PROCEEDINGS

FIRST DAY'S SESSION

At 10:15 a.m., Saturday, May 3, 2014, State Deputy John Boudreaux called to order the 109th Annual Meeting of the Louisiana State Council, Knights of Columbus, at the Pontchartrain Center, Kenner, LA. Upon the State Deputy's direction, State Warden Rennan Dufour and his assistants, having pre-determined the fact, reported that all in the council chamber have been verified and were in possession of a current KC membership card. State Deputy Boudreaux then called upon Msgr. Carson LaCaze, Associate State Chaplain, to lead the assembly in the opening prayer.

The State Deputy then requested the assembly to remain standing for the posting of the national colors, followed by the pledge of allegiance to the flag, conducted by Master Ronald Fogarty.

In opening remarks, State Deputy Boudreaux states "we would like to take this opportunity on behalf of Brother Gerard Thomas and Brother Knights of the New Orleans area in welcoming you to the 109th Annual Meeting of the Louisiana State Council." Brother Boudreaux went on to welcome all clergy in attendance.

Mayor Michael S. Yenni, Mayor of Kenner then welcomed all brothers to Kenner.

State Deputy then recognized the Past State Deputies in attendance.

State Deputy Boudreaux noted that 100 Point Certificate Winners would be noted via a powerpoint presentation, that would be repeated throughout the weekend. Boudreaux also commented that "program awards" would be presented throughout the Saturday and Sunday business sessions, as well a during the Saturday evening Banquet. The State Deputy went on to note, that "all certificates would be placed in one envelope, that could be claimed during the voting process on Sunday morning, or at the conclusion of the convention, late Sunday morning.

State Deputy Boudreaux then formally announced the appointment of Eric Miller, Baton Rouge, as Convention Parliamentarian. Brother Miller gave a few remarks on the rules and instructions about being a delegate and visiting knights.

The State Deputy moved to close the open session to conduct business outside the normal scope of the third degree. The motion was seconded by James McCain, Council 3779, Shreveport. Business conducted included Squires, Louisiana Knight Foundation and Bishop Greco Foundation. These reports can be found in the reports section.

PSD David Bakeler then presented the Greco Foundation report. Moved for its adoption and seconded by Gerard Tarantino, Council 8546. PSD Steve Thomas then presented the financial aspect of the Greco Foundation. Thomas moved for its adoption and was seconded by Maurice Evans, Council 7355.

Brother Boudreaux then called on Eric Miller, Parliamentarian, to review the rules of the 109th Annual Meeting. Brother Miller reviewed all rules and also commented that the rules had been published in the *Louisiana Knight*. Brother Miller then moved for acceptance of the printed rules. The motion was seconded by Dalton Hebert, Council 1286, Lafayette.

Brother Miller then explained the process of the elections.

The State Deputy then called upon State Secretary Vernon Ducote for the presentation of the Temporary Roll. Ductore explained the procedure for conducting the Temporary Roll Call will be in effect until the Permanent Roll is developed and presented by the Credentials Committee and approved by the State Council.

Since appointments to convention committees are well displayed on the convention bulletin board located in the foyer by the Registration Desk and since these appointees were notified by personal letters, State Deputy Boudreaux announced that these appointments would not be read unless he was requested to do so by the assembly, and if an appointee is replaced at the convention by his alternate, then the alternate shall serve on the committee.

These appointments are found on pages sixteen and seventeen.

The State Deputy then called upon State Secretary Ducote for the presentation of the minutes of the last State Council Meeting. The State Secretary moved that due to the length of these minutes, that the minutes be referred to the Minutes Committee without reading them. The motion was seconded by Donald Hebert, Council 14657, Pineville.

State Deputy Boudreaux then recognized Grand Knight Thomas C. Sylvester, Council 9016, Baton Rouge, Chairman of the Minutes Committee for his committee's report. Upon his conclusion, Brother sylvester moved for the acceptance of the minutes committee report. The motion was seconded by Nathan Arceneaux, Council 8898, Larose.

CYLA Awards were then presented. A complete list of CYLA Awards can be found in the Awards Section of these proceedings beginning on page 75.

Being recognized for this purpose, State Deputy Boudreaux then announced that a number of communications have been received. He moved that these communications be referred to the Felicitations Committee without reading and/or debate. This motion was seconded by Frank Chase, Council 8840, Mathews. The report of the Felicitations Committee can be found on page 39.

At this time, the State Deputy then called for reports of State Officers. He requested State Secretary Vernon Ducote assume the chair for the purpose of introducing the State Deputy, and requesting his rendering of the State Deputy Report. State Deputy Boudreaux then presented his report, encompassing the myriad of activities, projects, programs, and undertakings of Columbianism in the Louisiana Jurisdiction during the past fraternal year. Upon completion of that report, David Bakeler, Council 1286, Lafayette, moved for the adoption of the report. Kenny Eberts, Council 3061, Covington, seconded the motion, and the motion carried unanimously. The complete report of the State Deputy is reproduced in these proceedings beginning on page eighteen (18).

State Secretary Ducote then requested that the State Deputy again assume the chair and this was accomplished. State Deputy Boudreaux then called upon State Secretary Vernon Ducote, Council 8342, Prairieville, to render his report and recognized him for this purpose. The State Secretary then rendered a detailed report to the assembly. Upon his conclusion, Boudreaux moved that the report be received with thanks, and it be referred to the appropriate committees. The motion to adopt the report was made by Charles Schexnyder, Council 8342, Prairieville, and was seconded by Kenny Eberts, Council 3061, Covington. The motion carried unanimously. Reproduced in these proceedings, the State Secretary report as of June 30, 2013, begins on page 22.

The report of the State Treasurer was then called for by the State Deputy, who recognized State Treasurer James Riente for that purpose. State Treasurer Riente presented his report, stating that the report to be reproduced in the minutes of this convention would be as of June 30, 2013. When he concluded his report, Riente moved for its acceptance and reference to appropriate committees. Keith Gros, Council 3054, Lockport, moved to adopt the report, and it was seconded by Mike Degeyter, Council 12997, New Iberia. The motion carried without dissent. The full report of the State Treasurer, as of June 30, 2013, can be found in these minutes beginning on page 24.

The State Deputy then called for the report of the State Advocate Paul deMahy, Council 1276, St. Martinville. The State Advocate report was read and upon its conclusion moved for the acceptance of his

report. Kenny Eberts, Council 3061, Covington, moved for the adoption of the report. Seconded by Donald Hebert, Council 14657, Pineville, the motion unanimously carried. Reproduction of these minutes appear in this report beginning on page 28.

State Deputy Boudreaux then called for the report of the State Warden, recognizing State Warden Rennan Duffour, Council 2409, Luling, for this purpose. State Warden Duffour presented his report and upon its conclusion, he moved for its acceptance. The motion for acceptance was then presented by Melvin Burrell Council 2409, Luling, and was seconded by Wayne Duhon, Council 12997, New Iberia. The motion carried without dissent. The report of the State Warden can be found starting on page 29.

Calling for the report of the State Office Administrator, the State Deputy then recognized Robert Boudreaux, Council 3202, Lafayette, for this purpose. The State Office Administrator then rendered his report. Upon its completion, Troy Rizzuto, Council 3015, Sulphur, moved for its adoption and reference to appropriate committees. Seconded by Dennis Condon, Council 1357, Natchitoches. The motion carried unanimously. The full report of the State Office Administrator is reproduced in these proceedings, beginning on page 30.

State Deputy Boudreaux then called for the report of the Master of the Fourth Degree, recognizing Master Ronald Fogarty for this purpose. Master Fogarty presented his report and upon its conclusion, he moved for its acceptance. The motion for acceptance was then presented by Mike Roy, Council 3779, Shreveport, and was seconded by Anthony Vavasseur, Council 10606, Belle Rose. The motion carried without dissent. Master Report can be found beginning on page 82.

MDF Awards were then presented. A complete list of MDF Awards can be found in the Awards Section of these proceedings beginning on page 106.

Proceeding to the receipt of convention committees, State Deputy Boudreaux called for the report of the Audit Committee and recognized Grand Knight Philip S. Zima, Council 9240, Mandeville, committee chairman, for this purpose. Brother Zima rendered the full report and having completed the report moved for its adoption. Seconded by Alex Springer, Council 8932, Bourg, and the motion carried. The Audit Committee report may be found on page 32.

The State Deputy then called for the report of the Memorials Committee and recognized Grand Knight Eric J. Snyder, Council 1437, New Orleans, for this purpose. Chairman Snyder moved for the adoption of the amended procedure, which was then seconded by Anthony Vavasseur, Council 10606, Belle Rose.

Calling for the report of the Felicitations Committee, the State Deputy recognized Grand Knight Walter J. Pertuit, Jr., Council 9347, Metairie, for this purpose. Pertuit presented the committee report and moved for its adoption. Seconded by Al Abila, Council 2878, Metairie, the motion carried without dissent. The Felicitation Committee report is reproduced in these minutes and begins on page 39.

The State Deputy then called for the Good of the Order Report. The State Deputy recognized Grand Knight Vance Thomas, Council 2807, Greenwell Springs, Committee Chairman selected at convention, for that purpose. Grand Knight Thomas presented an amended (short version) committee report and moved for acceptance, and E. Richard Yandle, Council 10293, Lafayette, seconded. The motion carried without dissent. The report of the Good of the Order Committee is reproduced in these minutes and begins on page 40. The committee also recommended all future committee members be sent the entire "good of the order" with their "letter of appointment".

Under "special orders" of the State Council's By-Laws, in Section 6:1, the State Deputy then called for nomination for officers of the State Council and representative and alternate representatives of the State Council to the Annual Supreme Council Meeting. With the new balloting and counting procedure, all nominations will also be closed on the first day. He explained that our by-laws allow a maximum of three minutes for making a nomination and that nominations shall not be seconded. Boudreaux emphasized that all nominators must submit a written report of their respective nominees' names along with mailing addresses, council numbers and membership numbers to the State Secretary; and if the nomination is for State Deputy or insurance representative,

a Knights of Columbus insurance certificate number of the nominee must also be provided in the written report. The State Deputy further advised that the ballots would list candidates in alphabetical order. Besides those Knights of Columbus already entitled to the floor, any third degree member in good standing can be granted the privileges of the floor for the purpose of submitting a nomination; however, such action must be approved by the assembly. Printed nomination forms are available at the State Secretary's Registration Desk. Boudreaux then opened the floor for nomination for State Officers and the following nominations were received:

State Deputy Boudreaux then announced that nominations were officially closed and would not be received Sunday morning. The State Deputy then announced that "nominations are now closed."

State Deputy Boudreaux then moved that all nominees for the offices of insurance and/or associate delegate to the 2014 Supreme Council Meeting be hereby accepted as nominees for alternate representatives in their respective categories and be it further moved that after the elected representatives in each category, the next four candidates in descending vote position in each category be deemed elected as the alternate representative. John Manes, Council 1208, New Iberia, seconded the motion and the the proposal was accepted unanimously.

State Deputy Boudreaux then called for the State Secretary to the podium to give the Credential Committee Report. The State Secretary then rendered his report. Upon its completion, John Manes, Council 1280, New Iberia, moved for its adoption and reference to appropriate committees. Seconded by Kerry Williams, Council 9415, New Orleans. The motion carried unanimously. The full report of the Credentials Committee is reproduced in these proceedings, beginning on page 35.

State Deputy Boudreaux then called for the submission of any resolutions not yet submitted for action. He explained that there was no need to read the resolutions but merely submit them to the State Advocate. He explained further that any resolutions submitted after this point would need the approval of the convention's delegates to be considered for action thereon.

State Deputy Boudreaux made announcements and urged all in attendance to be prompt for the 5:00pm Convention Vigil Mass and to remain until all Ministers of the Mass have proceeded out of the chamber.

He also commented that "voting would take place in the Pontchartrain Center Lakeview Terrace from 7am to 8:30am." He continued by saying "you will need your membership card and a pictured ID to vote". Boudreaux finished his comments on voting by saying that if a run off were needed, the business meeting would be recessed to accomplish the second balllot.

Boudreaux then called upon Msgr. Carson LaCaze, Associate State Chaplain to offer a closing prayer. State Deputy John Boudreaux then recessed the convention at 1:30pm.



SECOND DAY'S SESSION

State Deputy John Boudreaux called to order at 9:05am the second day of the 109th Annual Meeting of the Louisiana State Council, Knights of Columbus. After State Warden Rennan Duffour and his assistants had verified that all in the chamber were in possession of a current K.C. Membership Card. Assistant State Chaplain Francis J. Carabello led the assembly in the opening prayer. The State Deputy then asked Master Ronald Fogarty to lead the body in the Pledge of Allegiance.

The State Deputy then commented that the Election Process had been completed, but encouraged all Voting Delegates to remain, as a possible run-off could occur.

The State Deputy then recognized the three (3) "Most Improved Councils" for the previous fraternal year. They were:

The State Deputy then distributed "Top 20" Certificates to those councils finishing in the top of the State Deputy scoring.

State Deputy John Boudreaux, with the assistance of YEP Chairman, Kenny Gonzales, presented certificates to all councils who had made their YEP Quota for the year.

State Deputy Boudreaux then called upon Youth Expansion Program Chairman Gonzales to render his report. In making his report, Chairman Gonzlaes emphasized that his report, as it will appear in the proceedings of this meeting, will be inclusive of all receipts through June 30, 2014. He urged councils not yet participating in the YEP to date, to please do so, prior to that June 30th closing date.

Brother Gonzales then thanked everyone for their great support of the offertory at both Masses and moved for the adoption of the YEP Report. Maurice Evans, Council 7355, Houma, motioned for the acceptance of Gonzales's report, and then Melvin Burrell, Council 2409, Luling, seconded the motion, and the report was accepted by acclamation. The complete YEP report may be found beginning on page 93.

The Convention then presented the following YEPAwards:

John X. Wegmann Memorial Award: St. Margaret Council 3208, Lake Charles, Willie R. Berzas, Grand Knight, with a \$16.55 per member contribution.

Bishop Charles P. Greco Award: St. Margaret Council 3208, Lake Charles, Willie R. Berzas, Grand Knight, \$13.04 per member over the past 10 years.

For the purpose of rendering his committee report, State Treasurer James Riente, Chairman of the Budget & Finance Committee, was recognized. Chairman Riente presented the comittee's report, and at its conclusion, moved for its adoption. Roy Accord, Council 9000, Golden Meadow, seconded the motion. The complete text of this committee report is found in these minutes beginning on page 33.

Returning to the receipt of Convention Committee reports, the State Advocate was then called upon, as Chairman of the Resolutions Committee, to present the committee report and then explained that when the report reached the point of calling for action on the specific resolutions, the chairman would read the purpose and resolved clauses of the resolution and then read the recommendation of the resolution committee. "Your silence would indicate your agreement with that recommendation in which case I will rap the gavel indicating that the recommendation of the Resolutions Committee is adopted," the State Deputy announced. "If you wish action other than the committee's recommendation, appropriate motions, seconds, discussion and action are in order," he concluded. He then recognized the Committee Chairman who explained that he would read the purpose of the resolution, then read the resolved clauses, then read the recommendations of the Elected State Officers, that of the Advisory Board, and the recommendation of the Resolutions Committee, and if necessary, the rationale of the committee's recommendation. Floor action would be on the recommendation of the resolutions committee. Utilizing this procedure, the chairman then presented the resolutions committee report, and upon its completion, Brother Paul deMahy moved for its adoption. Thomas Ruemker, Council 8342, Prairieville, seconded and the motion carried. The report of the Resolutions Committee can be found beginning on page fifty (50).

The State Deputy then recognized GK John Manes, Council 1208, New Iberia, Chairman of the Elections Committee for his committee report. Brother Manes, rendered his report and then moved for its adoption. It was so moved, seconded by Brad Picard, Council 8978, Sulphur, and carried. 
The State Deputy then called upon 2015 Convention Chairman Vince Whittington, for introductions and comments pertaining to next years convention in Baton Rouge.

State Deputy Report

Worthy State Chaplain, Bishop Herzog, State Officers, Worthy Supreme Board Member, Past State Deputies, 4th Degree Master, Honored Guests, and my dear brother knights, on behalf of the Convention Committee, we would like to welcome you to Kenner and hope that your stay will be enjoyable. If you attended our Social last night, I am sure that you enjoyed the crawfish and entertainment, but most of all the fraternalism. I would like to acknowledge our Convention Chairman, Gerard Thomas and his Convention Team and offer my heartfelt gratitude for a job very well done. Chairing our Annual Meeting is a very large undertaking and Gerard and his Team did an outstanding job.

It has truly been an honor to serve as your State Deputy this fraternal year. As State Deputy, I traveled to New Haven, CT. in June for training and the time spent in New Haven was very enjoyable. Especially Mass at St. Mary's Church where the tomb of Father McGivney is located. Following Mass we had breakfast in the basement of St. Mary's Church, were the Knights of Columbus was founded. In November, I attended the Winter Meeting for State Deputies in Quebec City, Canada and once again, the State Chaplains were also invited to attend. So I was able to spend time with Bishop Herzog. Pris and I truly enjoyed his company. We joined in the celebration of the 350th Anniversary of the Cathedral of Notre Dame in Quebec City. It was cold and snowing, but it was a wonderful experience.

The ANNUAL SURVEY OF FRATERNAL ACTIVITY, compiled by the Supreme Council indicates that the Louisiana Jurisdiction has consistently donated cash annually in various categories of about <u>\$2.7mil-</u> <u>lion</u> and estimated hours of volunteer service equal to about <u>2.1</u> million; Supreme uses a value of \$20 per hour as an economic impact value factor for volunteerism. So the total value of contributions statewide is about <u>\$45,000,000</u>. This is an outstanding testimonial of the generosity of the brother knights in Louisiana. Just think of the possibilities if we could double our membership.

We began this fraternal year with our Annual Summer Meeting, held in Covington the last weekend of June 2013. The State Family gathered to hear what our plans entailed for the new fraternal year. We held training sessions on Saturday and Sunday and introduced new membership goals and programs. Each State Family Member received all of the presentations on a DVD. Presentations were created by the Officers, Program Chairmen and Directors in a Power Point Format, in order to save time and to provide information that would be usable for the first 6 months of the fraternal year. The Supreme Council sent Planning Binders for DD's and State Family Members. Abbot Brown from St. Joseph's Seminary and Abbey was our guest speaker at our Banquet. Abbot Brown was very gracious and thanked the Knights of Columbus for their service to God and to the community.

The Knights of Columbus Leadership Seminar, KCLS, was conducted in Geismar, at Dutchtown High School, in mid-July. We planned the day with power point and video presentations; we also invited our Culture of Life Couples for the day. Peter and Edna Mae Sahuc conducted the Culture of Life Program. Attendance was outstanding; about 650 attended. We utilized breakout sessions for Membership, Programs, and Financial Secretaries, in a rotation format. Membership Director, Richard Yandle and his Team, presented our membership goals and ideas of how to achieve the goals. Jose Jimenez, our Supreme MPC, assisted us and also presented a membership power point presentation. Program Director, Vince Whittington managed the Program presentations and was joined by his Program Team. I am truly grateful to Vince and his Team for doing a very fine job presenting Programs. The State Officers also conducted a mini KCLS in Natchitoches for our brother knights in the northern parishes.

Our Mid-Year Meeting was hosted by Area H Coordinator, Larry Comeaux, in Lafayette. We introduced our KC Net TV Station. The meetings went very well; once again we incorporated power point presentations and videos to illustrate our plan and introduced the programs for the second half of the year. We also evaluated our membership goals and how we planned to continue to grow in membership the second half of the year. We encouraged Corporate Communions, Church Drives, Welcome Back, and serious retention measures to facilitate membership growth.

The Supreme Convention was held in San Antonio, Texas in August. All of the elected Delegates attended along with all of the State Officers. Our State Advocate, Paul deMahy and his wife Marilyn acted as our hosts for the week. They took care of the Hospitality room for us as we attended the meetings. They were very hospitable and all attendees were very grateful. San Antonio weather was extremely hot, but the air conditioning in the hotel worked fine. The Supreme Council focused on Religious Freedom and most of the speakers gave their ideas about Religious Freedom. Many Cardinals, Bishops, and Priests, attended the convention. Our Delegation was joined by our Associate Chaplain Father Mark Derise. Bishop Provost of the Lake Charles Diocese also attended for the first time. MEMBERSHIP is the focal point of every fraternal year. We all share in an obligation to continue to add new members to our great Order. The theme for membership this year is "ONE MEMBER PER MONTH PER COUNCIL" and our Membership Director, Richard Yandle, and his Team, have done an outstanding job this year in promoting membership each month. Paul Gagnet, known by all as "Uncle Paul" serves as New Orleans Metro Area Membership Director. Lee Allen Simon serves as our Welcome Back Program Chairman. Gerard Thomas and The New Council Development Team are working on several more potential councils that are currently in the development stages. Vicen Alverez our Ethnic Council Development Chairman has done a great job for us and has two Spanish Councils under development for this year. Councils are beginning to conduct membership drives with spring in the air and the Lenten season behind us. So I am very hopeful that we will bring in copious amounts of new members, work our Welcome Back Program and reactivate suspended members. I am very happy to report that we are on track to attain our membership goals this fraternal year, but we must continue to work hard so that we will achieve our membership goals.

CEREMONIALS are an integral part of our Order, every new member must go through a 1st degree exemplification and this fraternal year we emphasized that each new recruit should be encouraged to go through the 2nd and 3rd degree. Since retention is a major concern, new candidates who go through all three degrees will most likely, remain in the Order much longer and perhaps, for life. So it is critical for the perpetuity of our Order that we insist that every new recruit go through all three degrees. IPSD Ronnie Boudreaux is our Ceremonials Chairman, he brings years of experience to Ceremonials and I am truly grateful for his volunteerism and support in Ceremonials. We have Degree Teams throughout our State, this facilitates a savings in travel expense, and it also allows us to host multiple major degrees on the same day. I wish to thank all of the degree teams in our Jurisdiction for performing a great service for their brother knights, every team is outstanding and a credit to Columbianism in Louisiana.

PROGRAMS are a very important and an integral part of the Knights of Columbus, without programs we would not be able to recruit new members; it is through our programs where we find charitable works done by faithful brother knights throughout the state. Our Program Director, Vince Whittington has done an outstanding job this year and his Program Team has worked very hard to provide programs that will benefit the needy, youth, seminarians, and offer sporting events that challenge our brother knights.

Our MDF Program raises funds to support the mentally challenged throughout the state. Councils choose worthy organizations within their communities that will benefit from their hard work and fund raising. As of April 14th councils have donated over \$200,000 statewide and will continue to donate until June 30. MDF Chairman is Lloyd Meyers, Lloyd has dedicated many years serving as MDF Chairman, thank you Lloyd for your

dedication and service to the State Council. Louisiana Special Olympics has asked the State Council to support TEAM LOUISIANA, we launched the TEAM on April 6, with a picnic, the team will participate in the 2014 National Games, so please continue to support Team Louisiana with donations so that every special needs child will be able to participate in the National Special Olympic Games in 2014. Jerry LaSalle is our Special Olympics Chairman and has chaired this position for several years; Jerry and his wife attended many National Special Olympic Games and are very dedicated this most worthy cause. Youth Expansion Program is funded through the generosity of our councils. Each year we provide funds that benefit our Catholic Youth Leadership Award Program, Columbian Squires, Seminarians, Soccer, Free Throw, youth retreats like Camp Joshua, that has evolved into an awesome program, conducted in Baton Rouge, Ruston, and at Camp Abbey. Vince Whittington chairs this program. Our CYLA Program is one of our most dynamic youth programs, benefitting High School Seniors. Each year we find outstanding Catholic high school seniors who are role models for their peers and an inspiration to all of us. This year is no different and our CYLA Champions will speak at our Banquet this evening. Darrell Ourso is our State CYLA Chairman this year and participated in CYLA when he was a senior in high school. Darrell has done an outstanding job.

Our Columbian Squires Program Chairman, George Martin, has taken a very aggressive role in developing new Squire Circles, recruiting, and creating activities that will foster the perpetuity of the Squires in Louisiana. George was instrumental in establishing the squire website; we have a link to this site available on our state website; Great job George. Youth Program Chairman, Darrell Barrios, continues to find outstanding students that have been recognized by the Supreme Council for their Posters and Essays. The State Council has been represented extremely well in the past by producing Supreme Council International winners in Posters and Essays and this year I am proud to announce that Charlotte Bradley from Hammond is the International Winner of the Keep Christ in Christmas Poster Contest; Charlotte competed against over 2,000 contestants worldwide. We also host kid's soccer and free throw competitions state wide and conduct state finals events that award trophies and prizes to the participants and winners. All of the mentioned programs would not be possible if we did not have our Youth Expansion Program, Kenny Gonzales is our Chairman. YEP provides the necessary funds for all of the youth programs. Through YEP we also provide support to college councils and the seminarians. The State Council also sponsored many sporting events; Softball, Golf, Horse Shoes, Basketball, Bowling, and a 9 Ball Pool Tournament. Ralph Comeaux is our Chairman, great job Ralph. Total collections through June 30, 2014 are <u>\$209,523.69</u>. Some councils still owe Per Capita from previous billing cycles; they are included in the list below.

As of June 30, 2014, fifty-one (51) councils have not paid their assessments the total is <u>\$22,561.96</u>.

All checks were written for the State Council through our server located at the State Office. QuickBooks software is used to work all book keeping functions for the State Council. The State Council uses a voucher and receipts system similar to the system used in councils. The State Deputy issues a voucher to authorize checks to be written. The State Secretary then writes the checks, signs and forwards the checks to the State Treasurer who countersigns the checks and mails the checks to the payee.

Serving as your State Secretary has been an honor and a privilege the past two years. Visiting councils throughout the state and witnessing the fraternalism and charity has been very humbling, every council has been very gracious to me and I am very grateful for the hospitality.

To our State Deputy John Boudreaux, thank you for your support and assistance with per capita invoicing, but most of all, thank you for your creativity. State Treasurer Report

To the Officers, Past State Deputies and Delegates of the 109th Annual Meeting of the Louisiana Jurisdiction of the Knights of Columbus, assembled in Kenner, Louisiana on May 3 and May 4, 2014.

In accordance with Section 7.2 of the by-laws of the Louisiana State Council, all Officers of the State Council shall be required to submit a complete written report to the State Council of their official acts. I am privileged to present the Annual Report of the State Treasurer to my fellow Brother Knights of the Louisiana Jurisdiction for the Fraternal Year 2013-2014.

The accounting procedures established for handling the funds of the State Council are sound and have internal controls built into the system. In accordance with Section 9:2 of the by-laws of the Louisiana State Council, the State Secretary shall receive all funds due to the State Council. He shall then prepare a transmittal and then the funds and transmittal over to the State Treasurer for deposit into appropriate bank accounts. Referencing Section 10:1 of the by-laws, the State Treasurer is the custodian of all State Council funds and is required to keep a true and accurate record of all funds. In accordance with this, I have done my due diligence in order to comply with our by-laws and I hereby certify that the financial statements presented in this report represents a true and accurate accounting of the financial condition of the Louisiana State Council.

The State Council has three active checking accounts that are balanced monthly by the State Treasurer. These accounts are the following: *General Fund Checking, State Convention Checking, and MDF Checking.* Funds are deposited in each of the three accounts to facilitate the payment of expenses directly related to each aforementioned account.

The State Council maintains eleven trust accounts: General Fund Trust, YEP Current Trust, YEP Fund Raiser Trust, Exemplification Trust, General Fund Unallocated Trust, YEP Unallocated Trust, Fourth Degree Trust, Louisiana Knights Foundation Trust, Benefit Reserve Trust, Disaster Relief Trust, and Convention Reserve Trust. These accounts are monitored and reports are given on the earnings or losses monthly. Referencing Section 10:4 of the state council by-laws, the State Treasurer shall segregate and keep in a separate depository funds designated as the Youth Expansion Program.

A voucher system is used for all disbursement of funds. The voucher is prepared by the State Deputy and sent to the State Secretary for recording and the production of checks. The State Secretary then forwards the voucher along with the checks to the State Treasurer. An alternative voucher system utilizing the accounting system to enter an electronic voucher in order to pay bills is done by the State Deputy. The checks are listed as entered and are printed by the State Secretary. The State Treasurer ensures that this activity is recorded in the accounting system of the State Council. Finally, he signs and mails the checks to the appropriate parties. In accordance with Section 8:1 of the state by-laws, all checks issued are required to have the signature of two of the following State Officers: State Deputy, State Secretary, and/or State Treasurer.

The State Treasurer ensures the recording of all receipts and expenditures to the financial accounting records is in the appropriate accounts. Each month, he prepares a report of all accounts for review by the State Deputy, Elected State Officers, and Past State Deputies.

Banking accounts are reconciled to the accounting records for both checking and trust accounts. The reconciled trust statements are included in the monthly reports to the State Deputy, Elected State Officers, and the Past State Deputies each month.

As we move into new areas of electronic imaging, we also hope to abandon current meeting practices, and faciliate either the meeting, and/or training via the internet. KC Net TV is a prime example of that step into the future.

State Directory

Current information is key to this Louisiana Council product being effective. Form 185s must be submitted to the State Deputy and/or State Council for the info to be correct. The State Directory is posted on our State Website, and is updated weekly, where as the printed document is only updated annually. Please note, council submission of Form 185 electronically, does not suffice the State Council needs, as the file goes to New Haven, and not Lafayette. We need councils to submit their traditional hard copy 185 to the State Office.

This document is available for download at the KC State Website.

The Louisiana Knight

The Louisiana Knight newsletter continues to be published quarterly, however submission of council articles and photographs has become non-existent, and without council info, the newsletter becomes ordinary, at best.

Of note, the *Louisiana Knight* now publishes only four times per year. March, June, September and December are the publication months, while the deadline for submitting articles and photos will be the 15th of the publication month.

Unlike the early days, where the state office would create a document and send to the printer, now the State Office produces all facets of the publication, including the printing of, and the distribution via the postal system, as well as an attempt to circulate to members who have submitted email address to the state council.

Budget & Finance Committee Report

To: The Officers and Members of the 109th Annual Meeting of the Louisiana State Council Knights of Columbus assembled in Kenner, Louisiana. In accordance with Section 19 Committee on Budget and Finance of the By Laws of The Louisiana State Council Knights of Columbus the following report is presented.

On March 8, 2014, the Elected State Officers and Past State Deputies met to discuss the proposed Budget for the 2014-2015 Columbian year. A copy of the previous year's budget and the income/expense through December 31, 2013 were furnished to this group in advance, for their preparation for this meeting.

The proposed Budget was submitted to the Elected State Officers and Past State Deputies at the Advisory Board Meeting on March 2nd. The Past State Deputies offered their views and changes or comments that were then incorporated into the proposed Budget.

After this meeting, according to the By-Laws of the State Council, two copies were mailed by the State Office administrator to all Councils of record.

The Budget and Finance Committee meeting was held on Saturday, May 3, in ROOM 2 of the Pontchartrain Convention Center in Kenner, Louisiana at 9:00 AM. This meeting was for the purpose of continuing the review of the proposed Budget.

Included in this review of the proposed Budget for the Louisiana State Council was: General Fund; Youth Expansion Funds; Youth Expansion Fund Raiser, Seminaria Mission Fund Raiser; State Council Office Operations; and Investment Transactions.

By accomplishing this task – the committee on the Budget and Finance has complied with the State Council By-Laws-Section 19-Committee on Budget and Finance.

The Committee took into account that the Proposed Budget carried the approval of the State Deputy and the Elected State Officers. Prior approval was given by the Advisory Board of Past State Deputies at their meeting in March 2014. Based on the review of the Budget and Finances of the State Council, the Budget and Finance Committee offers the following recommendations to you for your considerations here today.

I would ask that the Budget and Finance Committee please come and join me.

1. The Committee recommends that the State Council continue to perform an audit of the funds of the Louisiana State Council with the Committee of three (3) Past State Deputies, (3) seated Grand Knights, the State Financial Officers and up to (2) two at large members to oversee the audit.

2. The State Per-Capita Tax should stay the same as outlined in the Budget Proposal

3. The Seminarian Mission Fund should continue to assist with the funding of the Seminarian Mission program.

4. Due to the uncertainty of receipts for the 2013-2014 Youth expansion Program Budget. The Committee recommends that the following: If total income for the 2013-2014 Fund Raiser does not equal budgeted income, selected Accounts will be decreased with the approval of the Elected State Officers. If funds exceed budget, selected accounts will share in the increased gain with the approval of the Elected State Officers.

5. Excess Funds in the General Fund and YEP be placed in existing investment accounts. Any shortfall resulting in the General Fund Budget: funds may be transferred from the General Fund Unallocated (G30.0 General Fund Unallocated) with the concurrence of the State Officers.

6. The State Treasurer presented a review of the investment account for the Louisiana State Council. Based on this report, the committee recommends continuing with Capital One Bank Trust Group and requests every effort continues to optimize interest on investments.

7. Since the 2014-2015 Budget was mailed to each Delegate to the State Council Meeting – the Budgetand Finance Committee recommends discontinuing the line item reading.

8. A final Financial Statement as of June 30th be distributed to each council of record by no later than August 31st of the same year.

Worthy State Deputy – the committee on Budget and Finance moves for the adoption of these line items before concluding this report.

Items 1 – 8 ADOPTION

The committee agrees that the Budgets for the General Fund, Youth Expansion Fund, Youth Expansion Fund Raiser for 2014-2015, Seminary Mission Fund Raiser for 2014-2015, Exemplification Fund, the Investment Transactions and the State Council Office Operation will be included in the minutes of this State Council Meeting.

To: The Officers and Members of the 109th Annual Meeting of the Louisiana State Council held in Lafayette, La.

Your committee on the Good of the Order met on Saturday, May 3rd, and fully discussed at length the following activity areas. After due deliberation, the committee urges all council, district and state leaders to see that the following recommendations are fully implemented.

The committee would also ask that at future conventions, each member of the Good of the Order Committee, as appointed, be forwarded a copy of the previous year's Good of the Order report to prepare committee members as to what is to be discussed.

FIRST AND FOREMOST WE ARE CATHOLIC

The committee recommends the recitation of the Serran Prayer for Vocations, or another appropriate vocations prayer, at each council meeting and that the council chaplain should encourage the recitation of this prayer at all Masses. The committee further recommends that a prayer be offered at each council meeting for the beatification of our founder Father Michael J. McGivney. The council chaplain should be encouraged to be actively involved in council activities. In the absence of the council Chaplain, a deacon shall be asked to bring the message of our faith. The committee urges all councils to participate in the Refund Support Vocations Program (RSVP). Each council should consider sponsoring a speaker on vocations to the various parochial schools. Recognizing that some clergy may still be apprehensive to Knights of Columbus involvement, the committee recommends each council strongly consider implementation of the Parish Round Table Program and thus show evidence of our belief that VOCATIONS ARE OUR BUSINESS and that each Grand Knight has a dialogue with each Pastor of churches in his council area. Each council should consider having a speaker on evangelization, to encourage each member to promote the Catholic faith to non-Catholics, and to help fallen-away Catholics to become again active in the Church. One way this can be done effectively is by supporting evangelization through the RCIA program.

PRO-LIFE

The committee recommends increased efforts from the state level to provide more timely and specific information to the council level about upcoming activities such as Pro-Life Rallies. The committee encourages area, district and local Right to Life Masses and demonstrations. It is also recommended that continued active exposure to the public by each council be pursued. The committee encourages each council to construct a monument to the unborn in a prominent place, preferably on the church grounds and those that have one to maintain and have programs to bring Pro-Life to parishioners attention. We urge right-to-life education, to fight abortion, and specific projects, such as enforcement by members and Grand Knights of letter writing campaigns from council members to state and federal governing bodies. We also urge the use of the vast amount of material that is available about the AIDS Virus, and promoting abstinence and chastity as a way of decreasing the threat of AIDS as well as decreasing abortions and moral decay.

The committee also recommends that councils become involved with local Right-To-Life organizations by way of participating in their events and getting on their mailing lists. The committee urges use of material available to them from the Supreme Council pertaining to Pro-Life. The committee also urges members to fight pornography at the council, family and school levels. The committee further recommends that the State Council provide updated information of current Federal and State legislation on Pro-Life and Euthanasia.

The Committee reommends each council appoints a Pro-Life Chairman or Chair-Couple; supports a youth Pro-Life Retreat as sponsored by the State Council; and offer a Pro-Life prayer at business meetings.

BISHOP GRECO MEMORIAL FUND

The committee recommends that all councils use the memorial cards to memorialize deceased council members. The card can be filled in with the name of the deceased and the name of the donating council. The

card is mailed to the member's family. A suggested donation of \$25.00, however any amount is accepted, and sent to the Greco Foundation for the trust fund.

The committee also recommends that councils make a voluntary contribution of \$1.00 per member, on annual basis, to the Bishop Greco Memorial Fund..

RETREATS

The committee recommends that each council have a guest speaker with Catholic Retreats as the subject, and schedule retreats for its members, individual as well as couples, encouraging husband and wife retreats whenever offered.

FAMILY INVOLVEMENT

The committee recommends continual family involvement in council activities. The committee also recommends each council have a monthly Family Communion. The committee strongly recommends that widows of deceased council members be included and recognized in every aspect of the council's life and activity. This committee further recommends that the council members make themselves available to provide assistance to widows and receive a copy of the council news letter and provide transportation if needed.

YOUTH EXPANSION PROGRAM

The committee urges each council to actively support the Youth Expansion Program by annually exceeding it's YEP quota, and by involvement in a youth organization such as Columbian Squires, Boy or Girl Scouts and/or Catholic Youth Organization (CYO). The committee recommends that all members in each council be asked to make a personal contribution to our Youth Expansion Program and councils should not depend on fund-raisers only. Each council should consider either making it a part of the dues or adding to their billing a \$10.00 voluntary contribution by each member. The committee recommends that all councils participate in the CYLA Program and that efforts be made to properly recognize the applicants and winners on the council level.

SUBSTANCE ABUSE-HEALTH SERVICES

The committee recommends each council sponsor an educational program on substance abuse by the law enforcement agencies to local junior and senior high schools. The committee urges all Knights to recognize local, state and federal law enforcement agencies. The committee further recommends that councils establish blood donation drives, Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) training programs and community blood pressure surveys.

FRATERNAL MEMBERSHIP-NEW COUNCIL DEVELOPMENT

The committee wishes to compliment the first degree and major degree teams in the Louisiana Jurisdiction for their excellent exemplifications which act as catalysts in encouraging all councils to obtain new, active members. The committee wishes to remind all members that it is our Supreme Council's desire that we have a KC presence in every church parish and that we should aid all efforts to form a new council or a Parish Round Table. It is also recommended that all members proposing new members into our Order assume responsibility for insuring the first-degree member receives his major degree as soon as possible, and remains an active member. Also, we congratulate all councils that sponsor a first degree teams and we strongly recommend that every council make an attempt to establish a team, and that all ceremonials be performed with the proper dignity. The committee recommends that every council make an effort to bring in new members, but that no less effort be expended to retain the members they now have. Council leaders and members should promote patriotism and encourage members of the third degree to join the fourth degree. Councils should make an effort to form and support a Columbian Squires Circle which can be a future source of membership and Ladies Auxiliary. The committee recommends the promoting of young members and make officers and active members promote young ideas. "Turn over the power". Make the KC's a place for young and old to blend and provide babysitters whenever possible. The committee also recommends that all councils send out bulletins monthly or quarterly, and that copies of the bulletin or newsletter be sent to five councils in the state, on a random basis, for the purpose of spreading and stimulating new ideas.

INSURANCE

In view of our Founder Father Michael J. McGivney's purpose to form a Fraternal Benefit Society so that the widows and children of members in the group when the member dies would not find themselves in dire financial straights, Knights of Columbus Insurance was instituted. As the insurance program not only provides this coverage but also helps to finance many of the programs of the Knights of Columbus, we encourage all members to become insurance members, especially State and Council leaders. The committee recommends that all councils have adequate liability insurance as recommended by Supreme.

PROTOCOL

The committee recommends that members of the clergy and Knights of Columbus State Family and officers be properly recognized as to their titles or positions at all Knights of Columbus meetings and functions. Also, we remind members of all the important aspects of protocol as explained in the protocol booklet. The committee also recommends that the State Officers reinstate the policy of visiting subordinate councils and protocol be strictly adhered to.

SERVICE MENTALLY HANDICAPPED CITIZENS

The Louisiana Knights of Columbus are to be complimented for the tremendous support of the annual statewide fund raising program benefiting the learning impaired. Each council is called upon to continue this important work and to utilize to the fullest the involvement of families, Boy Scouts, Columbian Squires and Ladies Auxiliaries in the fund raising campaign. The committee recommends that councils use publicity to promote the Knight of Columbus donations by secular and religious newspapers. It is recommended that councils become more involved with activities of the learning impaired citizens at the local level and present the funds to them in a personal manner. The committee also urges councils to actively support the Special Olympics Program, as well as St. Mary's Training Facility in Alexandria.

SUPPORT OF THE ELDERLY AND INFIRMED

The committee urges each council to become actively involved in providing support for the elderly and infirmed citizens of our communities through such activities as weekly or monthly bingos at the retirement or health care facility, also Christmas-Thanksgiving Dinners, sponsoring Masses and communion services at the facility or just plain visitations. The committee also recommends that councils try to promote these programs at all times of the year, not only holidays and special occasions.

CONCLUSION

The committee urges all councils to implement to the fullest extent, the foregoing recommendations. In order to obtain the fullest implementation of these recommendations, the <u>committee urges the State Deputy to</u> <u>insure that all councils receive and display</u> a copy of this report, and that a summary of this report be published in the June issue of the <u>LOUISIANA KNIGHT</u>. As a chairman of the Good of the Order committee, I would like to thank all committee members for their attendance, input, and participation at our meeting Saturday morning. I would also like to thank the State Deputy for the privilege of serving on this committee.

WHEREAS: The Catholic Church teaches that the right to religious freedom is based upon the inherent dignity of the human person, which is known through both reason and divine revelation; and

WHEREAS: The right to religious freedom is guaranteed by the First Amendment of the Constitution of the United States; and

WHEREAS: Religious freedom means that all persons are to be free from coercion in matters of belief and conscience, and that no person should be forced to act in a manner contrary to his or her own beliefs or conscience; and

WHEREAS: During his visit to the United States in 2008, Pope Benedict XVI reminded us that it should never be necessary to deny God in order to enjoy our rights and that it is inconceivable that believers should have to suppress their faith in order to be active citizens; and

WHEREAS: The Church consistently teaches that religious freedom is an inalienable right which should be recognized in the governing laws of each country in such a way that it is acknowledged as a basic civil right; and

WHEREAS: Religious freedom is not a benefit that a government confers out of a sense of mere tolerance and that can be removed, but rather it is an inalienable right, rooted in the transcendent dignity of every human being; and

WHEREAS: Religious freedom is at the very heart of human rights because it encompasses freedom of speech, assembly and conscience, which together form the basis of civil society and respect for the individual; and

WHEREAS: On August 1, 2011, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services issued preliminary regulations pursuant to the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act that require all Americans to subsidize health insurance plans that provide full coverage for surgical sterilizations and contraception, including abortifacients such as "morning after" pills; and

WHEREAS: These abortion-inducing drugs attack a developing unborn child either before or after implantation in the mother's womb; and

WHEREAS: On January 20, 2012, the Obama Administration finalized this mandate and announced that non-profit religious institutions, including the Catholic Church, would have one year to comply with the rule, and that no exemption would be granted for Catholic hospitals, dioceses, charities, social service agencies, schools, colleges and universities; and

WHEREAS: The mandate also forces private Catholic employers and businesses — such as the Knights of Columbus — to provide all employees with insurance coverage that includes abortion-inducing drugs, contraception, and sterilization; and

WHEREAS: On February 10, 2012, the Obama Administration offered to religious organizations a socalled "accommodation" which did not change the mandate and was quickly rejected by the U.S. bishops because Catholic organizations and individuals would still be forced to violate their religious convictions; and

WHEREAS: One of the rationales for this mandate — that abortifacients, contraceptives and sterilization are less expensive than child birth — lays the groundwork for the government to one day mandate that all health insurance plans include abortion; and

WHEREAS: This mandate sets a dangerous precedent and represents one of the most serious intrusions on religious freedom in our lifetimes;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT: We will never waver in our efforts to defend religious freedom as an inherent right of all Americans; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT: As American citizens and as Knights of Columbus, we will steadfastly support the free exercise of religion as it is enshrined in the First Amendment of the Constitution of the United States; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT: We stand in solidarity with our bishops in their call to the Catholic faithful, and to all Americans, to join together in the great struggle to oppose this mandate and to protect religious liberty and freedom of conscience; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT: We call upon President Obama to rescind this mandate which is a clear and direct violation of our religious liberty rights; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT: We call upon Congress to pass, and the President to sign, legislation that will protect the constitutional right of religious institutions and individuals to be free from government coercion in health care and all other matters; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT: We will remain steadfast in our opposition to any future governmental action or policy that forces Catholic institutions and individuals to violate our most deeply held moral and religious convictions; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT: Our struggle for religious freedom at this decisive moment in our nation's history is not only for our sake, but for the sake of our children, our grandchildren and all future generations, so that they too may know a country that is "one nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all."


Report of Church Director

First I would like to thank our State Deputy and Program Director for placing their trust and confidence in me for being Community Activities Director. Also thanks to the many Brother Knights who have supported and helped with the Community Activities. This year (2013-2014) One hundred two (102 or 33%) Councils submitted a Community Activity Report. Eighteen (18) Councils received 100% of the points and thirteen (13) Councils received 95% of the points.

The Knights of Columbus' program to do this is the Community Activities programs. This program consist of eight activities to assist your council to plan and succeed in your council's Community Activity Program. The activities are Volunteerism, Human Needs, Civic Involvement, Environment, Public Safety, Health Services, Decency, and Honor Columbus.

Report of Culture of Life Chair Couple

To the Officers and members of the 109th Annual Meeting of the Louisiana State Council, Brother Knights, Members, and Guests assembled at the Ponchartrain Convention Center in Kenner, Louisiana.

We are very proud of the continued progress made in Louisiana this year in the Culture of Life Program area. Councils once again showed increased interest in Culture of Life activities with even more Councils appointing a Council Culture of Life Chair Couple for the first time and a marked increase in activities by the Councils in our jurisdiction.

As we have in the past five years, this fiscal year, we continued to encourage growth in the Culture of Life program area by emphasizing the accomplishment of four simple, but important tasks by our Grand Knights. These are: (1) appointing a Council Culture of Life Chair Couple, (2) Sending us a Chair Couple contact information form, (3) Inviting the Chair Couple to KCLS, & (4) Supporting the Council Culture of Life Chair Couple with funding & manpower. This emphasis was included in some of the articles & in talks we gave, that were more than often directed towards our jurisdiction's Grand Knights.

With established direct lines of communications, we also encouraged our Council Culture of Life Chair Couples to set up a comprehensive Culture of Life Program, which included a variety of activities. We suggested using the state grading form, which we developed four years earlier, under the administration of State Deputy Ronnie Boudreaux, as a guide for establishing their individualized program. By emphasizing the completion of programs under each of the five categories falling under Culture of Life, the individual Councils are provided with a truly comprehensive or "well-rounded" program. Using this five-category approach includes sponsoring or participating in one or more activities under each of the categories of support, promotional, spiritual, educational, and political influence (public policy).

This year, as we have over the past five years, we focused much of our efforts on our annual Culture of Life Seminar at KCLS. Thanks to the encouragement & resources provided over the years, by our State Deputies (Ben Davidson, Ronnie Boudreaux, & John Boudreaux) this program has grown in both content & attendance over the last six years. From a one hour presentation in a small classroom about half full of attendees to a five hour block of quality Pro-Life material in a high school band room filled to capacity, we have been truly blessed by the support of our elected state officers and the interest shown by the enthusiastic Council Chair Couples. Each year since we were appointed, we have helped educate our Council Chair Couples as interesting & fun as possible.

This year, as we did in 2012, KCLS began with a Pro-Life Rosary led by our family in the main meeting room of the seminar where everyone was in attendance. After the Rosary, the Council Culture of Life Chair Couples departed from the rest of the group and met us for our Culture of Life Seminar in the band room. We opened with a prayer & had each Couple in attendance complete a contact information form so that we could contact them periodically when we had something of importance to share with them.

Next we quickly reviewed a few basic Pro-Life topics that we cover each year for the benefit of any new Couples & as a refresher for any veteran couples. This once again included "What are the Duties of the Council Culture of Life Chair Couple" and an overview of Pregnancy Resource Centers.

After that, we showed the Couples a short video we prepared that explained the State's Culture of Life program area. The video emphasized using the five-category approach and detailed the wide variety of programs & activities the Couples could select from in developing their own comprehensive program and explained where these programs should be slotted on the state grading from when the fiscal year came to a close.

Our next presentation centered-around abortion procedures. This talk included a very concise narrative, which closely coincided with a slideshow that we compiled describing & illustrating several commonly used

abortion procedures. In addition to an overview of these procedures, the slideshow also covered some basic fetal development which helped the Couples see how developed the babies are when each of the common procedures are utilized by the abortionist.

After a lunch break, we continued our program with an in depth discussion surrounding the Culture of Life Activity Report. This included a talk and many questions by the Council Chair Couples. This presentation was well received by the Council Chair Couples who actively participated in the discussion and asked a variety of questions about possible programs & activities their Councils might do and concerning the "slotting" of these programs & activities on the form.

After a very successful, well-attended seminar, in order to reward the attentive Chair Couples and perhaps more importantly, in an effort to emphasize & encourage the use of Pro-Life promotional materials, we gave out special Pro-Life t-shirts to the attendees. There specially ordered t-shirts were obtained from "Heritage House" the non-profit company that developed & distributes the "precious feet" lapel pins with funds provided by our State Deputy John Boudreaux. We carefully selected what we felt were the most appropriate Pro-Life t-shirt designs from the hundreds available on their website. Then, we customized nearly all of the tshirts with the Knights of Columbus logo. Some of these customizations included "Culture of Life Chair Couple" on the shirt or included the name of one of the Councils that sponsored Pro-Life marches in their communities. Every couple that attended received a least one shirt, with most receiving two (one for each man & woman attending).

After the Couples selected their favorite t-shirts and a few good-byes, we closed KCLS with a prayer and invited the attendees to join us again next year.

Following our seminar in July, our time was spent sending out e-mails to the Chair Couples informing them of current events & topics of interest. We also answered many questions throughout the year that Couples had for us telephonically or via e-mail. We also authored four articles for publication in the quarterly State KC publication, *The Louisiana Knight*. Each article covered a topic of interest pertaining to a Culture of Life.

Towards the end of the year, at the State Family (Winter) meeting we provided the "ladies entertainment" by delivering a Pro-Life presentation. Our presentation was followed by a visit to one of Lafayette's pregnancy resource centers. The ladies who participated were given a tour of the pregnancy resource center, maternity home, and baby & maternity thrift store owned by the DesOrmeaux Foundation. The ladies enjoyed both the presentation & tour and were appreciative of our efforts. Each participant received a Pro-Life Prayer Packet with a Pro-Life Rosary and several different Pro-Life Prayer cards & pamphlets. We also had a door prize drawing for an outdoor statue of Mary & grotto, which we presented to the winner later that morning at the luncheon.

At the State Family meeting and at Grand Knights Day, a month later, we reminded those in attendance about the upcoming "Baby Shower" to be held at our State Convention and about the upcoming State Marches for Life to be held in Baton Rouge and Shreveport. These two marches, held around the anniversary of Roe v Wade, were very well attended. This included a truly outstanding presence by the Knights of Columbus. Several Councils sponsored buses to the marches and the Louisiana District 4th Degree in full regalia led the marches. The march in Shreveport was reported to have over 5,000 attendees, a surprisingly exceptional number, especially since this was the first State march held in that area.

This year, following a local march in Lafayette, I (Peter) rode a bus sponsored by St. Pius X Council 8901 to the march in Baton Rouge. I gave everyone on the bus a Pro-Life Rosary and lead the recitation of the Pro-Life Rosary on the way to the march. We also distributed Pro-Life Rosaries to a few of the area groups of youth that were traveling to the National March for Life in D.C.

In conjunction with the Baby Shower at the State Convention in Kenner, which was organized to benefit Access Pregnancy Centers of the Archdiocese of New Orleans, we invited Access to bring their mobile unit to the Convention Center. Those in attendance were invited to take a quick tour of this mobile pregnancy

resource center. The Director, Michelle Black was available all morning on the "bus" to answer any questions the attendees might have. We wish to thank Michelle, her staff members & volunteers for making this tour possible. We also thank Kenneth & Jane Margavio, LeRoy Brandow, and Chris Davis for their assistance in manning the Pro-Life table and helping deliver donations to the Access facility.

In March & April, we reviewed & graded the State grading forms (*Culture of Life Activity Reports*) and once again saw marked improvement in our program area. This year's grading was somewhat challenging since we were in a year of transition, moving from the use of manual forms to an electronic version, which arrived via e-mail & was submitted to the State Office in electronic form. Although we experienced a few "glitches" in this process, we can see how this transition to an electronic submittal will save all of us time & money in future years.

This year we were particularly happy with the increased sponsorship by our Councils of Pro-Life Baby Bottle Campaigns. For the first time, starting late last year, baby bottle campaigns were sponsored in the Lake Charles & Shreveport-Bossier areas. After six years of facilitating this fundraising effort, the Pro-Life Baby Bottle Campaigns are now established in every major area of the State. We wish to complement and thank Dick Stein & Chris Davis for their efforts in Lake Charles & Shreveport-Bossier. Without their special efforts this would not have been possible.

Another project that we promoted this year with more emphasis was 40 Days for Life. This international campaign involves forty days of prayer & fasting in front of abortion facilities. In Louisiana, volunteers pray in front of facilities in Baton Rouge, Metairie, and Shreveport. Several weeks before the prayer campaign, we contact the coordinators in each of the three areas and offered our assistance. Information was broadcasted statewide via e-mail requesting the names of any Councils that were participating in this organized effort.

Once this information was received we once again broadcasted the information, providing the names & contact information of the three coordinators and the names and contact information for more than a dozen "liaisons" from our Knights of Columbus Councils who helped the coordinators cover all of the available time slots with volunteers from their KC families. After the campaign, all three coordinators thanked us for our assistance, saying that this was the best year ever, thanks to the assistance of the Knights of Columbus. While the Knights & their family members have always participated in this campaign, this year, with increased promotion there was indeed a positive increase in participation. These "liaisons" & participants should be available to assist in future years, so we can expect the program to continue growing.

In addition to this effort we also printed & distributed copies of the 40 Days for Life prayers (one special prayer for each day) in a two-page pamphlet form. This was sent to all Culture of Life Chair Couples for use at home & in organized prayer services around the State where no abortion facility is present. These prayer pamphlets were also distributed via e-mail for printing & distribution by our Councils.

It has been a pleasure & privilege to serve as Culture of Life Chair Couple for the Louisiana State Council over the last six years. We are thankful for the cooperation & support we have received from everyone at all levels of the Knights of Columbus. Without this cooperation & support our efforts to protect the lives of the Unborn and all human life, from conception, until natural death and build a culture of life would not be possible.

Report of CYLA Chairman

It has been an honor to serve the State of Louisiana as the Catholic Youth Leadership Award (CYLA) Program Chairman. This is one of the most dynamic and rewarding programs that the State Council offers to the Membership. CYLA places an emphasis on Catholic values, scholastic achievement, athletics, and leadership in the areas of church, school and community. Catholic high school seniors throughout the state of Louisiana are eligible to participate in the CYLA program. The only requirement is that they must be nominated by a council within the Louisiana jurisdiction. Each council that participates in the CYLA program will find it to be both rewarding and fulfilling. The foundation of the CYLA program is to provide outstanding Catholic high school seniors the opportunity to compete for cash prizes, awards, and recognition.

The CYLA program begins to take shape at the State Officers' meeting each year. CYLA is discussed at the Knights of Columbus leadership seminar held in July. The CYLA packets are mailed out to the council CYLA chairman or Grand Knight in October. Appeals are made on behalf of CYLA at the State Officers' meeting and at Grand Knights' Day encouraging councils to participate in the program. This is the first year for the competition to utilize a 4-year high school activity application. Councils that participate in the program turn in their nomination forms to the Area Coordinators. Area Coordinators conduct their respective area competition and award one boy and one girl the distinction of being an area winner as well as a state finalist. The Area Coordinator then sends the nomination forms of the finalist to the state chairman. A total of 22 finalists will compete for the state championship. The state chairman appoints a panel of state level judges who will grade the nomination forms of the finalists and conduct the verbal competition held in April. The copies of the nomination forms are mailed to the State Judges for grading. Upon completion by the State Judges, the scores are tallied by the State Chairman as part of the overall score of the finalist.

Councils from across the state participated again this year. The student nominees continue to utilize the online interactive nomination form found at the state web site. This allows for a neater and more standardized application to be produced, permitting the maximum room for content to describe the nominee's activities and accomplishments. We will continue to streamline the online form and encourage all councils to promote its use.

The State CYLA Finals were held at St. Joseph's Academy in Baton Rouge, Sunday, April 5, 2014. Registration began at 8:00 a.m. and concluded at 8:45 a.m. The verbal interviews began at 9 a.m. and Lunch was served at noon. Judging continued at 1 p.m. The interviews concluded at 3:30 p.m. The state deputy awarded all of the finalists a check in the amount of \$500 as their area level winnings. Pictures of the finalists were taken and the Area Coordinators in attendance had the opportunity to have a picture taken with their finalists. The committee tallied the scores and presented the scores to the State Chairman and a winner in the boy and girl division was declared by the State Chairman.

State finals judges were: Monte Danos (CYLA State Boy, 1990), Judge Paul DeMahy, William Dunckelman (CYLA, State Boy 2008), Buddy Guirovich, Mrs. Dot Guirovich Mrs. Beverly Hains, Dr. Melanie Lemoine, Cliff McCain, Mrs. Rita Faye McCain and Mrs. Cherryl Thomas, This is the first year to have past CYLA State Winners as part of the panel of Judges.

Report of Greco Foundation

To: The Officers and Members of the 109th Annual State Convention Meeting of the Louisiana State Council of the Knights of Columbus, held May 2-3, 2014 in Kenner, Louisiana.

The Bishop Charles P. Greco Foundation continues to grow in dollar amount and support over the years in our support for vocations in the State of Louisiana. We have over 1.3 million dollars in our core investments and we continue to move toward the two million dollar mark each year.

This year we gave financial support of \$ 59,340.00 dollars to the young men studying for a religious life and we hope to continue over fifty thousand dollar mark in future years. These successes are due to your support and the direction given by the Brother Knights of the Louisiana Jurisdiction.

The Foundation gave \$ 430.00 in support this year by disbursing the same dollar amount to each seminarian, without regards to the amount of support given by the local councils. The board of directors continues to ask that every Council in our jurisdiction use the RSVP program through the Supreme Council and support those young people studing for a religious life.

This fraternal year the Greco Foundation issued financial support checks to 136. This number included all religious studying to become a diocesan priest, or a brother with intentions of returning to their respective diocese regardless of where they were studying.

It should be noted that a deposit of \$214,.000.00 was made, to Supreme Christopher Fund from the Capitol One Checking as a result of a closeout of UBS Funds and a surplus balance accumulated in the Capitol One Account. This deposit resulted in a growth in the Supreme Christopher Fund balance to \$777,000.00. This year the Greco Board again authorized the temporary park of interest earned from the Christopher Fund in a Capitol One Savings Account. This account currently has a balance of \$44,614.6 to issue monetary support checks to seminiarians. This amount will be added to that interest received from funds on deposit with UBS to arrive at the total to be distributed

In conclusion, functioning as the treasurer of the Bishop Charles P. Greco Memorial Foundation has been extremely enjoyable because of the relationships that have been formed with the seminarians at both Notre Dame as well as St. Joseph's. The fund is growing, only because of the participation by the Knights and their friends. With your continued support we are making a difference.

Report of Scouting Chairman

To: The Officers and Members of the 109th Annual State Convention Meeting of the Louisiana State Council of the Knights of Columbus held May 2-4, 2014 in Kenner, LA.

First, I would like to thank our State Deputy for placing his trust and confidence in me in asking me to be the State Scouting Chairman. I would also like to thanks the many Brother Knights who have supported and helped this program in its fourth year in its current format.

As we reach the end of another year of the State Scouting Program for the Louisiana State Council, the slow growth of the program and the lack of use by councils continues to be a concern. However, it is important to remember that the Worthy State Deputy and I decided that the Knights of the State of Louisiana could do so much more than the program supported by Supreme, in conjunction with the National Catholic Committee on Scouting. Just as a reminder our state program actually has five areas of concentration:

1. Retention of Cub Scout, Boy Scout and Venturing units that are in danger of folding due to the loss of their chartering partner;

2. The creation of new Cub Scout, Boy Scout and Venturing units to bring the Scouting program to underserved areas;

3. The promotion and sponsorship of the Catholic Religious Emblems program;

4. The promotion of increased volunteerism in the Scouting program by our Brother Knights, at the unit, district and/or diocesan levels;

5. Recognition of Brother Knights who have given years of service to the Boy Scouts of America though the Francis J. Parater Award.

During this sixth year of the program we have had the slow down in the actual use of the program by councils continue, but we have still had some progress in the areas of concentration:

1. In terms of unit retention we have not been contacted by any units this year that were looking for help in finding a new chartered partner. While this may initially seem like a negative, we can only hope that the reason for no calls is that no units are in danger of losing their charter due to non-Scouting issues;

2. We have had no new units chartered to Councils or Assemblies to date this year but four councils and one Assembly have asked for information on how to bring Scouting to their areas;

3. A major change was undertaken in the scoring for the State Deputy's Award a few years ago. While we still want councils to promote and sponsor the Catholic Religious Emblems program, some councils have not been able to participate in this program due to lack of interest from their local Scouting units. The scoring is now based on councils explaining how they have supported the Scouting program throughout the year. Promotion and sponsorship of the Catholic Religious Emblems program is just one way to meet this item. A list of suggested ways councils can support Scouting can be found on the state website at http://www.louisianakc.org/programs/scouting/;

4. While many of our Brother Knights are very visible in their volunteerism with the Scouts, there are many more that fly under the radar. This makes it very difficult to track how we are doing in increasing the number of Knights who are volunteering with the Scouts at various levels. We will continue to emphasize the crossover potential of Knights and Scouting volunteers in the years to come;

5. We received NO nominations for the Parater Award this year. The nomination form and a biography of the awards namesake can be found on the state website at <u>http://www.louisianakc.org/programs/scouting/</u>.

Two years ago we added a new form that we are asking Councils to complete on an annual basis. Adoption of this form has been slow by councils but we did receive more in this third year. This form looks for the contact information on any Scouting units (Cub Scout Packs, Boy Scout Troops & Venturing Crews) that are chartered by the Council, their Church or their Parish School. In addition, we are asking councils to complete the information on Scouting units in their areas chartered by Catholic Churches or Schools that are not served by a council. This form will be included in the packets that councils receive at KCLS. The form is now available on the state website. It is our hope that we can get a comprehensive listing of Scouting units chartered to Catholic institutions.

The State Scouting program also publishes a tri-fold brochure that contains information on the Scouting Religious Emblems Program, the history of Scouting & the Knights, the contact information for each Diocesan Catholic Committee on Scouting and the contact information for each Scouting Council in the State of Louisiana. This brochure can be downloaded from the state website at http://www.louisianakc.org/programs/scout-ing/.

While the state Scouting program is still in its infancy, we are making great strides in turning this into one of the state's preeminent programs. The Boy Scouts of America is one of this country's great youth programs and we will find many of our future Knights in their ranks.

Program information, officer information, council information, newsletters, events, and degree schedules were posted / updated.

The biggest task this year, and possibly since the inception of the website itself was the implementation of electronic forms for the state council program grading forms. The forms were made as interactive PDF forms. Form data was stored in XFDF format. The data files were submitted to the councils and district deputies to verify their submission. They were also sent to the state directors / chairmen so they could be graded. For the people whom the forms worked, they worked great. For others they did not work at all. Due to security and other settings on some users' computers, they could not load the form data properly. Various other issues came up. Due to the number of users and computers involved and the variance of the settings on each of those computers, there were too many issues that could all be solved. 45 councils submitted at least one form electronically. For the first time doing this though, I was pleased with the results.

As a result of the issues that were faced, I am looking into a new method for next year that will not be dependent on PDF's for this to work properly.

Report of Welcome Home Chairman

To the officers and members of the 109th State Convention Meeting of the Louisiana State Council assembled in Kenner on May 2, 3, and 4, 2014.

Thanks to those of you using the Welcome Back Program. At the time of this writing, reactivation of nonactives is at 204. A new list of former members was recently sent to our Area Coordinators. They were asked to share this with you. With four weeks remaining in this fiscal year, we should reach <u>220</u>.

For those not aware of the past activities in the Program, the reason for the Program is to reactivate former members, both non-actives and prior members. Non-actives were chosen to work with because of the benefits councils' gain. Each reactivated non-active member, gets the council a new member and an insurance member towards the council's quota. Supreme also adds a money bonus. This bonus will continue until June 2015.

With a very slow beginning (40 non actives, reactivated the first year) a high of 246 was reached by the third year.

On May 02, 2014, the following data received from our Regional Coordinator, Jose Jimenez, PSD, was as follows:

2009-2010 <u>211;</u> 2010-2011 <u>246;</u> 2011-2012 <u>231;</u> 2012-2013 <u>212;</u> 2013 –to-date <u>204</u>.

TOTAL: <u>1104.</u> Add the 40 for the first year (2007-2008) and 80 for the second year (2008-2009), the total is 1224. The Program usually makes up 15% of the State's quota.

It seems there are still just a few councils using the Program. It is hoped that you improve that situation. Brothers, this Program works.

Supreme furnishes the lists of non-actives, which continues to increase, from 1260+ in 2007 to over 2600 at present.

Most councils have a number of potential reactivations listed. The procedure we suggest is not difficult to complete. Some of the materials are provided by the Committee (letters to the prospective member, including up-dated lists of activities presently being sponsored by councils across the state). This is provided to update the potential member. It does take a little effort but using THE TEAM approach, it can work out rather well.

For those of you, Brother Knights, who have and continue to use the Program, you know the benefits. Many thanks for the results. To those who have not used the Program, TRY IT. Help our Order GROW. We all share in the benefits. We are helping our Brothers and ourselves.

Report of Y.E.P. Program

To: The Officers and Members of the 109th Annual State Convention Meeting of the Louisiana State Council of the Knights of Columbus held May 2-4, 2014 in Kenner, LA. The Youth Expansion Program (YEP) is coming to a close for the 2013 – 2014 Columbian Year. As of May 14, 2014, the total YEP funds collected is \$96,176.64. These funds represent the contributions from councils and individuals directly to YEP, as well as 50/50 raffles at all state functions/meetings/activities and all donations.

The YEP Goal for this year was \$137,000 and we are currently at 70.2% of that goal. As you can see, we are still somewhat short this year. There is still time in this Columbian Year to make donations to YEP. Hopefully, we will see an influx in donations to YEP and will be able to continue funding for the many programs that the YEP supports. Let's all do our best in the upcoming weeks to make sure we meet our current goals.

Only 103 councils (34.9%) in Louisiana participated at any level in the YEP Program. As of May 14 2014, there are 189 councils in the State of Louisiana that have yet to contribute any amount to the YEP program. The State Council in Louisiana is requesting a better participation from the councils in our state. Our goal is to have all councils participate at some level in YEP.

For 2013/2014, the following is a breakdown of the grouping of councils contributing to YEP:

51 Councils contributed at Quota Plus (greater than 100% of YEP Quota)

16 Councils contributed at Quota (100% of YEP Quota)

22 Councils contributed between 50% and 99.9% of YEP Quota

14 Councils contributed between 1% and 49% of YEP Quota

189 Councils with no contribution to YEP

The State Council wishes to thank all councils and individual contributors for their support of YEP and look forward to your continued support in future years for this worthy program. May God bless you, your family and your council for your support of our youth through your generous participation of YEP.

IAM THE CULTURE OF LIFE

Everything has a beginning and an eventual end. A sentence begins with a capital letter and ends with a period A movie begins with an opening scene and ends with the credits A day begins at 12:00 AM and ends at 11:59 pm

Beginnings and endings are inevitable. The only possible way one could argue that "abortion" is not synonymous with "murder" is to say that the human life has not yet begun. But Life must have a clear beginning. If you are going to argue that life does not begin at conception, you must provide a concrete and clear alternative for when life DOES begin.

Well, according to the state of Louisiana, A human's life begins 20 weeks into the pregnancy. For after then it is illegal to abort the child. But, according to Minnesota, life begins at 24 weeks into the pregnancy. Oh! But in Virginia a human's life begins at 28 weeks. What?!! I must also choose to control my own body. And this is true for all women. But the moment that an egg is fertilized, that life is no longer a part of a woman's BODY. That **person** is no longer an object within her. That person is no longer "women's healthcare"

That **person** is now a LIVING human being that deserves his or her own respect. THAT HUMAN BEING IS NOT A *CHOICE*, *he or she is a* LIFE

You can <u>choose</u> adoption. In America, for every one adoption there are 67 abortions. Meanwhile; hundreds and thousands of parents are sitting on a waiting list, wishing and hoping for a child.

All men are created equal, you say? All men have the right to life, you say?

Tell that to the 57 million babies since 1973 who were not only murdered but degraded to the point that they did not even get to be considered human.

Hello, everyone my name is Hannah Longino and I am so excited to be with you all this evening.



Pro Life Oratory Contest

How many speeches, how many studies, how many scientific experiments, and how many church homilies will it take to finally overcome the culture of death? I am not here today to compile another litany of pro-life apologetics. No, a brief speech can hardly change a heart, but it can inspire one to action! Advances in science, cultural trends, and recent pro-life state legislation have been slowly but surely eroding the complex framework of this pro-<u>choice</u> era. Proving that this culture of death is not omnipotent! And that this era *will* come to an end! But only if WE *courageously* respond to the call to do our part! We are the people through which our own prayers may be answered! *I am here* today to *empower* the pro-life generation to lead the final and victorious charge against the culture of death. There has never been a more favorable environment then the one here and now, we must not take that for granted! This is the *time*, this is the *nation*, and this is the *generation* to overcome the culture of death!

First, *This truly is the time*. As a people, we have never been more pro-life than we are today. In 2009 Gallup recorded for the first time since Roe v Wade that public opinion had shattered the long-awaited milestone of more than half of Americans considering themselves Pro-Life! And in 2012 Gallup recorded an *all-time low* for those Americans considering themselves pro-choice of only 41%; that's a 9 point margin! And in the times we live in, it doesn't take more than a 9th grade biology education to realize that the moment the sperm meets the egg a zygote is formed, so that its nature is undeniably *human* and not some other species. Its genetic composition is absolutely unique unto itself and different from any other human that has ever existed, including that of its mother, thus disproving that abortion is merely between a woman and her body. These recent cultural and scientific trends only prove that time is on *our* side! But even to acknowledge the extensive progress of the pro-life movement today, we must also admit the *million*-plus innocent lives still taken by abortion annually. But with every scientific breakthrough verifying life's start at conception, and with the *spirit* of this day and age, there has never been a more suitable environment to overcome the culture of death. *We are called to action; this is the time to turn our culture around*!

Second, on the national front, I have not heard a *single* faction of the American pro-choice movement argue that our Founding Fathers envisioned a pro-abortion country. Simply put, they haven't done so because no valid argument *could* be made. As stated in the Declaration of Independence, "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are *Life*, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness." Our Founders recognized the sanctity of life and even went so far as to put it before *liberty*. If that wasn't enough, the Fifth and Fourteenth Amendments reiterate this basic principle: "nor shall any State deprive any person of *life*, liberty, or property." No arguments have been made to sustain the current culture of death in the U.S. because at its very core it is un-American. For over 200 years we have considered this great country *the land of the free and the home of the brave* because of the sacrifices made by the generations before us! Well now it is our duty to fight for these rights! In 1973 we lost a major battle in the war against the culture of death with the legalization of abortion! And in <u>17</u>76 George Washington lost the battle of Long Island in the Revolutionary War, but he *did not give* up and *neither should we*! He went on to overcome tyranny and establish this land as a beacon of freedom and justice to the world! It is only American to persevere, and it is our turn to fight for the freedom of our silent countrymen, and overcome the culture of death!

Nonetheless, it is the third aspect that ought to inspire us the most: the zeal of the up and coming generation. The first time I attended the National March for Life in D.C., I remember seeing a ton of signs that read "I am the Pro-life generation." And for the past five years, I have seen them more than double from 80,000 participants in 2010 to about 200,000 last year. But even more important is the fact that the vast majority of the participants are from the younger generation, *our generation*. In a culture of apathy an inspiring faction of today's youth are *not afraid to be bold and stand up* for what they believe in. In many ways to be Pro-Life is to be counter-cultural, yet some of the greatest moments in our history started by someone who was not afraid to stand out. If you look at the 1980s, the West popularly thought that the only way to deal with communism was through accommodation, but it was because of Ronald Reagan's magnanimity and vision, which totally contradicted the main political currents of his time, that helped lead to the fall of the evil empire. Now the culture of death has no Berlin wall, and I'm no Ronald Reagan. But, there is a wall within many American hearts keeping us from seeing the sanctity of life and I *can* urge my fellow Americans to "Tear down *this* wall." Today, one can look back and see the pro-life movement taking root and growing from generation to generation, laying the foundation and framework for my generation to finally tip the scale. Society wants us to believe that we are loosing; we are not! According to Gallup's polling, people between the ages of 18 to 29 are the most likely to be against abortion in any case, showing that the next wave of voters and activists will be heavily pro-life. But what does this mean for the pro-life movement? It means that the public opinion trend towards the pro-life stance will only grow as a generation of young people continue to turn against abortion. *This* is the generation to overcome the culture of death!

The spirit of this day and age marks the end of the culture of death and beginning of the culture of life! Our children depend on it, our nation stands for it, the justice and righteousness in our hearts beckon it, and united, we will deliver it! If not now, then when? If not *us*, then who? In order to achieve this culture of life, we *must* recognize our part in it and must magnanimously fight for what we believe in! There has never been a better time, nation, or generation more suitable to doing so. And it must be done! This *is* the time, this *is* the nation, and *we are* the generation to overcome the culture of death!
