


Sadly, we lost a dear friend and Brother Knight, PSD Leo Segalla. Leo served as State Deputy from 1990 to 1992.



Also surviving Leo are one brother and two sisters:



Leo and Mary Lynn, a New Orleans native, have been active members of St. Jude and St. Patrick Parishes in Baton Rouge. Leo served on the Parish Council and as a Eucharist Minster, taught CCD, served as Lector and for a number of years, was Eucharist Minister to the men of Hunt Correctional Institute in St. Gabriel.

Leo was initiated into the Knights of Columbus Order, Third Degree, in March 1968 as a member of Msgr. Dominic Blasco Council 3298 in Baton Rouge and transferred into his parish council of St. Patrick Council 8601 in July, 1991. He was initiated into the Msgr. Gassier Assembly, Fourth Degree, in May, 1981.

Leo served the order by appointment as District Deputy, State Pro-Life Chairman, State Church Activity Director, State Program Director, State Membership Director and State Ceremonial

Chairman. He was for many years an active Conferring Officer of the Third Degree.

Leo was elected Grand Knight of Msgr. Dominic Blasco Council 3298 in 1973 and 1975; President of the Baton Rouge Metropolitan Chapter in 1980; State Warden in 1984; State Advocate in 1985, State Treasurer in 1986, State Secretary in 1988, and State Deputy of Louisiana in 1990.

Leo had been employed for 23 years as a Senior Cost Engineer and Cost Control Manager for Barnard and Burk in Baton Rouge prior to becoming Regional Program Consultant for the Knights Supreme Office in June, 1994.

Leo retired from the Supreme Council on July 1, 2004 and then spent the next two years developing Grand Knight & District Deputy training programs for the Supreme Council. After Hurricanes Katrina and Rita hit Louisiana, the Supreme Knight asked Leo to return to the Supreme Council for one year to assist those councils and members devastated by the Storms.

Leo remained active in St. Patrick Council 8601 in Baton Rouge having served as Advocate and Membership Director. For a number of years he had been the parish Respect Life Chairman. Leo also began the Respect Life AC-TION Coalition of the Diocese of Baton Rouge and was treasurer of Baton Rouge Pro-Life. He developed the Louisiana Camp Joshua program "A Pro-Life Training weekend for high school students" which was initially held in Baton Rouge and is funded by the K of C State Council. This program has now grown to two camps (the second in Lake Charles) and the Camp Joshua Institute (a week long advanced prolife training camp.

tas for this year. If not, it is never too late to begin.

There will be one new twist for you Grand Knights to be aware of this year. As was discussed at KCLS, Grand Knights Day has been moved up to December to coincide with our December State Family Meeting. As many of you know, GK's Day is the time for the annual Parade of Councils to make their donations to YEP. This will happen again this year. The new twist is that this now takes place in the beginning of December instead of the end of January. Hopefully your councils have already taken this change into account and will be ready to make your pledge at GK's Day in December.

If for whatever reason, you are not able to meet your full quota, you can make a partial donation at this time to get recognized and make the remaining donation at a later date. Remember, as long as the full quota is received by the YEP Chairman by April 5, 2013, you will receive full points toward the State Deputy's Award.

The State Budget for YEP funding for the 2012-2013 Columbian Year is \$140,000. So far this year, we have collected a total of \$3,545.75. As you can see, we have a ways to go to reach our goal. The breakdown for that budget is as follows:

- St. Mary's Training Facility— \$8,500
- · Miscellaneous Activities— \$5,000






65th Annual K.C. State Golf Tournament





The Catholic Youth Leadership Award Program is one of the most dynamic and rewarding programs that the State Council offers to the Membership. CYLA places an emphasis on Catholic values, scholastic achievement, athletics, and leadership in the areas of church, school and community. Catholic seniors throughout the state of Louisiana are eligible to participate in the CYLA program. The only requirement is that they must be nominated by a council within the Louisiana jurisdiction. Each council that participates in the CYLA program will find it to be both rewarding and fulfilling. Giving outstanding Catholic seniors the opportunity to compete for cash prizes, awards, and recognition is the very foundation of the CYLA program.

CYLA packets will be mailed out to the Grand Knight in early November. Appeals are made on behalf of CYLA at the state officers' meeting and at Grand Knights' day, encouraging councils to participate in the program. Councils that participate in the program turn in their nomination forms to the Area Coordinators. Area Coordinators.

tors conduct their respective area competition and award one boy and one girl the distinction of being an area winner as well as a state finalist. The Area Coordinator then sends the nomination forms of the finalist to the state chairman. A total of 22 finalists will compete for the state championship. Then the copies of the nomination forms are mailed to the state judges for grading. Upon completion by the state judges, the scores are tallied by the state chairman and are used as part of the overall score of the finalist. The appointed ten state level judges will conduct the verbal competition on April 15th in Lafayette.

Every student nominee should utilize the online interactive nomination form found at the state web site. This allows for a neater and more standardized application to be produced, permitting the maximum room for content to describe the nominee's activities and accomplishments.

Endorsement of any candidate or similar activities is strictly forbidden by our Order's Constitution & violates the rules governing non-profit organizations. Most voters' guides will perform a side-by-side comparison of two or more candidates. This essentially serves as an endorsement of one of the candidates that again, is not allowed for our membership.

The only voters' guide we have seen that does not violate these policies is the "Voter's Guide for Serious Catholics" which was published by the United State Conference of Catholic Bishops several years ago. This publication focuses on issues rather than particular political parties or candidates for public office.

If anyone has any questions or concerns relating to this issue or any others relating to a Culture of Life, please feel free to contact us preferably by e-mail. We will do our best to answer your question or provide you assistance with your concern as soon as possible.

Our personal condolences are extended to the family of PSD Leo Segalla, a true friend of the Pro-Life cause who died this past month. Perhaps Leo's most memorable achievement was his founding of *Louisiana Camp Joshua*, our Pro-Life youth camp four years ago. Scouting in the Catholic Church

Each year, the National Catholic Committee on Scouting® (NCCS) conducts the "Scouting in the Catholic Church" training conference at Philmont Training Center in Cimarron, NM as part of BSA Relationships Week. The conference brings together religious and lay participants with varying experience in Scouting and the Catholic faith. The goal of the conference is to help the participants understand how Scouting is a Youth Ministry and how to use the information in their dioceses when talking with Scouters, priests, and youth ministers.

The conference is structured to explore the four daily components - Leadership, Holiness, Conversion, and Worship - from several points of view. The NCCS' Scouter Development: Lay Apostolate Formation for Scouting format of bible readings, reflection, and small-group discussion gives the participants insight as to why a Catholic Scouter is called to the lay apostolate, and how to run a SD:LAFS program. The conference priest advisor facilitates the component discussion looking from a catechism point of view. Presentations and discussions explain how NCCS and



Scouting views and fulfills its part of the component. Discussion, readings, and reflections using the *Renewing the Vision* booklet helps the participants gain knowledge from a Youth Minister's point of view.

Participants may attend Mass each evening at the Philmont Catholic Chapel with crews starting or ending their mountain treks, Philmont staff, and local residents.

Class is in session Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday. If you would like to bring family members, Philmont has programs from infants to spouses so you can concentrate on your class experience. But you also have a chance to experience Philmont during the evening Sunday-Friday and all day Wednesday. PTC offers events and activities to keep you as busy as you like, or you can just relax and enjoy the scenery.

In addition to the knowledge gained and the experiences shared during the week, you will go home certified to facilitate the Scouter Development: Lay Apostolate for Scouters program and have the opportunity to earn the Jerusalem Cross Award for bringing what you learned back to your diocese.



Our jurisdiction is currently ranked in the Top Ten of the Order in membership intake through the first quarter of the fraternal year. I personally wish to thank all of those Brother Knights who have recruited at least one new member thus far this fraternal year. We are still slightly short of our average monthly goal of 124 new members per month. We are currently averaging 89 new members per month (72%). Please encourage your members to try to recruit at least **ONE NEW MEMBER** FOR THEIR COUNCIL EACH **MONTH**. This will help to ensure that we continue to be successful in membership recruiting. Provide your members with blank prospect cards that they can keep in their pocket to provide to a prospect. This will ensure that they obtain the contact information needed to invite him to an Admissions Committee meeting/Informational Social. Look at those men in your Parish that are currently serving as Lectors. Ushers and Eucharistic Ministers that are not yet Brother Knights and encourage them to join the Knights.

I encourage all councils to get with their Pastor to schedule a **Quarterly Communion Mass** for their Council. See if you can have the Pastor give the pulpit talks at all of the masses and have your members outside with prospect cards for the prospects to complete. Invite the prospects to an Admissions Committee meeting/Informational Social the following week and conduct a First Degree within one week of the Admissions Committee meeting/Informational Social.

Promote the Shining Armor Award at your First Degree Exemplifications to encourage all of your new members to recruit a member. This will help to ensure that you recruit *ONE NEW MEMBER*, *PER COUNCIL*, *PER MONTH*. *THE POWER OF ONE!*

RETAIN-Don't let him get away!!!

Take him to the degree and show your support for him by attending the Major Degree with him.

Please encourage your Retention Committee to use the Conservation Report to provide Brother Mike Terro. We would also be interested in any information from the suspended member regarding reasons why he no longer wishes to be a Knight.




