



Camp Joshua and the Leadership Institute 2010-2011

Joshua, a young understudy of Moses and hero of the Old Testament, is known for his character. A quote from Deuteronomy 31 states that Joshua's character was one of bold strength, wisdom and courage.

Camp Joshua Weekends: This year we held 2 weekends of fantastic Pro Life Camps designed to train high school sophomores, juniors, and seniors to be pro-life leaders. On April 9th to 11th we had 88 students in Baton Rouge and on April 23rd to 25th there were 46 students in Lake Charles. The

weekend consists of many speakers about abortion and other pro life issues. After each presentation the students broke out into small groups with the College Students for discussion. We started each camp on Friday night with an ice breaker and a seminar on Abortion 101. Then Saturday, Abortion 202, "Making Abortion Unthinkable through Pro Life Persuasion", "Being a Pro Life Leader", a speech on "Pro Life Chastity", "The Impact of Abortion". The also had a field trip to the State Capital to talk with Pro Life politicians, a dinner and a Saturday night Coffee House party. On Sunday they picked right up with "The Role of Pregnancy Center in the Pro Life Movement", and a seminar about "Transforming Character into Action". Both of these Camp Joshua's were great and I am sure we planted many seeds.

Louisiana Camp Joshua Leadership Institute is a week long camp designed to train high school sophomores, juniors, and seniors to be prolife leaders and activist. The week is designed to instill in them the strength, knowledge, wisdom, tools and courage to go out and proclaim the message of life to their schools, community, how to help Crisis Pregnancy Centers, and how to work towards changing the thoughts of others to be more Pro-life.

The event was held at the Bishop Tracy Center in Baton Rouge from July 11 to 15th. There were 22 ambitious students who were very into the activities of the week. We had speakers come in from around the country and 7 college Students for Life to work as group leaders. We also had several Brother Knights from the area to help with airport runs, a couple of meals and chaperones. The week had a variety of talks from the speakers, breaks out into small groups after each speaker with the group leaders for discussion and also hands on activities.

They registered in on Sunday af-

ternoon and started off with introductions and an ice breaker game. Then Dr John Bruchalski, gave a talk on "How you can make a Difference". On Monday they started with another talk on "What is abortion and how does it affect women and men" by Dr John Bruchalski. Then they went in two groups to a Care Pregnancy Center to receive a tour, learn the services and how they can help. They also got to see a sonogram of one of the babies from someone who two weeks ago was contemplating abortion and had a change of heart after visiting the center. Then Monday evenings they had two seminars on Apologetics taught by Steve Wagner.

Tuesday they learned how to do pro life interviews, had talks by the Students for Life of America on "Why Activism is Important", "What difference can you make", "Starting/Growing a pro-life group in you High School and College" and "Organizing Events to Get the Word Out". They went to LSU Free Speech Alley to set up a Pro Life table with literature. At LSU they practiced what they learned and actually did several Pro-Life interviews. As the day went on all the students gained more confidence and really got into it. Some of them believe that they were able to put what they learned to use and may have changed some minds. That evening they had a talk on "The World

of Stem Cell Research". After dinner they had a choices panel with options of abortion. We had a person who had an abortion, one who changed her mind and had the baby; had a mother and adopted daughter was going to be aborted. Then that night we watch the movie Bella.

On Wednesday three of the students got up early and went to the Catholic radio station for 45 minutes of interview on Camp Joshua and their experiences. The radio station was super excited by what they heard and gave great reviews to the Students, about Camp Joshua and what was going on. Then they had a presentation by Maria Graham on "How to be a Sidewalk Counselor". After Lunch they went to one of the Abortion Facilities and practiced sidewalk counseling and prayed outside the clinic. After that they went on a tour of an Abortion Holocaust Memorial. That evening we took them to LSU Sports Complex where Father Andrew Merrick, his brother David and wife gave a presentation on Chastity and Abstinence. Then they went Rock Wall climbing. On Wednesday night they had a Coffee House party with skits of what they learned and of course dancing and fun.

On Thursday morning they had talks from Bobby Schindler on" Understanding End of Life Issues" and "Why Terri's Life Still Matters". We then had a late lunch with Bobby Schindler and the parents of the students. At this luncheon we had a commissioning ceremony and wrap up talks about the camp from me, Ben Clapper and the College group leaders. You know it was a great camp when none of the students wanted it to end and the parents complimented what they had heard from their students. There were several tears of joy from most everyone involved and no one wanted to leave.

Be creative and apply your own council's ideas. Refer to and use the Surge With Service Booklet also as a guide.

<u>Volunteerism</u>

I encourage your council to seek local groups in your community that appeal to your council and explore ways in which you can literally lend a hand. Whatever you do, from paper work to physical labor to fundraising, can help an organization in achieving its goals and driving positive change. And donating your time, even an hour a week, is a great way to meet likeminded individuals who are driven by the spirit of Fueling Good.

Human Needs

Human needs starts with the basic items of food, water, and shelter. These are followed by the need for safety and security, then belonging or love, self-esteem, and finally, personal fulfillment.

Civic Involvement

Take part in community recreation programs, patriotic observances, penal reform programs and cultural activities. Recognize outstanding civil servants, police officers, firefighters, emergency medical technicians and other key figures in your community.

<u>Environment</u>

Organize tree planting projects and help ensure that your trees survive. Organize clean ups of parks, beaches, waterways, empty lots and neighborhoods. Sort the trash you collect into recycling categories and bring to recycling center.

Teach children to respect their world by learning to avoid littering and learn to use things sparingly and thoughtfully.

Public safety involves the prevention of and protection from events that could endanger the safety of the general public from significant danger, in-


Honor Columbus





The Catholic Youth Leadership Award Program is one of the most dynamic and rewarding programs that the State Council offers to the Membership. CYLA places an emphasis on Catholic values, scholastic achievement, athletics, and leadership in the areas of church, school and community. Catholic seniors throughout the state of Louisiana are eligible to participate in the CYLA program. The only requirement is that they must be nominated by a council within the Louisiana jurisdiction. Each council that participates in the CYLA program will find it to be both rewarding and fulfilling. Giving outstanding Catholic seniors the opportunity to compete for cash prizes, awards, and recognition is the very foundation of the CYLA program.

The CYLA program begins to take shape at the state officers' meeting held in June. CYLA is discussed at the Knights of Columbus leadership seminar. The CYLA packets are mailed out to the council CYLA chairman or Grand Knight in October and November. Appeals are made on behalf of CYLA at the state officers' meeting and at Grand Knights' day, encouraging councils to participate in the program. Councils that participate in the program turn in their nomination forms to the Area Coordinators. Area Coordinators conduct their respective area competition and award one boy and one girl the distinction of being an area winner as well as a state finalist. The Area Coordinator then sends the nomination forms of the finalist to the state chairman. A total of 24 finalists will compete for the state championship. The state chairman appoints ten state level judges who will grade the nomination forms of the finalists and conduct the verbal competition held in April. Copies are made of the finalist nomination forms, but, the names of the finalists are censored so that the state judges are not aware of the names of the finalist or who nominated the finalist. Then the copies of the nomination forms are mailed to the state judges for grading. Upon completion by the state judges,

the scores are tallied by the state chairman and are used as part of the overall score of the finalist.

Every student nominee should utilize the online interactive nomination form found at the state web site. This allows for a neater and more standardized application to be produced, permitting the maximum room for content to describe the nominee's activities and accomplishments.



Second, during the month of October, we celebrate the arrival to the Americas of our patron and model, Christopher Columbus. While by no means a perfect paragon of virtue, Columbus was motivated to a great degree to not only discover new resources for the Kingdom of Spain but also to reach out as a missionary to extend from within his culture and religion the presence of our Christian faith and heritage to those he encountered.

In a recent publication, this encounter of Columbus with the people of the islands of the Caribbean was described as follows:

"In1492 Chris Columbus came ashore; it was not the India he was looking for, but a small speck in the Bahamas called Watling Island or since 1926 San Salvador. Two hours after midnight, Columbus sighted land. He named the first island San Salvador, meaning "Holy Saviour." After meeting the natives, Columbus wrote "So that they might be well-disposed towards us, for I knew that they were a people to be...converted to our Holy Faith rather by love than by force, I gave to some red caps and to others glass beads... They were greatly pleased and became

so entirely our friends that it was a wonder to see.... I believe that they would easily be made Christians, for it seemed to me that they had no religion of their own."

Perhaps the lesson we can learn from this bit of history and heritage is that, like Columbus, we are called to evangelize, to share the Good News, with those we meet. We are called to share our faith, that Jesus may live across the world and across time, through the succour of our Blessed Mother.

Third, October is a month committed to the Culture of Life and the end of the scourge of abortion and other inhuman brutalities. In this context, Bishop Robert Muench, Ordinary of the Diocese of Baton Rouge, prayed this past Sunday, October 10, the following "Prayer for Life" drawn from Pope John Paul II's *Evangelium Vitae*.

"O Mary, bright dawn of the new world, Mother of the Living, to you do we entrust the cause of life. Look down. O Mother, upon the vast numbers of babies not allowed to be born, of the poor whose lives are made difficut, of men and women who are victims of brutal violence, of the elderly and the sick killed by indifference or out of misguided mercy. Grant that all who believe in your Son may proclaim the Gospel of Life with honesty and love to the people of our time. Obtain for them the grace to accept the Gospel as a gift ever new, the joy of celebrating it with gratitude throughout their lives and the courage to bear witness toit resolutely, in order to build together with all people of good will, the civilization of truth and love, to the praise and glory of God, the Creator and lover of Life.

Fourth, let us celebrate the pilgrimage and devotions being celebrated beginning the end of this month for the Silver Rose of Our Lady of Guadalupe. We pray that many blessings will come to all who participate in hosting, praying, and supporting this pilgrimage.

And May the graces of the Lord and the favors of his Blessed Mother be with all of us as we continue to commit ourselves to the ministries and companionship of our shared Columbian knighthood.





As we compose this article we're in the middle of October, a special month for Pro-Life activities. With "Respect Life Sunday" falling in this month, we tend to focus even more on Pro-Life issues with Pro-Life Baby Bottle Campaigns, special flyers in church bulletins, Pro-Life brochures being passed out, bill boards going up, and other Pro-Life activities more prevalent in October. If your Council did not do much in October, perhaps you can take aim and shoot for January 2011. your support & reassurance. Third, by getting out there, you show others who may not necessarily feel comfortable with marching that it's not that bad. This helps to increase the population of marchers from year to year. Fourth, a strong showing at Pro-Life marches tells our politicians that Pro-Life is an issue that they need to support. The more constituents they see, the more likely they are to vote "Pro-Life". Next, Pro-Life marches help to educate our young people. When they see you out there, they know that it is a priority & should be considered important to them. Finally, a strong show of support will diminish the possibility that our foes, the Pro-Abortion supporters, can use the march to suggest that the Pro-Life cause has a dwindling following. We of course know this is untrue which brings us to another point that should be emphasized.

Statistics show that the Pro-Life following is growing. More and more young adults & children are being taught about the tragedy of abortion, an event which results in the death of a child and mental & physical trauma to the mother. If you have not appointed a Chair Couple, please take care of this as soon as possible; and, as we mentioned above, please send us their contact information. The year is half over and we really wish we could reach even more of our Louisiana Councils with our brief but important Pro-Life messages.



• Provide volunteers for your diocesan Catholic Committee on Scouting

• Sponsor the Catholic Religious Emblem program...especially for units not chartered to Catholic organizations

Provide Religious Emblem
counselors

• Recognize all Eagle Scouts (there are certificates available from

Supreme for this)

• Sponsor and host a Religious Emblem training program

• Sponsor the diocesan adult awards program

• Host a Spring or Fall Rosary prayer service for Scouts

· Sponsor a vocational retreat

• Sponsor a Scout for the St. George Trek

· Provide merit badge counselors

• Provide 4th Degree ceremony teams for Scouting events (e.g. Scout Sunday Mass, Retreats, Camporees)

• Sponsor and/or host Religious Emblem retreats, rosaries, hikes and other programs

• Provide members for boards of review for Religious Emblems

• Provide meeting space for Cub Scout or Boy Scout units

• Provide monetary support for Catholic Committee programs and activities


or questions you may have. He has done a great job of developing and maintain the site.

However there are still many Councils that are choosing not to participate in this program. We are current pursuing the possibility of changing this program to the months of April-June starting in the 2011 calendar year. There will be more information coming out concerning these changes in the near future. By now many Councils should have started their Substance Abuse Poster Contest.
