner as well as a state finalist. The Area Coordinator then sends the nomination forms the finalist to the state chairman. A total of 24 finalists will compete for the state championship. The state chairman appoints ten state level judges who will grade the nomination forms of the finalists and conduct the verbal competition held in April. Then the copies of the nomination forms are mailed to the state judges for grading. Upon completion by the state judges, the scores are tallied by the state chairman and are used as part of the overall score of the finalist.

Nearly 155 councils participated in the program this year. With this year's program, we saw that nearly every student nominee utilized the online interactive nomination form found at the state web site. This allows for a neater and more standardized application to be produced, permitting the maximum room for content to describe the nominee's activities and accomplishments. We will continue to streamline the online form and encourage all councils to promote its use. All councils should <u>discard any old paper forms</u> they may have in their files and wait for the new issue of the paper forms they will receive in their new packets, should they choose to use paper forms for their nominees. The use of old forms is strongly discouraged because of the changes in format and of the confusion it tends to create. <u>Please do not use the old forms!</u>

The State CYLA Finals were held at the Lafayette Catholic Diocesan office in Lafayette on April 19, 2009. Registration began at 8:00 a.m. and concluded at 8:45 a.m. The verbal interviews began at 10 a.m.. Lunch was served at noon. Judging continued at 1 p.m.. The interviews concluded at 3:30 p.m.. The state deputy awarded all of the finalists a check in the amount of \$500 as their area level winnings. Pictures of the finalists were taken and all area coordinators in attendance had the opportunity to have a picture taken with their finalists. The auditing committee tallied the scores and presented the scores to the state chairman and a winner in the boy and girl division was declared by the state chairman.

Trevor Boudreaux from Council 1114 Thibodaux was the boy winner and Brittany Lynn David from Council 5499 Church Point was the girl winner this year. They received their 1<sup>st</sup> place winnings of \$4,000 each at the State Convention banquet in Shreveport in May.

The 2<sup>nd</sup> Place winners were Joseph Caraway and Katherine Schluter. They received their \$3,000 prize money at the State finals. The 3<sup>rd</sup> Place winners were Alex Mayon and Brittany Lynn Rogers, and they received \$2,000 each that day, as well.

## **Report of Ethnic Program**

# To: The Officers and Members of the 104<sup>th</sup> Annual State Convention Meeting of the Louisiana State Council of the Knights of Columbus held in Shreveport, LA.

During the Summer 2008 State Family Meeting, DD 53 Keith Brossard and Vicen Alvarez, Ethnic Development Director, had a conversation about the possibility to establish a Hispanic council in the Forest Hill area.

After several conversations to coordinate a visit to the community, on Saturday, February 28, 2009, a presentation, to include the *Experience for a Lifetime* video in Spanish, was provided after the 7:30 PM (the only weekend) mass to a few men of Nuestra Señora de Guadalupe Mission, Forest Hill, in a private room by Gabriel Aguilar, Insurance Agent and Vicen. Also in attendance were: Vernon Ducote, State Warden; Ernest Babineaux, Area "K" Coordinator; and DD Keith Brossard.

On March 21, 2009, Vicen delivered another KC presentation from the pulpit to the Hispanic community after their 7:30 PM mass and again as a request from Padre Pedro Sierra, Mission Pastor, who is a KC member along with other men from this mission. After the services, several men inquired for more information about our Order, receiving the Membership Application (100) Form.

On Saturday, June 13, again at Nuestra Señora de Guadalupe Mission, and as a request from Padre Pedro, Vicen gave another presentation from the pulpit to the Hispanic community after their 7:30 PM mass. After the services, other gentlemen requested more information about our Order and picked up membership forms.

At all three deliveries, the community also obtained information about the council development, such as:

• Having a 1st degree exemplification shortly after with those men at that time interested - Keith Brossard is planning an immediate exemplification;

- · Making them members of another council Keith Brossard selected his council (#13505); until,
- · Creating a Round Table from that council to support Padre Pedro and his community; then,

• Appointing a bilingual member as the round table coordinator and have him coordinate other bulletin announcements, pulpit announcements, membership drives and informational sessions

Mr. Reilly Spitzfaden is being considered for that position; he is bilingual, very spiritual, and influential within the community; hence, will help to recruit others.

· Once that the Community/Round Table attains 30+ members, institute the new council.

## **Report of Marian Hour of Prayer Program**

## To the officers and members of the 104<sup>th</sup> State Convention Meeting of the Louisiana State Council assembled in Shreveport on May 1st, 2nd, and 3rd, 2009.

At the request of the previous Marian Program Coordinator S/K Wade Dupuis, now deceased, I agreed to assist with the follow up on the circulation of the three ikons of Our Lady of Charity through Louisiana councils. S/K Dupuis and I met several times so that I would understand and assist him with his responsibilities with this program. During the period of about three months, S/K Dupuis, who had served his council and the state of Louisiana Knights of Columbus in numerous roles and in an extraordinary manner, it became clear that his health was failing. S/K Wade Dupuis died at the beginning of our last program year, but not without first assuring that the program was well organized and would continue beyond his service. As a first point to my report, I am requesting that S/K Wade Dupuis be memorialized at our next state convention for his commitment to the order, his evident devotion to our Blessed Mother through this program, and his service to the Patriotic principle of our fourth Degree which he served as district Color Corps Commander.

Assuming the responsibilities for coordinating the Marian Program, as requested by our State Deputy S/ K Ben Davidson, I proceeded to monitor the circulation of the three ikons of the program through their respective scheduled areas and councils. It soon became clear that the logistics of circulating only three ikons was imposing a hardship on our councils and was detrimental to a successful Marian devotional program within our councils and parishes.

At a State Family Meeting, S/K John Boudreaux and I reviewed the situation, specifically because the schedule was significantly behind in the Lafayette/New Iberia areas. At that same meeting, S/K Boudreaux advised that efforts were in the early planning stages to develop a program in which their would be an ikon available and coordinated within each area. There were several tasks that would need to be accomplished for this program enhancement to be implemented.

At the recent State Convention, I verified with Robert Boudreaux that two of the ikons of Our Lady of Charity were in his care. One of them I returned to him at the convention, a second had been previously returned to the state office, and the third ikon was with a council in New Iberia who was supposed to be arranging to have it taken to the office after the convention.

Subsequent to the convention, I followed up with S/K Tim Boudreaux ad vising him that I had spoken to S/K Karl Robillard, of Council 3298, who had completed a prototype frame for the proposed ikons of Our Lady of Guadalupe. He advised that he had offered to make the frames for these new ikons for an agreed upon price and would then be coordinating with S/K Russell Ruh for finishing work and the completion of framing with a heavy duty plexiglass protective covering for the ikon. I do not know the status of the program from that point. However, it does seem that the price for framing is high and that some bidding or solicitation of quotes should be considered. Other aspects of the preparation of the ikons for circulation within the areas, if such is to be the plan, need to be addressed before the program can go forward. I defer to S/K Tim Boudreaux and S/K Russell Ruh for further information on this aspect of the program.

Further, there will need to be a review and planning for devotional materials, development of management protocols within the areas, if such is the intent, and an orientation of our state, district, and council officers to the protocol of this reorganized program and appropriate planning for scheduling of the circulation, monitoring, and reporting of the progress of the program. It would be my recommendation that these tasks be completed for implementation in October, a month like the month of May dedicated to our Blessed Mother. I would also ask that consideration be given to including prayers for the intentions of the Holy Father and our Supreme Knight and for the increased commitment of our Church and Country for the sanctity and dignity of all human life.

## **Report of Pro-Life Program**

### To the Officers and members of the 104<sup>th</sup> Annual Meeting of the Louisiana State Council, Brother Knights, Members and Guests assembled in Shreveport, Louisiana.

It has been a privilege to serve as your Pro-Life Chair Couple this past year. We extend a special thank you to our State Deputy for entrusting us with this important position. We also wish to thank our State Program Director and other members of the State Family for their support and encouragement. So much was accomplished, yet there is so much more to be done. The year has flown by and we look forward to serving another year as your Chair Couple.

One evening, we received a call from our State Deputy, Ben Davidson, who asked that we serve as Pro-Life Chair Couple. We were excited. For us this was a dream come true. We had worked locally for Pro-Life issues, now we had an opportunity to impact the entire State! We discussed it very briefly and called the State Deputy back to accept the position.

After making a few personal goals and a short "to do list" we obtained a list of pregnancy resource centers and called each of them. We updated their contact information and discussed their needs with each Director. We also inquired as to whether or not they were familiar with the Knights of Columbus Pro-Life Baby Bottle Campaigns, which provides substantial financial support to several local pregnancy resource centers. The centers were an area of critical need and we intended to make the Pro-Life Baby Bottle Campaigns our initial focus. Already used successfully in one area of the State for many years and with growing success in another area, we were convinced that this was the best focal point for our State Pro-Life Program.

In order to spread our message we began delivering a series of talks centering on the Baby Bottle Campaign concept. Our first talk was to our State Officers, Area Coordinators, & District Deputies in preparation for KCLS. Peter addressed the group "solo". A few weeks later, came KCLS. Peter once again addressed the group with an emotionally charged speech, while Ednamae manned the table, answering questions and providing Pro-Life materials to the KC's in attendance. Later that month, we wrote a "couples talk" which centered around the "Spiritual Works of Mercy" and spoke together to the members of our Ladies Auxiliary who were attending a State meeting in Gretna. This was an excellent talk, but an emotional one. It very was difficult for either of us to maintain our composure. After the talk, more than one Auxiliary member told Ednamae that they were "crying with us".

After the appointment of the Master, Gerard Thomas we received another call asking if Peter could serve as Pro-Life Chairman of the Louisiana District of the 4<sup>th</sup> Degree Knights of Columbus. Figuring he could handle one more "piece" of the Pro-Life duties in our State, he accepted.

Towards the end of the year, our primary focus of generating support for our local pregnancy resource centers across the State had to take a back seat as we faced one of the most critical elections in our nations history. This was an election that could help turn the tides in favor of Pro-Life issues or send us sliding backwards if Pro-Abortion advocates were allowed to take control of all branches of our federal government, the Presidency, Congress, and our Supreme Court. Our focus quickly shifted to the election. We broadcasted news of Pro-Life issues affecting the election via e-mail many times in the weeks leading up to the election. We also distributed handouts and other materials such as the United States Conference of Catholic Bishop's (USCCB) "Voters Guide for Serious Catholics.

And as the election results were reported, it was no secret that the outcome would mean a greater challenge for those in the Pro-Life movement. The next morning we sent out a mass e-mail, which told everyone that we needed to move forward and reset our focus to what it was before the election – save the unborn, one baby at a time by supporting our local pregnancy resource centers; the agencies that put themselves "on the front line" counseling women, a majority of whom are actively seeking an abortion.

As our one-year term continued, other talks followed at Grand Knights Day and at other State gatherings

of the 3<sup>rd</sup> & 4<sup>th</sup> degree. To complement our talks we brought along an arsenal of materials including actual baby bottles with inserts and other materials used by our local pregnancy resource center, for their Pro-Life Baby Bottle campaigns. Our comprehensive "how to" list, revised list of pregnancy resource centers around the State, sample church bulletin announcements, written talks for church campaigns, and other personally prepared materials were handed out to those present at several meetings of our KC groups.

At some point, we realized that we needed to try another approach to get our Knights even more involved in Pro-Life activities. We stepped back and reevaluated our program and came up with one of our most simple, but noteworthy accomplishments, the rewriting of all Pro-Life sections of our State Activity Grading Forms. While this change is not effective until this coming fiscal-year starting July 1, 2009, we have great hope of seeing significant changes in the frequency and impact of the Pro-Life activities of our Councils in the coming years. Now a Council will be required to perform one substantial project or program, perform two smaller activities that <u>support</u> the pro-life cause and two more that <u>promote</u> pro-life in order to earn all of their points on the grading sheets.

With the support and cooperation of our Webmaster, Lee Roy Cates, several changes and updates were made to the Pro-Life section of our State website. We also sent a message to our Councils & Assemblies in Louisiana using e-mail and handouts and requested that those groups with Memorials to the Unborn send a picture & description of their memorial for inclusion on the State website. Lee Roy received many pictures and stories from around the State which he promptly added to the website the same day he received them. Thank you, Lee Roy!

In an effort to be as efficient & cost effective as possible, we used e-mail all year long to spread important Pro-Life news and help educate our Louisiana Knights and their families on Pro-Life issues. State Officers & Area Coordinators were asked to forward all Pro-Life e-mails to their District Deputies, who were then asked to forward them to their Grand Knights for distribution by e-mail or as handouts to members of their Councils & Assemblies. Important Pro-Life material was also shared with our Ladies Auxiliary. Most e-mails were sent during the month leading up to the election and focused on our need to elect those who did not support the issues of abortion, euthanasia, fetal stem cell research, human cloning, and homosexual marriage, all issues listed by our USCCB (United States Conference of Catholic Bishops) as "non-negotiable".

After the election our e-mails continued, stressing the importance of letting our elected officials know that we oppose FOCA, the "Freedom of Choice Act" which would be the most distressing pro-abortion legislation ever passed. With affects so severe that it could very well overshadow the Roe v Wade Supreme Court Decision. Members of the Knights of Columbus & their families received a comprehensive list that we compiled via e-mail, handouts, & letters. The list detailed the devastating, expected changes that would occur if FOCA were passed into law. Petitions were also made available by the same means aimed at letting our elected officials know that we were against passage of this bill.

In addition to our many talks, handouts, and e-mails we also wrote articles for the Louisiana Knight, our State KC newspaper. Our articles focused on the Pro-Life Baby Bottle Campaigns, the elections & their aftermath, and the changes to the State Activity Grading Forms.

In January as the anniversary of Roe v Wade approached, pro-life marches were held throughout the State. We attended all marches that we were made aware of. Each had its own personal touches and took on the character of the parish and KC Council that sponsored it.

As far as regrets, we are sorry that we could not attend all the meetings that we were invited to. Unfortunately, we have to juggle our time between raising our family and talking at KC functions. Our two boys, both active in the Boy Scouts and their school bands often win the coin toss. In an effort to spread the Pro-Life message, despite our absence, we found a replacement to address our audience for meetings we had to miss. We also provided several handouts for the meeting packets to reinforce our Pro-Life message.

As we look back on this past year it is easy to see the many accomplishments that we were able to achieve, with the help and hard work of our Knights & Ladies. At the same time, its hard for us to not be

disappointed when there is so much more to be done ... so many more Knights & their families that need to get involved in the Pro-Life cause. The battle to end legalized abortion and combat the other issues contributing to a society of death, sometimes seems to be unending. With small successes mixed with failures happening every day, it often feels like we're taking one step forward and two steps back.

As Pro-Life Chair Couple, it's hard to measure our success. Most Directors have a clear benchmark or have goals that they can set to measure their success, but with Pro-Life, it's not that simple. How do you measure our success? Looking back, I am reminded of a quote from a very unique gentleman, who served for many years in our nation's Congress and who was a strong supporter of Pro-Life issues. We can find comfort in a quote attributed to him and hope that all of you that assisted us this year are similarly moved by his profound words.

When the time comes as it surely will, when we face that awesome moment, the final judgment, I've often thought, as Fulton Sheen wrote, that it is a terrible moment of loneliness. You have no advocates, you are there alone standing before God – and a terror will rip through your soul like nothing you can imagine. But I really think that those in the pro-life movement will not be alone. I think there will be a chorus of voices that have never been heard in this world but are heard beautifully and clearly in the next world – and they will plead for everyone who has been in this movement. They will say to God, 'Spare him because he loved us,' – and God will look at you and say not, 'Did you succeed?' but 'Did you try?'

## **Report of Scouting Program**

# To the officers and members of the 104<sup>th</sup> State Convention Meeting of the Louisiana State Council assembled in Shreveport on May 1st, 2nd, and 3rd, 2009.

In 2006, the Knights of Columbus and the National Catholic Committee on Scouting teamed up to start new Scouting units. Using this as a starting point, the Worthy State Deputy and myself decided to create the state Scouting program this Fraternal year. While the main focus of the national initiative is unit retention and growth, our discussions led to us to determine that the state program should have five areas of concentration:

1. Retention of Cub Scout, Boy Scout and Venturing units that are in danger of folding due to the loss of their chartering partner;

2. The creation of new Cub Scout, Boy Scout and Venturing units to bring the Scouting program to underserved areas;

3. The promotion and sponsorship of the Catholic Religious Emblems program;

4. The promotion of increased volunteerism in the Scouting program by our Brother Knights, at the unit, district and/or diocesan levels;

5. Recognition of Brother Knights who have given years of service to the Boy Scouts of America though a new state award, the Francis J. Parater Award.

As this was the first year of the program we obviously had no benchmarks to compare this year to but we were able to show some progress in the areas of concentration:

1. In terms of unit retention we were contacted by three units (2 Cub Scout Packs and 1 Boy Scout Troop) during the year that were looking for help in finding a new chartered partner. We were successful in linking up each of those units with a nearby council;

2. We were contacted by one group that was looking for assistance in starting a new Cub Scout Pack. We were able to find a local council who was willing to take on the task of starting this unit;

3. As evidenced in the points awarded for the State Deputy's Award not every council is taking the opportunity for an easy 10 points by sponsoring the Catholic Religious Emblems program. This area will be heavily emphasized in the upcoming Fraternal year and we are looking at making some changes in the awarding of points in this area;

4. While many of our Brother Knights are very visible in there volunteerism with the Scouts, there are many more that do not go out of their way to be visible. This makes it very difficult to track how we are doing in increasing the number of Knights who are volunteering with the Scouts at various levels. We will be emphasizing the crossover potential of Knights and Scouting volunteers in this upcoming Fraternal year;

5. We had a couple of inquiries from Brother Knights regarding the new recognition but we have received no nominations to date. We will be heavily publicizing this new award in the upcoming Fraternal year and hope to make our first awards.

While the state Scouting program is still in its infancy, we are making great strides in turning this into one of the state's preeminent programs. The Boy Scouts of America is one of this country's great youth programs and we will find many of our future Knights in their ranks.

## **Report of Special Olympics Program**

## To the officers and members of the 104<sup>th</sup> State Convention Meeting of the Louisiana State Council assembled in Shreveport on May 1st, 2nd, and 3rd, 2009.

The "Special Olympics" Program started on Jan. 1<sup>st</sup>, 2009, is slowly coming together. In the 5 months since we instituted this program Statewide, we have gotten some very positive feedback, from many Councils and Brother Knights. A few Ideas are being looked at closely and are promising.

One of the main objectives that we wanted to improve on is more <u>Hands on</u> involvement with "Special Olympics". This is now being done by several Councils that previously, hadn't involved itself that closely. One Council started by doing a Christmas Dance for the Athletes within their Civil Parish. Burgers and snacks, along with a DJ that provided Music, brought a lot of Joy to about 125 Athletes for 3 hours. This total Project cost that council about \$250 and only a little Elbow Grease. The smiles and Hugs of thanks they received have convinced that Council to already be planning on making it an Annual Event. I know that the Kids are looking forward to that also.

A few Councils are combining with other groups to hold Events. These events are Social and or Athletic events. The most important thing you can provide Special Olympics with, is, <u>Your Time</u>. Volunteering your time with the Kids means more than all the money in the world. This brings you closer together with the Kids and gives you more of an appreciation of the bonding that occurs between you and the Athletes after your gift of time.

One of the few events, where YOU can earn Official Medals alongside the athletes, is Unified Bowling. One of these events is now in the works for later this summer in New Iberia, (a Unified Bowling Tournament between Athletes and <u>Knights</u>). This will team two Knights and two Athletes together in team bowling. They will be entered using "USBC" Averages against other teams with like averages. Gold, Silver and Bronze "Special Olympics" Medals will be given out to <u>all</u> Competing teams. This event, as a Recognized Event, Must be done according to Special Olympic regulations. IF this event, interest you, let me know. I can help set it up for you or I can put you in touch with someone, near you that can help.

On May 22, 2009, at the State Summer Games in Hammond, La, 22 Fourth Degree Knights performed an Honor Guard for Opening Ceremony with more than 800 Athletes. The Rains put a slight damper on the event BUT it went on anyhow. According to many, who have been with Special Olympics since the beginning, this was the  $1^{st}$  time an Honor Guard has been done in the History of the La State Summer Games. Many Thanks, to My Brother Knights. Hopefully next year the weather will be better and more Brothers will make the Honor Guard bigger and better and an Annual Event.

After the opening ceremony, many people including many coaches and parents mentioned to me that they had never seen a Knight in Full Regalia. They had no clue what the Knights do. Questions kept me busy for quite a while.

In late June I will receive the NFL Raffle Tickets for Special Olympics. These will be similar to the ones that we helped sell last year, benefiting Special Olympics. I will be distributing them at Both KCLS Meetings in July. This Raffle earned Special Olympics quite a substantial amount of money last year. In fact the Knights sold the second highest amount of tickets in the State of La. This year with your help, we should be the top in sales.

Please talk to your Councils and Assemblies and get them to help in buying and selling these Raffle tickets. This is one of the biggest fundraisers that Special Olympics are doing this year. With the economy the way it is, Funding for Special Olympics by the State and Federal Gov. is the first to go. Our help is desperately needed.

## **Report of Y.E.P. Program**

# To the officers and members of the 104th State Convention Meeting of the Louisiana State Council assembled in Shreveport, Louisiana on May 1, 2, and 3, 2009.

What a wonderful and fulfilling experience it has been serving both the youth of the state and the Louisiana Jurisdiction through my chairmanship of the Youth Expansion Program (Y.E.P.) this year. Serving in this role has afforded me the opportunity to not only aid the youth in the state, but it has allowed me to meet many brother knights throughout the state. I thank all who invited me to their meetings and provided me an opportunity to speak and/or presented me a contribution to this program at that time.

We began this year by providing each council their annual quota at the KCLS meetings. From there, I used each opportunity that I had to communicate with the Area Coordinators, District Deputies, Grand Knights, and other members as a means to educate them on where the money collected was used and where the funds for our youth programs comes from. Some were already aware of these expenditures and sources, but many were not. This was all done in an effort to emphasize why all should strive to meet their quota and the implications of what might occur to the youth programs in this state if the needed funds were not received.

Council donations began trickling in during the months following the start of this program year; however, many councils were waiting for Grand Knights Day where they could personally hand their donation to State Deputy Ben Davidson and proclaim their donation to the rest of the attendees during the Parade of Councils. That day, seventy-two councils donated a total of \$80,842.50.

At this time, we have collected \$130,170.95 for the youth programs of the state. The vast majority of these funds were received from 129 councils of which eighty-two councils gave their quota. Of these reported funds, \$4,613.95 was received from other sources such as mass collections, gumbo sales, and the 50/50 raffles that we conducted. \$219.95 of these miscellaneous funds was from a donation by the Louisiana Ladies Auxiliary Association.

This weekend, we will add to our coffer through our 50/50 raffles and our mass collections.

In conclusion, I would like to once again thank all who gave to this effort this year. Without their financial support, our state youth programs may not exist. To those councils who haven't given, please consider doing so. There is still time to invest in our youth programs in this state. This year's program does not conclude until June 30.

#### **FREEDOM OF RELIGION**

The history of our nation has been written on a background of freedom. We Americans understand freedom...we have earned it, we have lived it, and we have died for it. But we must always be aware that our liberties can be taken away from us. Our earliest presidents were acutely tuned in to the dangers that threatened our new nation. James Madison, for one, expressed his belief that gradual and silent encroachments would do more to abridge our freedoms than would violent and sudden unlawful seizure of power. He thought that those encroachments would come from those in power in our own government ...namely congress and the judicial system. And we have seen evidence of those silent encroachments. Over the last fifty years we have witnessed the relentless attacks on the foundations of our Constitution ...almost the way a conquering army would do it...a little at a time so as not to alarm the populace.

And what about those terrorist attacks from the Muslim world against Christian nations? George W. Bush had it right when he described the events following the attacks on the World Trade Center, the Pentagon, and the ill-fated flight that ended up in a field in Pennsylvania. He labeled those acts a holy war initiated by Muslims. Of course, he was immediately castigated by all the politically correct media and politicians... especially after the highly organized Muslim Public Relations establishment loudly objected. Over and over again, we have witnessed the apologetic demeanor with which our liberal politicians interact with Muslims and any of their enterprises. It's time that we Americans take another look at our country's history and decide what it is that we must do today to stop the slow but steady erosion of our freedoms.

Author Brad Thor has an especially good account of events from our past that somewhat mirror our current situation. He described the episodes as follows:

Most Americans are unaware that over 200 years ago, the United States declared war on Islam, and Thomas Jefferson led the charge. At the height of the 18<sup>th</sup> century, Muslim pirates were the terror of the Mediterranean and a large portion of the North Atlantic. They attacked every ship in sight and held the crews for exorbitant ransoms. The hostages were subjected to barbaric treatment and wrote desperate and heart wrenching letters home begging their governments and families to pay whatever their Mohammedan captors demanded. These extortionists of the high seas represented the Islamic nations of Tripoli, Tunis, Morocco and Algiers, collectively known as the Barbary Coast. They presented a dangerous and unprovoked threat to the new American Republic.

Before the Revolutionary War, U.S. merchant ships had been under the protection of Great Britain. When the United States declared its independence, and entered into war, the U.S. ships were protected by France. However, once the war was won and we had gained our independence, America had to protect its own fleets. So, in 1776, we were on our own...without a navy and without a plan.

Beginning in 1784, seventeen years before Thomas Jefferson became president, he left for Paris to become America's Minister to France. That same year, the United States Congress sought to appease its Muslim adversaries by following in the footsteps of European nations who paid bribes to the Barbary States rather than engaging them head-on in war. But then, in July of 1785, Algerian pirates captured two American ships, and the Dey of Algiers demanded an unheard of ransom of nearly sixty thousand dollars. It was extortion, plain and simple. Thomas Jefferson, now U.S. Minister to France, was vehemently opposed to any further payments. Instead, he proposed to Congress the formation of a coalition of allied nations who together could force the Islamic states into perpetual peace. But Congress was disinterested in Jefferson's plan and decided to pay the ransom. One year later, in 1786, Thomas Jefferson and John Adams met with Tripoli's Ambassador to Great Britain and asked him by what right his nation attacked American ships and enslaved American citizens. Tripoli's ambassador claimed that the right was founded on the laws of their prophet, Mohammed, and that it was written in the Koran that all nations that didn't acknowledge the authority of Islam

were sinners, and it was not only their right and duty to make war on these sinners wherever they could be found, but to make slaves of all they could take as prisoners. The ambassador further stated that every Muslim slain in battle was guaranteed a place in Paradise. Despite this stunning admission of premeditated violence on non-Muslim nations, and in spite of the objections made by numerous notable Americans, including George Washington, who warned that caving in was wrong and would only further embolden their enemy, the United States Congress continued to buy off the Barbary Muslims with bribes and ransom money. They paid Tripoli, Tunis, Morocco and Algiers upwards of one million dollars a year for the next fifteen years, which by 1800, amounted to 20 per cent of the United States government's annual revenues. Jefferson was disgusted. To add insult to injury, when he was sworn in as the third president of the United States in 1801, the Pasha of Tripoli sent him a note demanding an immediate payment of two hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars, plus twenty-five thousand dollars a year for every year thereafter. That was when everything changed. Jefferson let the Pasha know, in no uncertain terms, what he could do with his demand. The Pasha responded by chopping down the flag pole in front of the U.S. Consulate and declaring war on the United States. Tunis, Morocco and Algiers immediately followed suit. Jefferson had been against America raising a naval force for anything beyond coastal defense, but having watched his nation be cowed by Islamic thuggery long enough, he decided that it was finally time to meet force with force. He dispatched a squadron of frigates to the Mediterranean to teach the Muslim nations of the Barbary Coast a lesson they would never forget. Congress authorized Jefferson to empower U.S. ships to seize all vessels and goods of the Pasha of Tripoli and also to cause to be done, all other acts of precaution or hostility as the state of war would justify. When Algiers and Tunis, who were both accustomed to American cowardice and acquiescence, saw that the newly independent United States had both the will and the "might" to strike back, they quickly abandoned their allegiance to Tripoli. Nevertheless, the war with Tripoli raged for four more years and flared up once again in 1815. The bravery of the United States Marine Corps in these wars led to the line in the Marine Hymn, "to the shores of Tripoli." And Marines would ever after be known as "leathernecks" .... for the leather collars of their uniforms that prevented their heads from being chopped off by Muslim scimitars when boarding their ships. Islam, and what it's Barbary following justified doing in the name of their prophet and their God, disturbed Jefferson quite deeply. America had a tradition of religious tolerance. In fact, Jefferson had co-authored the Virginia statute for religious freedom ... but Fundamentalist Islam was like no other religion the world had ever seen ... it was, and is, a religion based on "supremacist," whose holy book not only condoned, but mandated, violence to unbelievers. This was unacceptable to Thomas Jefferson. One of Jefferson's greatest fears was that someday this brand of Islam would return and pose an even greater threat to the United States. He was definitely ahead of his time.

Thomas Jefferson learned all he could about the tenants of Islam and tried to figure out how its radical war-like doctrine could be defeated without another shot ever being fired. Please understand....Jefferson wasn't anti-Islam, he was anti-Islamist. There's a distinction...he didn't give a flip if his neighbor claimed there were twenty gods or no god, as long as his neighbor didn't pick his pocket or break his leg. Fundamentalist Islam, though, picks pockets and breaks legs and that's why Jefferson was alarmed. He was the father of the separation of church and state, after all, but the underlying problem with Fundamentalist Islam is that it is both political <u>and</u> religious...it teaches that the two cannot be separated. The Islamists believe that manmade laws are inferior and must be replaced with God-given Islamic, or Sharia, law and that all governments worldwide should be Islamic. Muslims firmly believe that the United States is foolishly destroying itself and that their mission is to "save" the United States from itself.

And so, we see ourselves facing the same danger that concerned Thomas Jefferson. As I wrote this, the news reported that Islamic Somalian pirates had captured an American merchant ship. After the American crew retaliated against their captors, thereby driving the pirates from the ship, the Somalis succeeded in taking the captain of the American ship as prisoner and holding him for ransom. Well our president finally got tired of the intimidation from this rogue nation? So he simply decided to speak gruffly. And the reactions of our military were nothing short of spectacular.

You may well be asking yourself, "What has this to do with me?" The reason you should be concerned is that this situation is just one more incident that could eventually lead to foreign attacks on religion in America. It's scary enough that our own country has chipped away at our public expressions of faith even as it encourages public encouragement of faiths that seek to undermine ours. But when we witness lawmakers in the state of Connecticut trying to put into law a bill that would take away the right of the Catholic Church to handle its own finances, we have to stand together and demand that government refrain from interfering in the affairs of our religion. Because a church council didn't do its job effectively and allowed a priest to rob the parish of enormous sums of money, two Connecticut legislators, both Catholic by the way, decided that the state government could do a better job of deciding how the funds given by all Connecticut parishioners was to be spent. The Knights of Columbus, the Bishops of Connecticut, and Catholics from all across the state stood together in protest and embarrassed the legislature by reminding them what the Constitution has to say about separation of Church and State. What if no one had been paying attention? Apathy is dangerous. As Knights of Columbus, we must always be alert and responsive to events that could affect our right to worship as we wish. We must always be ready to support our priests. And we should never forget that devotion of our hearts, minds and souls belong to our church and our God.

December 7, 1941 will be a day that will go down in history. The United States encounters an attack when the Japanese attack Pearl Harbor. September 11, 2001, the United States faces devastation as the news shows terroists attacks at the World Trade Center and the Pentagon. Throughout history, our country has witnessed several shocking and disturbing events. I believe that God has given each of us special gifts and talents. We all have special purposes including those babies who are aborted. They could be the next greatest lawyers and doctors who find cure for diseases. I believe in positive alternatives including adoption. I believe in life. Pope John Paul II said in his Homily of 1979, "give us the grace that when the sacredness of life before birth is attacked, to stand up and proclaim tht no one ever has the authority to destroy unborn life." It is time for all of us to stand up and protect the unborn. We must write letters to our representatives and senators. We must pray. We should participate in Pro-Life marches and pray in front of abortion clinics. We should always remember that no matter what we go through, whether it is pain or strife....we will stand together and remain Pro-Life!
